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My Army Post App launched locally

As part of the Army's focus on providing a supportive and enriching environment through its quality-of-life initiatives, the new My Army Post Application (MAPA) was developed by the Army Futures Command Army Software Factory. The app aims to compile available services, programs and unit in-processing information within a single system to better inform installation stakeholders.

Fort Leavenworth is available on the platform for community members to access real-time information for a wide variety of activities and programs. The

app differs from Digital Garrison, an existing smartphone application for Army installations, by enabling user customization and the modernization of features, such as user-created contributions feeding live updates to other users.

'The My Army Post App is the latest Army enterprise-level solution to connect Army communities with relevant, accurate and tailorable information," said Fort Leavenworth Garrison Public Affairs Officer Scott Gibson. "We want this new app to improve the lives of Fort Leavenworth soldiers, families, civilian employees and area retirees, and we

With a variety of free programs offering education and counseling services, the Army is equipping families with the tools they need to achieve financial readiness and support mission success throughout the year.

Financial Frontline

Financial Frontline is a service that provides soldiers and their families with comprehensive support, including access to financial education and free counseling services.

Through Financial Frontline's services, soldiers can find specific information based on milestones such as pre- and post-deployment, PCS, divorce and marriage, promotions, new child, continuation pay and disabling sickness or condition pay. They can also see the policies for blended retirement, the transition assistance program, the financial readiness program, pre-separation counseling and more. There are also links to the military spouse money mission with advice for how Army families can share money advice with their children and to the Army survivor outreach services program.

have confidence that it will."

Users can customize the app's resources based on personal preferences to stay informed on closures, how busy a resource is, or other important updates.

For example, if someone frequently eats lunch at the Fort Leavenworth Dining Facility, that patron can bookmark the individual resource to receive live push notifications for important messages and view other user comments to see if there is a long wait time.

User customization was identified as a critical feature during the initial pilot phase. The app was piloted at Fort Cavazos, Texas; Fort Meade, Maryland; Camp Humphreys, South Korea; Fort McCoy, Wisconsin; Fort Moore, Georgia; and U.S. Army Garrison Bavaria, Germany, to test the viability of the software and to collect actionable user feedback from a diverse pool of the Army community. Feedback from the pilot communities heavily influenced the features ultimately incorporated into the final product.

MAPA is expected to be a vital asset in Fort Leavencommunication worth's strategy for installation stakeholders with its app push notification capability.



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great resource for community members looking to stay informed of upcoming community and FMWR events," said Fort Leavenworth FMWR's Marketing and Commercial Sponsorship Director Mary Manago. "We believe the app can help us reach younger, more smartphone-oriented people to better promote the terrific events FMWR offers throughout the year."

MAPA was also designed to improve efficiency and reduce confusion for incoming service members and families during the PCS process. Service members can streamline their in-processing experience with unit-specific checklists available in the "Newcomers" tab of the app. Fort Leavenworth will have checklists for service members assigned to the Combined Arms Center, Army Corrections Brigade, Mission Command Training Program, Medical Department Activity and Dental Command. Newcomers who want to learn more about housing options on Fort Leavenworth can explore the different housing villages in the "Resource" tab on the app. Each village entry has the contact information of its respective village mayor, map pins to see the surrounding community, and links to the Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities website to view housing floor plans and pictures. "This is another tool in our communication toolbox that literally puts inforabout mation Fort Leavenworth in the palm of the users' hands," Gibson said. "The goal of this new app is that Army senior commanders will rely on MAPA to connect Army communities with installation services and command messaging."

The app works in concert with Fort Leavenworth's Garrison and the Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare, Recreation websites, drawing on phone directories and other contact information to simplify the app transition process. The Fort Leavenworth Garrison Public Affairs Office and FMWR will also maintain a community calendar for users to track upcoming events.

so I started looking for children's books about the places we lived or were going to PCS to and came up short handed," she said. "I thought (the book) would be a good tool for parents to have to talk about their new home, what things they could do, and hopefully make the move a little easier."

The "Hello, Home" series started with "Hello, Home Fort Liberty," which was self-published in May 2024.

"We started with Fort Liberty because it is the largest base populationwise," she said. "We did Fort Leavenworth next, because that's where my family and I moved in the fall of 2024."

enjoyed being able to point out locations they knew within the book.

"When we got the book, I was reading it to the boys, and I loved hearing them say like 'Oh, look at the blue bridge,' because they love going over the blue bridge, and then the Buffalo Soldier business grows, and they take requests for books to be written about specific installations on their website, https:// www.hellohomebooks.com.

"We have four or five fully written books that haven't been published," McMenamin said. "With

working with three other women to create the "Hello, Home" books.

"Co-founder and author, Alexandra Williams, is a great friend of mine. When I had this idea, I ran it past her to get her true thoughts, and she loved it, and we started brainstorming how to make our idea a reality," McMenamin said. "Our illustrator, Ava Jednak, is also a military spouse. We wanted to work with a veteran or military spouse, because they would be of like-mind and understand what military children go through. The last person we worked with is our editor. I may be biased, but I think she's great her name is Jane Utecht and she's my mom."

McMenamin said the co-authors do research about each installation, searching for both historical information and familyfriendly activities offered in each community.

"We research just basic history, history of the post and history of the area, and then after that we look at like the fun things to do," McMenamin said. "So, (in the book) we talk about the fun things in Kansas City that you can do. And for our Fort Liberty books, we talk about the things in the area, like the beaches, some hiking and stuff like that."

She shared that she read the book to her sons, who

(Monument), they go 'That's where my daddy had his motion,' meaning his promotion. I love seeing them put two and two together, like seeing it in the book and then being able to verbalize 'I've been there, I've done that.'''

Within each book, the authors also incorporate elements that tie the series together.

"The backs (of the books) always have the house with the moving truck, and we always end with a sunset picture," Mc-Menamin said. "This one we were like 'We want sunflowers and a really pretty sunset,' you know, just because it's iconic Kansas."

She went on to share that each book in the series has an image of a dog, who serves as the series mascot and is named 'Dity,' after the Army's term for a do-ityourself move.

"He'll appear like three to four times in the book."

Another significant element of the series is the assurance that there will be an image of a female soldier.

"We know there (are) lots of single moms," Mc-Menamin said, adding that both she and her co-author left the service to become moms. "We wanted to make sure that the female service members were represented as well."

The co-authors plan to publish more books as the

any new company it's very difficult getting off the ground, so we hope eventually we'll be able to have the financial standing to publish another book, and it'll probably be Cavazos or Sill."

McMenamin read the book to children at the Leavenworth Public Library earlier this month, and she plans to read the book at the Combined Arms Research Library in March.

"We're hoping to do one here in the spring, and then I would love to do another one at the off-post library in the spring or summer before we move (this fall)."

Currently, her books about Fort Liberty and Fort Leavenworth can be found for sale at the Fort Leavenworth Frontier Army Museum Gift Shop, and for check-out at all of the Unified School District 207 school libraries, as well as the post and Leavenworth libraries.

National Guard members support 60th Presidential Inauguration

WASHINGTON — About 7,800 National Guard troops were on duty as part of a large interagency presence to ensure the peaceful transition of power during the 60th Presidential Inauguration Jan. 20, continuing a legacy that began in 1789 when their predecessors escorted George Washington to the first inauguration.

Air Force Gen. Steve Nordhaus, chief, National Guard Bureau; Army Senior Enlisted Advisor John Raines, SEA to the CNGB; Army Lt. Gen. Jonathan Stubbs, director, Army National Guard, and other NGB leaders met with Guardsmen at various locations across the nation's capital Jan. 19.

Sporting a special shoulder patch with a Minuteman in the middle and the words "Always Ready, Always There" stitched across the bottom to make them easily identifiable, these Guardsmen — representing 40 states, territories and the District of Columbia — form Joint Task Force-District of Columbia, led by Commanding General of the District of Columbia National Guard Army Maj. Gen. John Andonie and JTF Commander Army Brig. Gen. Craig Maceri.

At the request of civil authorities, JTF-DC personnel are staged throughout the city to support the U.S. Secret Service, U.S. Capitol Police and D.C. Metropolitan Police by helping with crowd management; traffic control points; chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear response; civil disturbance response; and sustainment operations.

"The National Guard's experience, versatility and long-standing relationships help ensure seamless collaboration with our interagency partners to set the conditions for a safe and peaceful presidential inauguration," Nordhaus said.

"We could not be prouder of you," he said. "You give confidence to the American people to know the Guard is here."

The 20th amendment to the Constitution specifies that the term of each elected president of the United States begins at noon on Jan. 20 of the year following the election. Each president must take the oath of office before assuming the duties of the position.

The NGB, along with states and civilian agency partners, spent much of the last year preparing for the inauguration, which usually takes place outside the United States Capitol. Officials modified the plan Jan. 17 due to the predicted extreme cold, and the ceremony took place inside the Capitol Rotunda with a follow-on event at Washington's Capital One Arena. "Our soldiers have been able to quickly adapt to meet the needs of the Secret Service," said Army Maj. Peter Leach, operations officer with the Maryland National Guard's

JTF-DC supports civilian authorities, such as the U.S. Capitol Police, U.S. Secret Service and D.C. Metropolitan Police by providing support like crowd management, traffic control points, CBRN response, civil disturbance response and sustainment operations.

581st Troop Command.

Stubbs praised the Guardsmen's agility to quickly shift to the new plan.

"It's impressive," Stubbs said. "Your professionalism is evident. Your dedication is admirable. I'm proud of you; the whole nation is proud of you."

Guardsmen began flowing into the National Capital Region the week before and received assignments to JTF-DC's subordinate task forces to address diverse operational needs. The subordinate task forces worked closely with federal and local agencies to protect critical infrastructure and maintain seamless coordination. A reserve force was also on standby to offer scalable support to ensure flexibility to address requests from civil authorities.

"To bring 40 states, D.C. and the territories together takes a team of teams to represent the American people on this all-important day," Raines said.

Army Lt. Col. Julie Shelley, who served as the Task Force Reserve commander for the inauguration, is the 372nd Military Police Battalion commander with the D.C. Army National Guard. 800 service members in total," Shelley said. "There is a great deal of coordination required to get the service members and all their equipment here and staged, not to mention space for them to bed down, and space to train, both independently as organic units and as a combined force.

"I am fortunate to have great leadership teams from the other states, especially the noncommissioned leaders that are likeminded when it comes to soldier care and mission focus," she said. "These soldiers and Airmen have proved they are willing to put in the long hours and hard work required to meet those expectations. I'm proud of how quickly they came together and developed a sense unity for this mission. I believe they understand what an important role they play in keeping the citizens safe. I hope every one of them realize they are a part of this country's history."

While at one of the several locations used as a staging area for Guard personnel, Nordhaus talked with Pfc. Perry Solinski, a signal operations support specialist with the D.C. Guard's 74th Troop Command. Solinksi was working as a radio telephone operator in the joint task force's operations center. "It's incredible being able to come together in a nationwide effort to support the peaceful transition of power," Solinski said. "It shows the true operational capabilities of the National Guard and allows us to serve our country as we've been trained to do."

At 430,000 members strong, the National Guard is the primary combat reserve of the Army and the Air Force focusing on defending the nation, protecting the homeland and building partnerships. Most Guardsmen serve in a part-time capacity, balancing civilian jobs and family responsibilities.

Tech Sgt. Aidan Chance Gipson, a station captain for the 153rd Airlift Wing's Fire Department, Wyoming National Guard, told Nordhaus and Raines that this was his first time in the nation's capital.

"Every mission, or deployment, provides an opportunity to put yourself out there to try and learn new things, but this one, especially, has been amazing to see so many people from the community come together for the nation," Gipson, who is also a civilian firefighter, said. "I think it has been the perfect snapshot of the military — everyone's skill sets, both professionally and personally, have been used at some point. I'm very thankful to have had a part in this."

"Our task force is comprised of the district's military police battalion, and we are very grateful to be supported by soldiers and Airmen from Idaho, Indiana, Louisiana, Tennessee and Wyoming — over

Seasonal Affective Disorder

Signs and Symptoms

Not everyone with SAD has the same symptoms, but they can include:

- Sad, anxious, or "empty" feelings
- Feelings of hopelessness, guilt, worthlessness, or helplessness
- Loss of interest or pleasure in activities you used to enjoy
- · Fatigue and decreased energy
- Difficulty concentrating, remembering details, and making decisions
- · Thoughts of death or suicide

Seasonal Affective Disorder (SAD) is a condition in which some people experience a significant mood change when the seasons change. SAD is not considered a separate disorder but is a type of depression.

- Oversleeping
- Overeating, particularly with a craving for carbohydrates
- Weight gain
- Social withdrawal (feeling like "hibernating")
- Difficulty sleeping
- · Lack of appetite
- Irritability and agitation
