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New museum would allow more of FAM collection to be displayed

The Frontier Army Museum has been a staple of Fort Leavenworth since 1959. The prefabricated 1941 Quonset building it is currently housed in was never intended for a museum. It is bursting at the seams with artifacts that highlight early Army and pioneer history, from the creation of the post in 1827 to the present day.

Due to the size and type of building, the public is only able to see about a quarter of the museum's collection, said FAM Museum Specialist Megan Hunter.

Hunter said some interesting artifacts are stuck in storage, in part due to space constraints. As examples, Hunter listed the 34-star flag that flew when the state of Kansas joined the union; a painting of prominent scholar Col. Arthur L. Wagner, who served on Fort Leavenworth from 1885 to about 1896; and the fire-

Fire protection organization offers **Memorial Day grilling safety tips**

For many of us, Memorial Day weekend marks the unofficial start of summer, when many people dust off their grills to celebrate the holiday and prepare for outdoor cooking in the warmer months ahead.

As they do, the National Fire Protection Association offers important safety tips and guidelines to help ensure that the grilling season remains fire-safe.

"Cookouts and outdoor grilling can be a great way to spend time with friends and family, but they do present potential risks," said Lorraine Carli, vice-president of Outreach and Advocacy at NFPA. "Over Memorial Day weekend and throughout the summer, we want everyone to be aware of where and when grilling fires tend to happen, along with steps they can take to help prevent them."

NFPA data show that between 2019 and 2023, gas grills were involved in an average of 9,287 home fires per year, including 4,682 structure fires and 4,605 outdoor fires. In roughly one-fifth (20 percent) of these fires, the grill had not been cleaned. In addition, an annual average of 21,682 patients went to emergency rooms because of grill-related injuries between 2020 and 2024, according to data from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission. "By following simple safety precautions, people can greatly reduce the risk of grilling fires and associated risks," Carli said.

For propane grills, check the gas tank for leaks. Watch NFPA's video on how to check for leaks at https://www.youtube.com/ watch?v=mpDhUssEgP0.

Keep your grill clean. Make sure to remove all grease and fat buildup from the grills and the trays below.

Place the grill far from your home, deck railings, eaves or overhanging branches.

Before lighting your gas-powered grill, always make sure the lid is open.

Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the grilling area.

If using starter fluid with charcoal

grilling, only use charcoal starter fluid. Never add charcoal fluid or any other flammable liquids to the fire once it's been lit. When done grilling, let the coals cool completely before disposing them in a metal container.

Never leave a grill unattended when in use.

Army introduces new fitness test

FORT MEADE, Maryland — The U.S. Army officially adopts the Army Fitness Test as the new test of record for soldiers starting June 1.

The change will replace the Army Combat Fitness Test and introduce updated scoring standards that emphasize readiness and combat effectiveness.

Soldiers will have until Jan. 1, 2026, to meet the new AFT requirements without facing adverse actions. Activeduty soldiers in 21 designated combat specialties must additionally meet the more rigorous combat standard of a minimum score of 350 points total, with a minimum of 60 points in each event. National Guard and Reserve soldiers in those same specialties will have until June 1, 2026, to meet these requirements. The passing score for all other specialties is 300 points, with a minimum of 60 points in each event. Active Guard Reserve soldiers and those mobilized on orders exceeding 60 days must meet the Jan. 1, 2026, suspense.

'The AFT is designed to improve soldier readiness and ensure physical standards (and) prepare soldiers for the demands of modern warfare," said Sgt. Maj. Christopher Mullinax, senior

enlisted leader, deputy chief of staff for Operations, Army Headquarters. "It emphasizes holistic fitness over eventspecific training and is grounded in performance."

The decision to replace the ACFT with the AFT follows 18 months of analysis and feedback from thousands of test iterations. The Army describes the change as a data-driven reform focused on consistency and combat-effective fitness.

The AFT is a five-event assessment, including the three-repetition maximum deadlift, hand-release push-up, sprint-drag-carry, plank and two-mile run. While similar in structure to the previous test, the standing power throw event is no longer a requirement.

"We eliminated the standing power throw because it wasn't effectively promoting fitness and readiness as well as we would like," Mullinax said. "Furthermore, it presented an elevated risk of overuse injury and encouraged soldiers to focus on technique rather than demonstrating true power."

The new test raises expectations, particularly for soldiers in combat roles. The updated scoring tables are standardized, and combat standards are sex-neutral for the 21 direct combat roles, a change designed to ensure fairness and operational readiness.

"We're a 'Be All You Can Be' Army, and that means if you've got the heart, the grit and the drive to meet our toughest standards, you belong in the fight," Mullinax said. "It doesn't matter who you are, what matters is that you want it and you're willing to earn it. The battlefield doesn't care about anything but performance, and that's what we're built to deliver."

Additionally, the AFT supports the Army's broader Holistic Health and Fitness initiative, or H2F, which aims to build a culture of lifelong fitness and well-being for soldiers.

Mullinax emphasized that the new approach isn't just about changing exercises, but about transforming the Army's mindset around fitness.

"I'm fully confident the AFT meets the Army's fitness needs; it's built on data, focused on combat readiness, and raises the bar where it matters," Mullinax said. "However, our goal is not to lock in a single solution, but to foster a culture of lifelong fitness, learning and adaptation to prepare our soldiers for the demands of today's missions and the future fight."

Army influences aviator sunglasses to camo everything

Fashion is a popular style or trend that often includes rare, high-priced wearable art, while the military prides itself on utilitarianism, a calling born of necessity while wearing clothing designed for heavy wear and tear.

It may come as a surprise, therefore, that the U.S. Army's fondness for design extends to more than just the most updated lethal weaponry, vehicles and warfare tactics. Its impact on fashion can be seen daily worldwide, without the consumer realizing its history.

Here are five major fashion items inspired by the U.S. Army.

Aviator sunglasses

From the runway to faces around the globe, "aviator" sunglasses were initially developed for Army Air Corps pilots prior to World War II. These sunglasses have their distinctive shape for much more than fashionable reasons. The design protected the eyes of pilots from 360-degree sunlight, as well as covered the entirety of the eye socket for even more shielding from the sun's rays.

Cotton T-shirts

This favorite go-to clothing item became a fashion staple following the return of soldiers from World War I. Before then, the cotton T-shirt was exclusively an underwear item and was not believed appropriate for wear on its own in public. Tens of thousands of soldiers were issued the cotton T-shirt as an undershirt for their uniforms. Returning home from war, these heroes began wearing the cotton Tshirt solo when out and about.

Combat boots

Initially designed for soldiers to protect their feet and ankles while marching through unknown and treacherous terrain, the combat boot has been incorporated into the collections of countless designers. Its adoption by the civilian population gained prominence as a symbol of protest with the punk movement of the 1980s. Its influence on fashion continues today, with iconic design house Prada continuing to update its longstanding line of combat-inspired footwear.

As part of a community outreach event to promote good health, team members from Smith Dental Clinic visited the installation's three elementary schools last week to talk with kindergartners about the importance of dental hygiene.

"We try to come out on a regular basis to talk to kids, particularly from military families in our local community, about dental health. If kids start brushing and taking care of their teeth at a young age, they will have fewer dental problems in adulthood," said Capt. Kyle Wilson, Smith Dental Clinic officer in charge.

Wilson said fewer dental problems means healthier military families.

Wilson's presentation included an inter-

active children's story about a lion that didn't take care of its teeth. As the students followed along with the story, they copied the technique demonstrated by Wilson to teach the lion how to brush and floss, which brought smiles and laughs all around.

"We love spending time with the kids and getting their energy and excitement up about teeth and how to take care of them," Wilson said.

Using an oversized toothbrush and a giant model of a mouth, Dental Specialist Spc. Paul Gekonge demonstrated techniques in a fun and interactive way.

"Healthy teeth are part of a healthy body, and good habits start early," Gekonge said.

The team provided informational kits for children to take home to parents, highlighting key dental care tips.

Tips shared included:

• Brush twice a day with fluoride toothpaste, especially

before bed.

• Floss once a day, even for young children. Parents should help until age 8–10.

• Limit sugary snacks and drinks, which can lead to cavities.

• Visit the dentist every six months for cleanings and exams.

• Watch for signs of tooth grinding or jaw pain, which can affect developing teeth.

Wilson said that baby teeth matter since they hold space for adult teeth and help with speech and chewing. Regular dental check-ups should begin early.

"The American Dental Association typically recommends parents take their children to the dentist as soon as their teeth appear," Wilson said.

While Smith Dental Clinic only treats

fighting gear for former Fort Leavenworth Fire Department Assistant Chief/Chaplain Michael Kuk.

According to Hunter, each of these items carries a story that the public should be able to learn about.

"Currently in our holdings, we have just over 4,600 items in our collection; off the top of my head, about 4 percent is actually on display at any point in time."

The 34-star, Civil War-era U.S. flag is housed in flat storage that contains flags of various sizes and ages. The flag represents Kansas joining of the Union in 1861, and it was officially in use from July 4, 1861, to July 3, 1863. It flew at the headquarters of Brig. Gen. George Crook, a prominent Union military officer, in 1864 around Richmond, Fayette Court House, Brownstone, and other Civil War campaigns. Currently, the flag must stay in storage due to its size, age and fragile state. Hunter said old flags need to be displayed in special casing to help protect them from light pollution and dust.

The oil painting of Wagner has also been relegated to the collection archives. As a pioneer of early Army education, Wagner helped make Fort Leavenworth a center for military education. He played a pivotal role in shaping the Army's tactics in warfare in the late 19th and 20th centuries. Although not much is known about the origins of the painting, Hunter said it likely hung in a hall for many years before being moved to storage to be preserved. The painting underwent a restoration in 1979. The last time it was on display was in 2015.

Kuk donated his firefighter turnout gear to the museum in 2000. Hunter said the more modern-era gear helps build on the story of Fort Leavenworth and shares the story of those who have lived and served on the installation. In December 2001, Kuk wore the gear to fight the St. Ignatius Chapel fire, which completely destroyed the Catholic church.

New museum

These artifacts, representing more than 100 years of history, are only a small portion of the museum's collection. A new museum is currently being developed that will allow for more of the FAM collection to be on display, and more.

"A new facility, not actually being inside an artifact itself, would be very helpful," Hunter said. "That will help allow us to have improved HVAC facilities, fire suppression, all those little kind of boring details, but also very important details when it comes to functioning museums."

Modern museums can offer many high-tech features that not only keep artifacts safe but also allow visitors to see them.

"A new facility will allow us to customize how we want to display things. It will allow us to lay things out in a more strategic manner," Hunter said. "It will allow us to have better facilities — we'll have HVAC systems that control heat and temperature fluctuations. We'll have a cleaner air system that helps prevent any air pollutants in it."

Navy veteran George Pettigrew, chairman of the Fort Leavenworth Museum Project Committee, is currently in the process of bringing the new museum to Fort Leavenworth. Pettigrew said his mission of helping to get a new museum funded and built will give the community easier access to thousands of artifacts.

The current museum's limited size and age prompted the new museum project. Pettigrew said a conversation a few years ago about the new museum started with a discussion with former Combined Arms Center Deputy to the Commanding General Michael Formica and his wife, Kimberly. Pettigrew said that during Kimberly Formica's volunteer time at the museum, she noted the building was in need of upgrades and repairs.

"There were so many limits on the future of that museum, and I later found out that it was one that was impossible to retrofit. It could not come up to where the standards are today," Pettigrew said. Pettigrew said the new museum will be located outside the gates, positioned between Grant and Sherman gates, allowing easier access to the public. It will feature 28,000 square feet of exhibit space, as well as space for other uses such as conferences and classes. He said this purpose-built museum will allow the museum staff to curate a broad range of collections, allowing visitors to learn more about military and pioneer history, highlighting Fort Leavenworth's role as the Gateway to the West.

Pettigrew said the Fort Leavenworth Museum Project Committee is working with FAM, the U.S. Army and outside agencies to develop a building plan that will not only keep the artifacts safe, but will also make engaging storytelling possible.

Pettigrew said the new museum will also broaden educational opportunities available to both higher educational institutions and school districts. Currently, FAM hosts students from the Command General Staff College and School of Advanced Military Studies, as well as local and regional school districts and organizations. Hunter said groups sometimes travel from neighboring states to learn about

frontier military history, and the museum staff helps curate educational materials based on lesson plans teachers are using.

Pettigrew said the outside of the building is projected to have large glass walls with special UV protection that allow for natural light but will also protect artifacts. The building will rise in height 50 feet from the east side of the building to the west, symbolizing westward expansion. Hunter said this type of small detail will help push the new museum to the top of museums nationwide.

"When you walk up to the building, the view of the outside of the building is as much of an experience as it is inside," Hunter said.

The area will include native plants and grasses that are not only good for the environment but are also low maintenance, and the landscaping will help visitors envision what the area looked like when settlers arrived.

"We wanted it to look like it looked 200 years ago, or accurate to the frontier," Pettigrew said.

The committee plans to preserve historic Native American sites on the land, as well as potentially offer a Pow Wow site to allow indigenous people to continue to honor their

ancestors.

Pettigrew said the committee is hoping to open the new museum in conjunction with the Fort Leavenworth Bicentennial in May 2027. Construction will take 18-20 months, and the completed the museum will be 90,000 square feet and 500 feet long.

Pettigrew said preserving both Army and pioneer history is an important part of the legacy of Fort Leavenworth, and that the artifacts and the hard-working individuals they represent play an important part in telling shared history.

"We need to understand how challenging it all was and not to take it for granted," Pettigrew said.

convenience and immediacy in communication offered by text messaging, many people are more likely to readily che ressages and respond quickly as compared to email or answering a phone call. As ophercriminals and scammers are we ted with the most effective means to communicate with unsuspecting victums, and due to the proliferation of cell phone imately 310 million in the U.S. as of 2024), sending a convincing scam via text can be an effective method fi elements to engage unsuspecting individuals. A single reply by one victim can net a cybercriminal hundreds or ev vids of dollars; the potential amounts are even higher with multiple replies.

To add authenticity, scammers often draft a convincing text message purported to come from an official local, state, federal agency. Some common scam themes include:

- IRS Sc gency. Some common scam themes include: **IRS Scam** - Often seen during tax season, IRS themed messages reques personal information to process a refund or recalculate tax amounts. Pay might be requested to allow the recipient of the taxt to avoid prosecution or having their social security number canceled.
- Social Security Scam Frequently targeting older adults, Social Sec scams often revolve around overpayment, suspension of benefits, requests for additional information necessary for a payment increase.
- U.S. Postal Service Using notification of an incoming package, scammers request recipients to click on a provided link which then leads to a website requesting personal or financial information.
- Speeding and Parking Ticket Scams This scam involves a text indicating recipient's vehicle was exceeding the speed limit or parked illegally, and a citation was issued; it then requests payment to avoid a court appearance.
- Jury Duty Text Scam Seemingly sent from a court with a claim the recipient missed jury duty and is required to pay a fine or provide personal information to avoid jail time or fines.
- Other Government Agency Scams Within a month of the establishm the Department of Government Efficiency (DOGE), scammers began targeting government personnel with DOGE themed scams.

- Bear in mind that the IRS does not text taxpayers; the IRS contacts taxpayers through the U.S. Postal Service unless in special circumstances wherein taxpayers would be contacted by phone.
- Do not click on links received in text messages, or reply to text messages, if the sender is unknown or the message

REAL ID is a federal security credential added to State-Issued Driver Licenses and Identification Cards that establishes a minimum security standard required for specific activities.

Safely dispose of old and expired medications before your move.

Munson Army Health Center's medication disposal receptacle is located in the pharmacy lobby near Window No. 1 for patients to discard the majority of their unused medications.

Several exclusions apply, including syringes, needles, and liquids greater than 4 ounces.

If a dangerous medication is on the FDA Flush List and a drug take-back program is not available, patients can dispose of the medication by flushing it down the toilet to avoid misuse and accidents.
