1st part of multi-phase project includes tennis, pickleball courts

Phase 1 of a multi-phase, multi-year improvement project to Grant Park has begun.

Grant Park encompasses the area around Grant Pool from Pope Avenue to Kearney Avenue between the residential access drives off Grant and McClellan Avenues.

Fences have been set up to mark the perimeter of the project, with signs on the fences to alert everyone to the work that will be beginning soon.

Phase 1 of the \$2.1 million Garrison-funded project is estimated to be complete by spring 2025. It includes the construction of four pickleball courts, a covered pavilion by the pickleball courts with electrical outlets, a tennis court, barbecue grills, lighting, regrading of an area for a future soccer field, a concrete walking path with benches and more.

"The (covered pavilion) is between the pickleball courts, so if people want a team-building activity or child parties, or just waiting for someone else to play and they can work on their computers," said Joel Marquardt, architect in the Design Branch, Engineering Division, of the Directorate of Public Works. "We do have a few grills adjacent to that with a drinking fountain and bike racks (in that area.)"

The completed vision of Grant Park has an additional covered event shelter that could be used for cere-

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DoD announces latest efforts to improve quality of life for service members

WASHINGTON - The Defense Department has announced a new series of initiatives aimed at improving the welfare and well-being of service members and their families.

In a memorandum published Sept. 13, titled "Our Enduring Duty to America's Service Members and Their Families," Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III announced a new set of initiatives that are part of his ongoing "Taking Care of Our People" priority that began three years ago.

The latest initiatives include:

• Establishing Health Care Flexible Spending Accounts for service members

 Providing greater access to free wireless internet in unaccompanied housing

• Decreasing the cost burden associated permanent-change-of-station moves

· Lowering the cost of procuring uniforms for enlisted service members

• Increasing access to affordable quality child care and early childhood education

• Expanding spouse employment and professional development opportunities through the My Career Advancement Account (MyCAA) program

· Improving quality-of-life conditions at remote and isolated installations

The new initiatives, along with initiatives over the past three years, were developed after assessing the experiences of service members. Taken together, the efforts are meant to ensure the well-being and success of service members, enabling them to better focus on their part of the defense mission.

"Early in my tenure as secretary of defense, I made taking care of our people a top priority," Austin said in the memorandum. "Doing right by our all-volunteer joint force and their families is a core readiness issue. Taking care of our people is fundamental to the department's ability to recruit and retain the most talented American patriots and to ensure that the U.S. military remains the most lethal fighting force on the planet — and it is simply the right thing to do."

Establishing Health Care Flexible Spending Accounts for service members

As part of a focus on service member and military family health, the department plans to offer service members the ability to contribute up to \$3,200 in pre-tax earnings to pay for eligible healthcare-related expenses through a Health Care Flexible Spending Account, or HCFSA.

With the HCFSA, service members will be able to contribute up to \$3,200 each year in pre-tax dollars to their accounts and end that money on things such as insurance co-payments and cost shares, deductibles, braces and other orthodontia, glasses and contact lenses, prescription drugs, and wellness treatments such as acupuncture, massage, and chiropractic care. It's expected that the HCFSAs will be available to service members for the first time in March 2025.

The new effort extends TLE from 14 days to 21 days for moves within the continental United States. For moves that originate outside the continental U.S., TLA will be extended to as many as 60 days on the departure side to match the 60 days already authorized on the arrival side. Both the TLE and the TLA allow service members and their families to live in temporary quarters, such as in hotels, while looking for homes at their new duty station, or after they have checked out of their homes at their existing duty stations.

In November 2021, for instance, Austin kindergarten at Department of Defense

Education Activity schools, and the creation of dependent care flexible spending accounts to enable service members with dependents to set aside up to \$5,000 in pretax income through payroll deduction for eligible dependent care expenses such as child care, preschool, before or after school programs, and summer camp. The March effort also included additional support for those with exceptional family members. As part of that effort the department established a standard process to enroll and disenroll families from the program, require that support personnel make personal contact with each enrolled family at least once a year, better coordinate the way support personnel are assigned to families, and ease the transition between support personnel.

Providing greater access to free wireless internet in unaccompanied housing

To keep junior, unaccompanied service members connected to the wider world while off duty, the DoD has directed the military departments to carry out a series of pilot projects to provide wireless internet connectivity to enlisted service members who reside in military barracks.

While access to wireless internet will allow those junior service members access to personal e-mail, banking and entertainment options, the department also expects access can be used to help service members connect with mandatory online training requirements and other health- and life-related resources such as telehealth appointments, Military OneSource, and military and family life counselors.

According to department documents, the DoD has long-term plans to establish a "WiFi-connected force." For service members in unaccompanied housing, there is not expected to be any cost to access the provided internet services.

Decreasing the cost burden associated permanent-changeof-station moves

Service members make frequent permanent-change-of-station moves during their careers. To ease the burden of moving themselves and their families from one military installation to another, the department is working with partners to adjust the number of days associated with both the Temporary Lodging Expense (TLE) and the Temporary Lodging Allowance (TLA).

Lowering the cost of procuring uniforms for enlisted service members

To ensure enlisted service members are best able to maintain their uniforms, the department has directed a review of the quality of uniforms that are issued to and are available for purchase by service members. Additionally, the department has directed another review that will look at the annual clothing replacement allowance to determine not only if it is sufficient, but if there are better ways to provide that allowance to service members.

The new initiatives also include efforts to improve the recruitment, retention and working environments of DoD child development professionals; expanding eligibility for participation in the My Career Advancement Account career development program to spouses of active-duty service members serving in grades E-7, E-8, E-9 and W-3; and assessments of three remote and isolated installations via the "On-Site Installation Evaluation" process. Those three installations will be identified in the fall, with the evaluations taking place in 2025. This particular initiative advances efforts to understand capabilities and needs regarding the well-being of service members at remote and isolated installations.

This latest salvo of efforts, the third in the department's effort to improve the lives of service members and their families, comes as part of an ongoing nearly threeyear long effort which began in 2021.

addressed economic concerns faced by service members. Then, the department provided relief for the high cost of housing and housing shortages with a temporary increase to basic allowance for housing in some areas, and an extension of temporary lodging expenses where service members had a difficult time finding housing due to shortages.

At that same time the secretary also pushed to extend tour lengths for service members at both overseas and U.S.-based assignments as a way to minimize hardships associated with permanent-changeof-station moves.

In September 2022, Austin continued that effort by directing a review of basic allowance for housing to ensure what was being paid to service members accurately reflected fluctuations in the housing market, and also directed increases in basic allowance for housing for active-duty service members in 28 military housing areas that had experienced an average of more than 20 percent spike in rental housing costs.

The September 2022 effort also included direction to fully fund DoD commissaries as a way to cut register prices with a goal of providing service members a 25 percent savings over private sector grocery stores, and also directed creation of a "Basic Needs Allowance," which began in January 2023, to supplement the incomes of qualifying service members.

The cost of household moves was also addressed by Austin's September 2022 memorandum, which directed a permanent increase to standard TLE. Also included was an increase to the dislocation allowance for service members up to E-6 to offset the personal expenses associated with a permanent-change-of-station move.

Increasing access to affordable quality child care and early childhood education

In a memo from March 2022, Austin directed implementation of universal pre-

Expanding spouse employment and professional development opportunities through the My Career Advancement Account

The department's March 2022 effort also addressed the challenges of ensuring military spouses can find meaningful employment. Through the My Career Advancement Account program, for instance, eligible military spouses became eligible for up to \$4,000 in financial assistance to earn a license, certificate or associate degree.

Advancing military spouse employment efforts, the president in January 2023 signed into law an amendment to the Servicemembers Civil Relief Act, which requires that professional licenses be portable, except for licenses to practice law, for service members and their spouses as they move between states.

This year's campaign serves as a call to action to increase connection, safety and hope across the greater military community. Over the last several years, the DoD has taken unprecedented actions toward addressing this critical public health crisis, including the establishment of the Suicide Prevention and Re-Independent sponse Review Committee. The SPRIRC, which was comprised of a panel of outside experts, made more than 100 recommendations to the DoD to improve its suicide prevention and response programs.

In support of the work done by the SPRIRC, the DoD is implementing actions across five lines of efforts, including fostering a supportive environment for service members, improving the delivery of mental health care, addressing stigma and other barriers to care, revising existing suicide training, and promoting a culture of lethal means safety.


"Taking care of our military community is our top pri-

ority," said Elizabeth Foster, executive director of the Office of Force Resiliency. "We are committed to reducing the number of deaths by suicide throughout our Armed Forces, and will

continue to aggressively implement the SPRIRC recommendations as approved by the Secretary of Defense to build a foundation for long-term progress."



monies and other activities, an open area that could be used for extra seating or flying disc and other games, a soccer field, a basketball court, a sand volleyball court, a children's natural play area and splash pad with covered picnic tables for shade, a restroom, and eventually an improved swimming pool and parking area. The aging storm sewer will also be updated during the project.

Sidewalk paths will be six- to eight-feet wide, and steep slopes will be reduced with easier-to-use stairs connecting the park to the residential access drive. The completed park will be lit in several areas, including the courts and sidewalk path, which meanders throughout the park in a figure eight pattern and will allow users to log a mile if the path is completed twice.

Those improvements are slotted to be tackled in Phases 2-5, which are dependent upon funding and other factors before they can begin. Plans are also subject to change as the project progresses.

this is going to encourage kids to get outside, and we all know that there's too much time on computers for young people, and if you have a draw of some unique exercise spaces (like Grant Park), I think that is going to be very healthy for the group," Marquardt said.

He said he and other members of the DPW team considered ways the space might be used and incorporated those considerations into the design. Examples he gave included an area for cornhole and a fire pit or platform located near a gathering area, with attention to how sound and smoke would travel while protecting views, and placement of the restroom closest to the children's areas where the facility might be needed quickly and often. "We are definitely excited about (the project) and see potential for a healthy environment," he said, noting that parts of the area have not been inviting or useful for some time.

It's our hope to get the wider community involved, and we would like to open this up as a service opportunity for local organizations that may share our interest.



The number of trees each group is responsible for will be scaled to their age and ability, and additional adult supervision can be provided with some advance coordination, if

needed. All ages and ability are welcome, but volunteers are encouraged to be mindful of their own limits on uneven terrain. All materials will be provided.

The project's kick off will be at 9 a.m. Sept. 28, celebrated as National Public Lands Day, and work will continue at 9 a.m. every Saturday until all of the trees are planted, with workdays most likely on Oct. 5, Oct. 12, and potentially Oct. 19, depending on how many volunteers participate. In the event of bad weather, that workday will be cancelled, and an additional Saturday will be added on to the end of the timeframe. Groups and/or individuals are, of course, more than welcome to come for as many or as few workdays as they are available - it would not have to be a four-day commitment.

FLFHC issues pet policy reminder

by Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities

In response to several instances of off-leash pet complaints, Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities reminds residents of the housing pet policy, outlined in the FLFHC Resident Guidelines and Community Handbook.

• Pets must be on a physical leash at all times when outside the fenced area of a home. Electronic leashes and electronic fences do not meet this requirement.

• Residents must dispose of pet waste daily in their fenced backyards.

• Pets can be housed in the resident's yard only when a fence meeting community guideline is installed. Pets cannot be tied or staked out-

• Pets must have suitable shelter from inclement weather and have continuous access to food and fresh water. Suitable shelter is deemed to be a structure of sound construction, sufficient to provide shade from sun and protection from rain and wind. Inclement weather is described as excessive wind, rain, snow or temperatures above 80 degrees Fahrenheit or below 50 degrees Fahrenheit.

- Don't ride your bicycle on Grant Avenue, use the sidewalk. Always walk your bike through crosswalks.










- You may ride on all sidewalks but should warn pedestrians as you approach (a bell or horn is encouraged) and always yield right-of-way to pedestrians.


