

# IO professionals receive Order of Hermes honors

Four instructors from the Information Operations Qualification Course received the Information Professionals Association Order of Hermes in a surprise ceremony Nov. 15 in DePuy Auditorium.

Former Force Modernization Proponent Center Director and Information Professionals Association Executive Director Chip Bircher presented the Silver Order of Hermes to Calvin DeWitt, Robert Foley and Philip Martin in front of faculty and students attending the fall IOQC graduation. Bircher also presented the IPA's Rising Star Award to Maj. Andrew Thomas.

The IPA is a partnership of information

professionals focused on the study, advancement and application of informationrelated activities and technologies to achieve specific, predictable effects. The Order of Hermes, named for the messenger god in Greek mythology, is IPA's honorary award recognizing individuals for exceptional service and contributions in the field of cognitive security. Individuals from military, government, civilian or private sector positions (including academia, international or non-governmental organizations) are eligible for the award.

Bircher said the four IOQC instructors are the IPA's first awardees from Fort Leavenworth.

# Original member of post's DA Police force retires

Guzman honored for 22 years with DA Police, 35 years federal service

Department of the Army Police Officer Juan Guzman is retiring next week after 22 years on the DA Police force and 35 years of government service.

Guzman is known for his sense of humor - he had a green pig toy in his patrol car until an ICE comment forced its removal and his reliability — his co-workers have said that he has to practically be forced to use leave time and that he is who they want by their side when things go badly. He's also well known in the community for his devotion to community policing.

Cpl. Jonathan White, Headquarters, U.S. Disciplinary Barracks Battalion (Corrections), hands bags filled with potatoes, celery, rolls, pies and other food items to Spc. David Gomes, Headquarters, Midwest Joint Regional Correctional Facility Battalion (Corrections), as they help distribute Thanksgiving meals to soldiers' families Nov. 19 at the Commissary loading dock.

The meals, which also included a turkey with size determined by the number of dependents, were possible because of chapel community offerings and Commissary shoppers' donations. The Religious Service Organization organized the meal distribution and provided meals to 100 soldiers, selected by need/rank by their command teams, from the Army Corrections Brigade, Medical Department Activity, Special Troops Battalion, Staff Judge Advocate and Kansas City Recruiting Battalion. Volunteers from several units and organizations, including the RSO, Association of the United States Army, Fort Leavenworth Spouses' Club, Sergeant Audie Murphy Club, Fort Leavenworth Commissary and chapel community helped with the distribution.

The RSO will distribute holiday meals for soldiers again Dec. 17.

# LTC emphasizes attitude, effort during visit with elementary school students in his hometown

While on leave to visit his family in Los Angeles Nov. 7, Lt. Col. Michael Wechsler, who works for the vice provost for academic affairs at Army University, spoke to elementary school students about his service to the nation.

Wechsler's mother, Dr. Debora Wechsler, works as the resource specialist for Nora Sterry Elementary School in Los Angeles, California, and coordinated to have her son visit the school to speak with the children.

The school's principal, Dr. Sara Lasnover, liked the idea so much that she scheduled two separate school assemblies so that all of the students had an opportunity to interact with Lt. Col. Wechsler.

During the first assembly Wechsler addressed students in transitional kindergarten through second grade, and following his discussion, the children asked questions. The questions ranged from "How long have you been in the Army?" to "What is your favorite part of the Army?" and everything in between.

The children broke for lunch after the first assembly, and Wechsler was able to enjoy a meal in the cafeteria and play a game of kickball on the playground with the students.

Following lunch, the older students attended the assembly. This group was comprised of third through fifth graders. Similar questions followed the discussion, and time was made to ensure that everyone's voice was heard.

Nora Sterry Elementary is located near where Wechsler grew up. He saw this event as a great opportunity to share some valuable lessons with the children. Wechsler shared

his reasons for joining the Army, places he has been, what he did in school, and lessons that have stuck with him throughout his career.

While speaking with both groups of children he informed them that they are always in control of two things in their lives: their attitude and their effort.

He emphasized the importance of doing the right thing even when no one is looking, and to always do their best — perfection is not the goal; getting better every day is. He ended his discussion by reminding the children to always be kind to each other and listen to their teachers because the lessons they learn now will help them in the future.

Many of the children had never seen a soldier in uniform before and were delighted to talk to one. Wechsler said that this was an incredibly rewarding experience and looks forward to the next opportunity he will have for another such community engagement.



# **MAHC Laboratory tests well in inspection**

Munson Army Health Center's medical laboratory recently scored exceptionally well during its College of American Pathologists accreditation.

"It was a comprehensive inspection based off six checklists of 1,000 items that were inspected in our laboratory, and we passed with flying colors," said Capt. TeTeama Bennett, MAHC's laboratory manager and a medical laboratory scientist.

The two-person inspection team spent two days at MAHC examining the laboratory's records and quality control procedures to ensure the highest standard of care for all laboratory patients. They also examined laboratory staff qualifications, equipment, facilities, the laboratory safety program and overall management.

"I am so proud of the work we do in the laboratory and of the great team we have here. (The) CAP inspection serves as validation for all we do to turn out patient test results," said Jennifer Evans, MAHC's laboratory quality assurance manager. "There are thousands of CAP standards that every lab tech

must abide by every day, for each analytical instrument and each test performed. If there is any issue, the inspectors will find it."

Bennett said that CAP is the world's largest organization of board-certified pathologists and the leading provider of laboratory accreditation and proficiency testing programs throughout the civilian healthcare industry.

"This organization inspects more than 8,000 clinical laboratories of all shapes and sizes across the United States and overseas, so to maintain accreditation from them shows how well we are performing our jobs," Bennett said. "I'm extremely proud of our team

and the services they provide to our patients."

Medical laboratories perform complex tests on biological samples, like blood and tissue, that help medical providers diagnose or rule out illness. MAHC's laboratory undergoes on-site inspection every two years.

The Order of Hermes has three recognition levels: Gold, Silver and Rising Star. According to the IPA's website, the Silver Order of Hermes recognizes "Those individuals who have demonstrated the highest standards of integrity and moral character; displayed an outstanding degree of professional competence; contributed to bettering cognitive security knowledge and practice; and contributed to the promotion of cognitive security in ways that stand out in the eves of the recipient's seniors, subordinates and peers alike."

The IPA's Rising Star Award recognizes the next generation of thought and operational leaders in the cognitive security field. Thomas' "unique experience and dedication to the education of the next generation of IO leaders has left a lasting impact on the FA30 community and the cognitive security profession as a whole," Bircher said.

The IOQC is a 12-week, resident course that consists of graduate-level education designed to produce qualified information operations and military deception operators. The course focuses on producing IO and MILDEC officers with the requisite operational skills and knowledge to prevail in a multidomain fight during large-scale combat operations with emphasis on tactics, targeting and the operational process.

man said as he started his 12-hour night patrol shift Nov. 13. "Before I start (patrolling) any area that isn't populated, I like to go in the populated area first and be a presence. I like to have my window down, even though if it's rainy or cold — it shows that I'm approachable, and I can hear better."

His shift involves running radar, security checks and other police work. He said he prefers day shifts so he can interact with people and be a presence at the schools.

What he calls his "Nuyorican" accent hints at his New York and Puerto Rican roots, and that bilingual upbringing has come in handy.

'We get a lot of people who don't speak English, mainly Spanish, so I get called to the gates. Especially this year, we have a lot coming in," he said, referring to a large number of Spanish-speaking delivery drivers.

#### Career journey

Guzman said he dropped out of high school, worked a few menial jobs, then worked at a messenger service in New York City for six months before deciding to join the Army. He entered active duty in 1979, with training and service at Fort Hamilton, New York; Fort Jackson, South Carolina; and Fort Gordon (now Fort Eisenhower), Georgia, as a radio operator. He went to jump school at Fort Benning (now Fort Moore), Georgia, and then was assigned to the signal battalion at Fort Bragg (now Fort Liberty), North Carolina.

"I was the first paratrooper in the family - I guess that's why I did it."

His last jump was in 1982, the year his military occupational specialty changed and he came to work at the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks at Fort Leavenworth, where he trained as a member of the Correctional Emergency Response Team.

"I changed to a combat MOS, and things got messed up," he said about leaving signal. "So, they put me in the wrong MOS, so I wound up in corrections," he said, listing firefighter and mortician assistant as his other choices. "Believe me, it was the best thing; I loved it.

Guzman worked at the USDB until he left active duty for the Special Separation Benefit around 1990. He then worked for about a year as a corrections officer at



policing for about four years

CCA (Corrections Corporation of America), which was a detention center in Lansing, Kansas, then at the state penitentiary in Lansing for about nine years, where he added drug-detection K-9 handler to his skillset. While there, he said he was also learning how to "run with the hounds," using bloodhounds to search for missing children and escaped convicts.

In 2002, the DA Police force was established at Fort Leavenworth to augment the Military Police. At that time, many service members were deploying, or would soon be deploying, in the War on Terrorism after the 2001 terrorist attacks on the nation. Colleagues whom Guzman had worked with at the USDB and in Lansing alerted him to the opportunity, and he became part of the first graduating class of DA Police officers.

All of the others in that class have retired, or even passed away, except for classmate James Recoy, who is still with the department. Guzman said when he leaves, he'll be passing his "senior" designation of being the oldest and longestserving DA Police officer to Recoy.

"It's been a good ride," Guzman said of his 35 years of government service. "It's had its ups and downs, but mostly up."

#### **Experience and stories**

During his years with the DA Police, Guzman's duties once included conducting commercial vehicle inspections, and he was a member of the now defunct bike patrol, which was a way the DA Police and the 500th Military Police Detachment did community

"You get to talk to the people, you're approachable," he said about the benefits of the bike patrol, citing that interaction and participation at special events, such as the annual Kids' Fest to teach bicycle safety and distribute helmets, as important highlights of that form of policing. "We did almost everything as the regular patrol, except put them in the basket," he said, referring to the need to call if transport of someone was required.

During his service here, Guzman has apprehended back-toback gate runners, which involved a confused person and then a drunk driver, but he is just as likely, if not more likely, to speak of some of the blunders from over the years, such as the time a trickor-treating "gorilla" stole his bike on Halloween, which was done in jest and made him laugh, or the time he was attacked by someone and needed to use his nightstick, only to have his nightstick go flying out of his hand.

Guzman recently responded to a call "lights and sirens" at accelerated speed and avoiding another car, and he described the unfortunate result of crashing his patrol car.

"If I hit the curb I'm going to flip, so I turned the wheel to the left and I went over the curb on Dickman Avenue... say hi to the tree, missed it, missed it by inches," he said. "I called over the radio, 'Hey I crashed,' 'Anybody else involved?,' 'No, no one is involved; I'm not hurt, just my pride' ... so I turn on the lights and look around, everything is all



over the place. I got out of the car, went to walk around the car - I forgot to put it in park, I had to chase it — a little T.J. Hooker (referencing a 1980s TV police drama), jump in. It was one of those days, but I'm glad nobody got hurt. It could have been a lot, lot worse."

DA Police Lt. David Horvath has been Guzman's supervisor since April 2023. He said Guzman's storytelling is one of the things he'll miss most about him.

"I have a lot of work to do, but (listening to his stories) is worth it," Horvath said. "He just provides so much to the department."

#### Giving his best

Horvath said he thinks Guz-

man deserves recognition for his years of service to the community for many reasons.

"He's been giving his best to everyone since he's been here," Horvath said. "He is one of the most recognizable police officers on the installation. He helps the new soldiers and officers coming on, as well. There are a lot of people out there who just like to give tickets, but he is also that individual who will listen," he said, noting that Guzman figures out how to help and does so in a calm, respectful manner.

"We had a call up at the gate one day where there was an individual coming through the gate that didn't have an ID, no regis-

tration, no insurance, and he had marijuana on him," Horvath said. "(Guzman) went up there with the guards, right before the shift change, and he got into a physical altercation - the guy was fighting him — so he called over the radio (for help), so we all drove lights and sirens over there, got there, and he had already handled the situation.

"The individual was just very angry that he didn't want to get stopped, he didn't want to come on the installation, he had no reason to come onto it, he thought it was a tollbooth, and Guzman was talking to him afterwards and



asked him (why he did that), all calm like they were friends... He brought him back to the station, got a statement from him, talked to him, and they were like best friends toward the end of the day.

"So, it's crazy to see that — he can turn from 100 percent greatest person to 'Hey, I'm a police officer, I've got to do my job,' and at the end of the day still get the result of 'I'm here to help you, regardless of what you've done.'"

DA Police Lt. Monty Hutson, conservation law enforcement officer, served as Guzman's supervisor from 2018-2021 and worked with him on shifts before that.

"I always liked working with him because, on shift together, if a call comes out, doesn't matter (how severe), like a dog call, he's there; if it's a domestic, he's there. You can always count on him to be there to help you," Hutson said. "When it's bad, you want Guz on your side. He's good — he knows what he's doing, and he will take care of what he needs to take care of. He's the nicest guy you ever met, but when it comes to a situation when he has to put hands on and

fault or outside his scope, and that he appreciates having him on his team.

He also said, and Guzman will also admit, that his kryptonite is computers.

"That's the only thing I struggle with with him," Horvath said, referring to things such as timecards, e-mail and other computer-related tasks. "The computer is the only thing that can stop him, but he's great, he will work through it, (even if) it takes him a little bit longer."

Horvath said Guzman's contributions are great, so he can deal with the computer issues.

"He helps me in other ways by giving experience to the rest of my team. He's been here long enough, he's been through so many chiefs, he's been through so many supervisors," Horvath said. "People look up to him. He's been here the longest, he has a lot of experience."

Hutson said it is impressive that Guzman has maintained such a good relationship with the community over the years.

"He handles the situation and then gets ck to being the people's guy," Hutson said. "He understands. It probably helped that when he was in the military he worked corrections for so many years that he dealt with a lot of those guys - they are just people who made mistakes... he sees the good in them and the bad in them." Hutson recounted an incident when Guzman detained three people, by himself, when looking into a suspected robbery. "When I got there, he had two of them on the ground... We got it all sorted out and they were released, and they weren't happy, but it's police work - we're not trying to make people happy, we're trying to keep the place safe... (We) can't wait and ask questions and get shot at either," Hutson said. "That's why you want him on your team. He might not be the computer guru guy, and paperwork type person, but when stuff goes down, you want Guz there, he can handle it." Guzman will be honored by his coworkers, colleagues and friends with a luncheon Nov. 21 at the Frontier Conference Center Solarium, with the meal at noon and ceremony following at about 1 p.m. His last day on the job will be Nov. 25.

The Department of the Army Police established themselves at Fort Leavenworth in March 2002 to supplement the post's Military Police force.

DA Police supervisor Capt. James Dyson said that plans to add the force to Fort Leavenworth were in the works before Sept. 11, 2001, but that new security concerns added urgency to its implementation.

"Sept. 11 really drew attention to the need for an auxiliary security force of some sort," he said. "We can't depend on the National Guard to be here and secure the gates all the time. And the MPs don't have the personnel to do the gates and their own duties. We provide a professional law enforcement contingent that can augment or take over a variety of security duties."

Maj. John Whittamore, Fort Leavenworth provost marshal, was instrumental in implementing the DA Police force on the post.

"The DA Police force on Fort Leavenworth is the future of our law enforcement," Whittamore said. "The 500th MP Detachment that I belong to is a deployable unit. If we go, who provides law enforcement to the communitv?

"My goal has always been not just looking to have people that can check IDs at the gate, but people who can be viable law enforcement patrols for the community. So, if we do deploy, then this community continues to function with the same level of service that we're providing them, without interruption."

"Maj. Whittamore had great foresight in implementing the DA Police force at Fort Leavenworth," Dyson said. "If he had simply hired gate guards, they would have been restricted to only performing gate security. We can do everything the military police can do. If MPs get deployed from here, then we can step right in without missing a beat." DA Police are federal employees and work in conjunction with all other law enforcement entities on Fort Leavenworth. The DA Police supervisor reports directly to the provost marshal. Besides performing routine military police duties, DA Police also provide increased manpower in case of an emergency situation or a rise in force protection

condition.

"We do all the activities that the military police do. We conduct patrols, traffic enforcement, gate security, incident response, search and seizure and all other law enforcement duties," Dyson said.

The Fort Leavenworth DA Police currently consists of 19 personnel, with another seven slots in the process of being filled. Extensive background checks are required before employment. Dyson hopes that eventually the force can be expanded to 60 officers.

Although Dyson said that the ideal DA Police officer candidate already has a law enforcement or corrections background, it is not a prerequisite. and assist whenever The DA Police provide needed," Dyson said. their own training with a four-week law enforcement training seminar (police academy) and an additional 12 weeks of follow-up on-the-job training under the supervision of experienced officers. Police academy training includes familiarization with the Uniform Code of Military Justice, law enforcement techniques and procedures, equal opportunity regulations and unarmed selfdefense. Officers must also qualify with a 9mm pistol, M16A2 rifle and a shotgun, and be exposed to chemical agents used for riot control. "Most of our officers have corrections backgrounds, but we also have several from law enforce-

ment, including former military and civilian police officers," Dyson said.

Dyson, a 32-year retired veteran of the Leavenworth Police Department, brings a wealth of experience and knowledge to the job. He is also a certified bomb technician who worked with the military on numerous occasions during his career with the LPD.

Currently, DA Police can be seen in patrol cars on post. They wear navy blue uniforms with insignia clearly identifying them as Department of the Army Police. They have the same authority as MPs on post, and their jurisdiction ends at the front gate.

"We're here to help "Hopefully soon we'll be up to full staff. We are law enforcement officers, and the public may see us out patrolling, and even giving out tickets. We're here to do whatever needs to be done to ensure the safety and security of Fort Leavenworth, service members and their families and all who live and work on this post." Fort Leavenworth is only one of a handful of posts that has a DA Police force. Schofield Barracks, Hawaii, was the first to acquire such a force in 1991. Redstone Arsenal, Alabama; Fort Hood, Texas; Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri; and Fort Gordon, Georgia, are among other military installations with a DA Police presence.

do what he has to do, he does his job, and you can count on him for that."

Hutson reiterated that Guzman's method of operation is helping people.

"Like when he stops somebody, he tries to get the story behind it first, and then he talks to them about it and he tries to figure out what the issues are before he starts writing tickets," Hutson said. "A lot of times he won't write the ticket because he understands what's going on, he tries to help them in that manner, and get it fixed."

Hutson offered the example of an expired license plate, which is a violation but one that Guzman has been known to help correct, even making sure the renewal sticker gets from the glovebox to the license plate.

"It's corrective action, with or without the ticket, it's corrective action where you correct the situation, and the individual understands," Hutson said. "He could probably write a ticket to someone and get a handshake."

Horvath said Guzman gives him straightforward and honest feedback and alerts him to issues, as well as tells him to not take the blame for things that aren't his
