Army Corrections Brigade welcomes new commander

Outgoing Army Corrections Brigade Commander Col. Kevin Payne relinquished command to incoming ACB Commander Col. Douglas Curtis in a ceremony, hosted by Army Command Corrections Commander Brig. Gen. Sarah Albrycth, July 12 on Main Parade.

"Thank you all, those here and tuning in by livestream, as we mark this significant day in the Army Corrections Brigade recognizing these two phenomenal leaders," Albrycth said. "Today's milestone in their careers is small compared to their many accomplishments - a few of which I will share — and with a combined 54 years of service excellence leading America's finest soldiers, civilians and families with integrity, professionalism and care."

Albrycth commended the brigade's soldiers for serving with dignity, determination and discipline.

"As correctional experts,

there is no space for letting personal or professional standards fall. There is no excuse for coming short of our Army values. As correctional professionals, I know of no circumstance in which these soldiers won't step up to whatever the mission requires, no matter the risk to their personal safety and their lives," she said. "These women and men often see other service members at their worst, and yet the Griffin soldiers and civilians maintain the highest of standards in every situation, no matter the harm or insult they might face. But that's expected when led by Colonel Kevin Payne, who personifies this elevated standard."

She said that in Payne's two years as ACB commander, commandant of the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks, and deputy commander of Army Corrections Command, he accomplished and excelled at many things, including establishing an ACC direct reporting unit, maintaining a 96 percent civilian hiring

rate since establishing the DRU, meeting the Title 10 inmate welfare and rehabilitation mission, overseeing new programs and increased opportunities that related to a 40 percent reduction in inmate disciplinary infraction, perfect reaccreditation audit scores for both facilities, and established the ACB Wellness

Program.

"He is not only a remarkable leader, but a steward of strategic leadership," she said. "During his time in command, Kevin provided the ACB with strategic vision and focus, inspiring everyone to critically

Fort Leavenworth will commemorate Buffalo Soldiers Day with a ceremony at 9 a.m. July 26 at the Frontier Conference Center.

Lt. Gen. Milford H. Beagle Jr., Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth commanding general, will provide opening remarks, followed by Gen. Gary M. Brito, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command commanding general, who will be the distinguished guest speaker for the event.

The ceremony will pay tribute to the contributions and selfless service of the celebrated Buffalo Soldiers who helped protect the nation's westward expansion by building roads, providing security to wagon trains, participating in significant military actions, and even serving as some of the first national park rangers.

On July 24, 1992, President George H. W. Bush proclaimed that July 28 be known as Buffalo Soldiers Day. This date memorializes the action taken by Congress on July 28, 1866, to establish the 9th and 10th Cavalry Regiments, and the 38th, 39th, 40th and 41st Infantry Regiments.

"Despite suffering the discrimination and the injustice that plagued all black Americans during the days of segregation, the members of the 9th and 10th Cavalry regiments served with pride and distinction," Bush said in In his proclamation.

Following the ceremony, guided tours and discussions about Buffalo Soldiers will be offered from 10-11 a.m. at the Buffalo Soldier Monument. The tours will be facilitated by members of the Alexander Madison Chapter of Kansas City Buffalo Soldiers, dressed in period Buffalo Soldier uniforms.

More discussions about the contributions of Buffalo Soldiers in American history will be offered from 11 a.m. to noon at the Frontier Army Museum.

All three Buffalo Soldiers Day events are open to the public. The ceremony will also be live streamed on the Fort Leavenworth Facebook page at https://www.facebook. com/USAGLeavenworth/.



Reveille, Retreat, Taps review Properly respond to daily bugle calls

Drums and bugles have long been used by the Army to direct troops in battle and signal events during the duty day. Drums fell out of favor in the 19th century, but bugle call traditions have persisted and can still be heard at most Army posts at least a few times per day.

On Fort Leavenworth, actual bugles have been replaced with recordings, concentrating the calls in areas where soldiers are likely to be gathered for duty or training and away from most on-post housing.

The first bugle call of the day is "**Reveille**," which sounds at 6:30 a.m. for the traditional raising of the national colors. The national colors in front of the Lewis and Clark Center are illuminated and are not raised or lowered on a daily basis.

At 5 p.m., when the national colors are tradition-



Follow rules for U.S. flag display

There are etiquette rules that must be followed when the U.S. flag is on display.

According to the U.S. Flag Code, Flag Day, celebrated June 14, is one of several holidays when the U.S. flag should be flown, if it is not already flown year-round.

Outdoors:

• The flag is typically flown from sunrise to sunset but can be displayed 24/7 if it is properly illuminated during the night hours.

• The flag should be taken down during inclement weather unless an all-weather flag (generally made of nylon) is used.

• When flying on an in-ground flagpole, the length of the flag should be between one-fourth and one-third the length of the pole.

• The flag should always be flown right-side up unless it signals dire distress in situations of extreme danger to life or property.

· Other flags, such as state flags, can be displayed on the same flagpole with the U.S. flag, but they must be below the national flag; other nations' flags must never be flown on the same flagpole as the U.S. flag.

• If other flags are displayed on different poles of the same height, the U.S. flag must be displayed on the viewer's left.

Indoors:

• The flag can be hung on the wall either vertically or horizontally as long as the union side is to the viewer's top left.

· During speeches, if on a pole, the flag should be placed to the speaker's right.

Half-staff days:

Flags should be flown at half-staff for the following holidays:

- Peace Officers Memorial Day on May 15
- Memorial Day (until noon) the last Monday in May

 Korean War Veterans Armistice Day on July 27

• Patriots Day on Sept. 11

 National Firefighters Memorial Day the first Sunday in October

• Pearl Harbor Remembrance Day on Dec. 7 Flags should also be flown at half-staff by

proclamation of the president of the United States or a state governor. This often occurs with the death of a primary government leader, including a president or former president, a vice president, governors or members of Congress.

Other protocols:

• The flag must never touch the ground. • The flag should never be used as a covering

ally lowered, "Retreat" and "To the Colors" are played. Weeknights at 9 p.m.,

"Taps" is played.

Service members were taught their first day in uniform what to do when these bugle calls sound. They face the flag — or toward the music if the flag is not visible - come to attention and render the hand salute for "Reveille" and "To the Colors." Service members not in uniform, civilians and family members should face the flag or music, remove any headgear and hold their right hand over the heart until the last note ends. Veterans and service members in civilian clothes also have the option to render the hand salute.

Drivers hearing the calls should pull over and stop, exit their vehicle safely and render the suitable honors. Because of safety concerns, drivers on Fort Leaven-

worth's Grant Avenue should stop and remain in their vehicles until the last note of the bugle call ends. Bugle calls have sounded at Fort Leavenworth since the post was established in 1827. Those who work and live on the historic post are encouraged to continue to

honor the national colors during the bugle calls in a safe, proper and respectful manner.

• The flag should never be used to hold or carry anything.

• The flag should never be used in such a way that would result in it being torn, dirtied or damaged.

•The flag should not have anything placed on it, attached to it or marked on it.

Retiring the

flag:

Flags that are worn or deemed unrepairable should be properly retired, preferably by burning; however, they can also be dropped off at any Veterans of Foreign Wars post or acceptable collection receptacles for proper disposal.

Documents Required for Enrollment

• If, at any time during the school year, a parent or person acting as a parent of a resident prekindergarten student moves off-post, the prekindergarten student is no longer eligible for continued pre-kindergarten attendance and will be dis-enrolled. (USD 207 Board of Education Enroll*ment Policy*, *JBC*)

Enrollment Steps (Resident, K-9)



Physicals are required for students new to Kansas schools and age 8 or younger; seventh through ninth-grade students participating in sports/cheerleading. Note: sports physicals are not be taken earlier than May 1.

• Report card from the sending school.

• Special Education/504 records, if applicable.

Age Requirements for School Entry (Kansas State Law)

· Kindergarten: Must be 5 years old on or before Aug. 31 of the school year.

• First grade: Must be 6 years old on or before Aug. 31 of the school year.

Preschool Program Requirements

Note for pre-kindergarten through ninth-grade active-duty resident rarents/guardians: If you have obtained or are anticipating gaining proof of on-post residency, there are three steps to our enrollment process. If you have any difficulty or questions about any of the steps listed below, contact Birgitta Freeman at the USD 207 Board Office, 913-651-7373. Those waiting on a local address can still apply.

· The family must maintain residency on Fort Leavenworth or be employed full-time by USD 207 for the entire academic year.

• A Proof of Residency form, provided by the housing office upon arrival, must be submitted to complete enrollment.

· Both 3-year-old and 4-year-old preschool programs operate on a half-day schedule and have set capacities.

• If classes are at capacity in your neighborhood school when enrollment is completed, you may be offered placement in another elementary building or be placed on a waiting list until an opening occurs

 3-year-old preschool: Child must turn 3 on or before Aug. 31, 2024.

· 4-year-old preschool: Child must turn 4 on or before Aug. 31, 2024.

· Students eligible for Kindergarten will not be eligible for preschool.

· Transportation to and from preschool programs must be provided by the parent/guardian.

· The parent/guardian is responsible for walking preschool students to/from the school building.

Enrollment Process (Non-Resident, K-9)

1. Refer to the USD 207 Enrollment Policy at https://go.boarddocs.com/ks/usd207/ Board.nsf/goto?open&id=8X2M44590175 to determine if your family is eligible to request enrollment at USD 207.

2. If your family meets the enrollment requirements, complete the New Non-Resident Enrollment form and submit to Birgitta Freeman at the USD 207 Board Office, 207 Education Way, or email bfreeman@usd207.org.

3. Complete the "New Student Enrollment: Account Request" to receive an e-mail with user ID and password.

4. The Online Enrollment Application link will be sent in the email.

· Families will be notified via phone in July following onsite resident student enrollment.

• Note: Non-resident students are not eligible to attend USD 207 3-year-old and 4-year-old preschool programs.

High School Enrollment (10th-12th)

· Residents of Fort Leavenworth are zoned to attend Leavenworth High School in USD 453 for grades 10-12.

• USD 207 provides transportation to and from Leavenworth High School for students in grades 10-12 at no cost. Students attending ninth grade at Leavenworth High School are provided transportation for a fee.

think and act. He not only provided good ideas and wellarticulated briefs, but Kevin also coordinated end, ways and means to achieve desired goals. Many of you had to work longer than normal hours, do more than the usual work, and maintain a greater capacity of resilience and restraint — those were not without cause."

Albrycth said Payne acted on manning challenges, environmental improvements for workers and inmates, and helping ensure that discharged inmates become better members of society.

"Now, we have (inmates) who have collectively earned 68 college degrees including nine masters, 81 Department of Labor apprenticeship certifications, 191 graduates from rehabilitative treatment groups of different offenses, and 168 rehabilitative workshop graduates," Albrycth said. "His work, and your work, all have done something to make this organization and the work done here better. Kevin's philosophy of improving the system to keep them out of the system helps contribute to low recidivism and maintaining our reputation to America."

Albrycth recognized several leaders in attendance who have helped and influenced Payne during his career. She also reflected on the loss of Capt. Alex W. Northrup, commander of Company B, USDB Battalion (Corrections), Army Corrections Brigade, who died Oct. 26, 2023, after being injured when his motorcycle was struck by a car Oct. 23.

"Let's not forget our beloved Captain Alex Northrup. Nine months ago, Colonel Payne led our Griffin family during your most difficult and challenging time," she said. "On behalf of the ACC team, thank you Colonel Payne for being there for his wife, Mrs. Jessica Northrup, and his family. We know his memory and legacy lives in our hearts and admirably in the Captain Alex Northrup Iron Griffin Award."

Payne also recognized influential leaders in attendance, including retired Col. Pat Williams and retired Col. Dwayne Wagner, whom he said impacted his life as a soldier, officer and man with their leadership, mentorship, empowerment, and agreed that handling crisis and bringing the team together following Northrup's death was one of the things that has happened over the past two years that should be mentioned.

He also listed the inactivation of the 15th Military Police Brigade and activation of ACB; transition from MTOE (Modified Table of Organization and Equipment) to TDA (Tables of Distribution and Allowances) to a Direct Reporting Unit; the USDB sesquicentennial anniversary; 313 reenlistments and extensions; the 100 percent scores by both the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks and Midwest Joint Regional Correctional Facility on their American Correctional Association triennial reaccreditation in 2024; establishment of the Army Wellness Program, which he said has become the model for all of ACC; and more, as important events.

"Although a few of the aforementioned inflection points added volatility and uncertainty to the corrections environment, what is constant is the character and competence of the soldiers and civilians on the staff," Payne said. "They are the heroes of this mission, and the soldier-civilian synergy is clearly evident. It is truly a joy to witness it every day, for they successfully answer the call 24-7/365 to ensure the safety, custody, control and rehabilitation of our inmates."

Payne said that during his time as ACB commander, he has drawn conclusions about the quality of the team, the resilience and professionalism of the unit's soldiers, and the integration of 31B military occupational specialty soldiers joining the mission with 31E corrections/detention spe-

cialists to help with manning challenges.

"Operations amongst the team of officers, soldiers and Army civilian professionals is at the highest level I have experienced in my career," he said. "Our soldiers possess incredible resilience and exceptional interpersonal skills in dealing with an inmate population that exercises world class manipulation on a daily basis... 31Es and 31Bs continue to excel in the mission at the center of corrections excellence."

Payne said the brigade was faced with a significant shortage of corrections specialists in September 2022 and had to act to avoid a year of 12-hour shifts that would have meant significant or complete reduction in vocational programs, increased risk to the installation and surrounding area, inmate population climate degradation, and soldier burnout.

"We took action and communicated our analysis to the ACC and (Office of the Provost Marshal General) staffs, and I personally briefed the deputy commandant at (U.S. Army Military Police School) early in the process," he said. "The risk level decreased and the quality of life improved for our soldiers, families and inmates. The 31Bs have performed brilliantly, are fully integrated members of our team, and we see no degradation in our daily operations."

Albrycth said Payne epitomizes the duty, justice and loyalty of the unit's motto, and has left a first-class, professional organization for Curtis.

"This brilliant leader began his military service in 1997, and in 2001, he made the wise decision to complete his enlistment with the U.S. Marine Corps to earn his commis-the best decision in his life and the we're thankful for it," she said.

Curtis, whose previous assignment was as assistant deputy chief of staff G34 provost marshal/protection, Forces Command, at Fort Liberty, North Carolina, said that as that new Marine nearly 26 years ago, he never envisioned being a colonel taking command of an Army brigade.

"Command is the highest honor and highest calling of an officer in our Army, and we are privileged to command where the Army asks us, but I am sincerely honored to be a part of this team once more," Curtis said. "Although the mission of incarcerating and rehabilitating our military prisoners is often overlooked or taken for granted by our community, it is absolutely vital for society. This mission is truthfully the culmination of both our military law enforcement and military justice systems. It ensures the ap-

propriate administration of lawful punishment, the restoration of justice for victims, and the safety and security of not only inmates and staff, but likewise our communities."

Albrycth said Curtis performs his duties with integrity, loyalty and honesty and promotes the highest standards of soldier performance and professionalism by personal example.

"He has my confidence and trust, and he will surely earn yours," she said. "I know you will ensure this mighty brigade continues to lead the way transforming and perfecting excellence. I know your command will continue to unite this organization with the common merit to accomplish the mission with respect and that each Griffin member does a job well done.

"And because you are a part of the great force in the world, you do not bare this mission alone. There are many people here to welcome you into this position and will make themselves available to you, including me. The Army Corrections Brigade remains in good hands."

Buswell comes to TPO-STE from Special Operations Command Africa, where he served as the director of Strategy, Engagements and Plans.



Service members were taught their first day in uniform what to do when these bugle calls sound. They face the flag – or toward the music if the flag is not visible – come to attention and render the hand salute for "Reveille" and "To the Colors."

RETREAT 5:00 p.m.

Service members not in uniform, civilians and family members should face the flag or music, remove any headgear and hold their right hand over the heart until the last note ends. Veterans and service members in civilian clothes also have the option to render the hand salute.

> Who will my new friends be? What will my new school look like?What activities/sports are available? What are the other kids wearing?

The Youth Sponsorship Program connects your child to another youth in the new community to answer these questions and so much more

Why should my child request a sponsor? A sponsor:

- Allows your child to get to know their community before they arrive.
- Provides them with someone who can show them the ropes in their new community.
- Helps reduce social isolation, leading to a healthier transition with reduced stress and at-risk behaviors.
- Gives youth a youth perspective of their new community and school.

Allows you to focus on other aspects of transition. knowing that your child's needs are being met.

What does the Youth Sponsorship Program provide for my child?

- Their Youth Sponsor will provide a welcome packet and information about their new community before arrival.
- Upon arrival, their Youth Sponsor will arrange for them to have a tour of the community and, once you know which school they will be attending, provide information about the school and arrange for a tour there as well.
- The program hosts various activities and events that will help your child meet new people, learn about their school and community.

How do I get a sponsor assigned to my child?

Once you receive PCS orders, contact the School Liaison Officer at your current installation.

Munson Army Health Center is currently scheduling an additional round of school physicals required for enrollment in Kansas schools.

According to Kansas law, physicals are required for students 8 years old or younger who are NEW to Kansas schools. School physicals are not required for students attending Missouri schools, only current proof of immunization, which is available from the MHS GENESIS Patient Portal or from MAHC's patient administration section.

Patients should call MAHC's appointment line (913-684-6250) weekdays from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. weekdays to check appointment availability for a required school physical.

Be aware, routine physicals not required for enrollment may be delayed, when medically appropriate, until late summer/early fall. Another round of school physicals will be announced later this summer.

Currently MAHC is not offering sports physicals for students who choose to participate in extracurricular activities. Sports physicals on their own, are not a TRICARE-covered benefit, and instead have historically been offered as a space-available service. Current staffing does not support the extra service without impacting access for our patients with acute and/or chronic health care needs.

SPORTS PHYSICALS ARE CURRENTLY UNAVAILABLE

Sports physicals are currently unavailable from MAHC at this time. While MAHC has offered sports physicals as a courtesy in previous years, the current staffing cannot support the service at this time without impacting access for patients with acute and/or chronic healthcare needs. Furthermore, MAHC cannot refer patients to the network for a sports physical, because sports physicals are not a TRICARE-covered benefit. MAHC providers may complete sports physical paperwork in conjunction with a TRICARE-covered physical, like a school physical or routine physical; however, appointments for routine physicals might be delayed, when medically appropriate, until late summer/early fall when additional providers will be on board.
