

Routine mammogram gives MAHC nurse a fighting chance

After a routine mammogram last March, a Munson Army Health Center employee learned her results were suspicious. The radiologist found a mass in the breast tissue and ordered diagnostic imaging.

Ultimately, results from a biopsy confirmed cancer.

"After I found out I cried," said Michelle Grant, a public health nurse at MAHC and a TRICARE beneficiary. "It was just surreal. I could not believe I had cancer."

Grant shared her cancer journey so that others understand the importance of regular mammograms, which are available every year without a referral through TRICARE for women aged 40-64 years old, and younger for those at higher risk.

Her diagnosis was invasive ductal carcinoma with lymph node involvement. Her treatment began soon after her diagnosis and would be administered in three phases.

First, Grant underwent a lumpectomy, to remove the mass and surrounding tissue, followed by reconstruction.

Once she healed from surgery she began chemotherapy, which uses powerful drugs to destroy any undetectable cancer cells that might have broken away.

"The recovery from surgery was rough. I was in a lot of pain. But the hardest part, so far, has been the chemotherapy," Grant said.

"As the treatment progressed, it has taken a heavier toll on my body. I never really feel quite right," she said, describing herself as tired and nauseous most days.

She said that she had heard about the nausea chemotherapy causes, but she was not prepared for how chemotherapy would change her sense of taste.

"Immediately after an infusion, I lose my sense of taste. It slowly returns, but as it does, the food tastes horrible and makes me not want to eat."

Along with the taste, hair loss and skin irritation, Grant said the feeling of isolation during her treatment is rough. Chemotherapy can weaken the immune system during treatment, so Grant stays close to home to avoid exposure to illness that her body cannot fight.

"I feel bad that I can't do all the usual things with my children, right now," she said.

After chemotherapy is complete, Grant will move on to radiation, which uses X-rays aimed directly at the part of her breast where her cancer was detected. This phase is an extra layer of precaution to eradicate any remaining undetectable cancers cells, which could allow her illness to return.

Fortunately, her prognosis is good, but will require regular follow-up.

"It is a long process, and it can be overwhelming, but now the end of treatment is in sight and things feel more manageable," Grant said, adding that before her mammogram she never had any symptoms or indication that she had breast cancer.

"Preventive care is essential. It is vital to get your routine mammogram. I am fortunate to have discovered my cancer early before it could spread and be harder to treat," Grant said.

TRICARE authorizes one mammogram every 12 months without referral to women ages 40 years old and older, and women ages 30 and older with a family history of breast cancer.



turned to their home countries and risen to the highest positions of uniformed leadership within their home countries' defense

"This is an incredibly significant day — and this induction ceremony represents the fulfillment of the potential that resides within each student in this venerable military education institution and is a direct return on the investment made jointly by our respective militaries in the professional military education of our officers," said ceremony host Lt. Gen. Milford H. Beagle Jr., CGSC commandant and Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth commanding general.

Hafizuddeain began his military career in 1985, commissioning in 1988.

He reached the pinnacle of his career in September 2023 with a promotion to general and appointment as the 30th chief of Army Malaysia.

The CGSC class of 2001 produced many successful alumni, Hafizuddeain explained, to include Chief of Staff of the Army Gen. Randy George.

He said he has kept in touch with many of his classmates who have forged historic military careers. These relationships are something he challenged the current Command and General Staff Officer Course students to create and nurture.

"I humbly stand before you today as one of the end products produced from CGSC Class 2001," Hafizuddeain said.

Sandor started his military career commissioning as an infantry officer in 1989.

He achieved the pinnacle of his career as the "Father of Hungarian Special Forces" in 2022 when he was named the first commander of the Joint Special Operations Command.

Sandor is also the first Hungarian CGSOC alumni to be inducted into the IHOF.

A scholar service member, Sandor studied three times in the United States, with his time at CGSOC being his first and most memorable stay in the United States, he said.

"The knowledge gained here and the experience of teamwork within my study group has helped me lead the formation of the Hungarian Special Operations Force and Hungarian Joint Special Operations Force in a more mature way, better prepared to face the challenges I have faced during that force development,"

Sandor said. "It was also this experience that taught me how to lead but also to encourage young, talented officers to seize the initiative because they may make mistakes, but learning from mistakes will make them better leaders and make the future army more successful."

Sandor shared that his CGSOC experience encouraged him to see the need for change and ability to answer "what if" questions to be effective and decisive leaders trusted within their formations.

In 1973, CGSC, the Kansas City Chapter of the Military Order of the World Wars, and the Alumni Association (now known as the CGSC Foundation) jointly established the IHOF.

The purpose of the IHOF is to provide a means of recognition for international graduates, who through military merit, attained qualifying positions of importance in their respective country's armed forces; or who have held an equivalent position by rank or responsibility in a recognized multinational military organization.

The IHOF has 81 different countries represented.

Each inductee's portrait hangs in the IHOF at the Lewis and Clark Center.

EPA fines military housing renovator for alleged lead-based paint violations

LENEXA, KAN. - E&J Painting LLC of Leavenworth, Kansas, will pay a civil penalty to resolve alleged violations of the federal Toxic Substances Control Act.

According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, the company does home renovation work, including work on private military housing at Fort Leavenworth, and failed to comply with regulations intended to reduce the hazards of lead-based paint exposure during renovations.

"We must protect the men and women who serve and their families from the dangers of lead exposure," said EPA Region 7 Enforcement and Compliance Assurance Division Director David Cozad. "Contractors who work in military housing must follow the law, and EPA is committed to holding them accountable when they

According to EPA, E&J Painting, which also does business as Swann Painting, failed to obtain the required certification to renovate houses built before 1978 when leadbased paints were banned for residential use. Further, the company failed to notify homeowners of the potential for lead, retain required renovation records, post signs warning people to stay outside the renovation area, and clean dust and debris from renovation work sites.

EPA learned about the violations during an October 2023 site inspection and a February 2024 records inspection. In response to the alleged violations, E&J Painting agreed to pay a \$1,495 civil penalty and has obtained the required certification to comply with federal law at future renovation

Background

Companies that perform or hire subcontractors to perform renovations must comply with regulations under EPA's Lead Renovation, Repair, and Painting program. The regulations include requirements for contractors to obtain certification from EPA before performing renovations, as well as compliance with lead safety practices, records retention, and notification to homeowners about the hazards of renovation-related lead exposure. Lead-contaminated dust from chipped or peeling lead-based paint in homes built before 1978 is one of the most common causes of elevated blood lead levels in children. Infants and children are especially vulnerable to lead-based paint exposure because their growing bodies absorb more lead than adults, and their brains and nervous systems are more sensitive to the damaging effects of lead. They can be exposed to multiple sources and may experience irreversible and lifelong health effects.

Reducing childhood lead exposure and the associated health impacts is a top priority for EPA.

EPA Awards \$175K to K-State to support national radon hotline, website

LENEXA, KAN. - The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency announced a total of \$1 million in awards to six recipients to address asthma, radon and other indoor air health risks. One of awards includes \$175,000 to Kansas State University.

These cooperative agreements will advance national policy and systems-level change to reduce indoor air risks and yield measurable environmental and public health benefits.

'With this funding, Kansas State University will continue their important work operating a national radon hotline and a website where affordable radon test kits can be purchased," EPA Region 7 Administrator Meg McCollister said. "Radon can't be seen or smelled. It is essential that we test our homes for this leading cause of lung cancer among non-smokers, especially considering that many homes in our region have a high potential for elevated radon levels."

Kansas State University will work to reduce lung cancer deaths by supporting radon testing and mitigation. This includes operating the national hotline (https://sosradon.org/Contact) and website (https://sosradon.org), conducting performance assessments of common consumer-grade digital radon monitors, selling radon test kits, and working to increase the number of credentialed radon profes-

Americans spend up to 90 percent of their time indoors, making indoor air quality a critical public health issue. For example, radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States, and asthma affects 25 million Americans, including nearly 5 million children, with poor and minority children suffering a greater burden of the disease.

These new awards will help efforts to:

• Prevent lung cancer by promoting testing and fixing homes, schools and other buildings with elevated radon levels.

 Prevent asthma attacks, emergency room visits and other poor asthma health outcomes by supporting delivery, infrastructure and sustainability of environmental asthma interventions at home and school, with a focus on disproportionately impacted popula-

 Prevent other indoor air problems and associated poor health outcomes through expanded support of state and local efforts to improve indoor air quality by promoting best practices and policies.

Other organizations that were awarded \$175,000 each for the first year of the three-year cooperative

agreements include the American Lung Association, Conference of Radiation Control Program Directors, Public Health Institute, and National Center for Healthy Housing

A map of EPA Radon Zones was developed in 1993 to identify areas of the U.S. with the greatest potential for elevated indoor radon levels, based on indoor radon measurement data, geology, aerial radioactivity, soil parameters and foundation types.
