Volunteers gathered at the Fort Leavenworth Commissary Dec. 17 to prepare and handout holiday food baskets filled with groceries for soldiers and their families.

Red Cross offers tips for how to avoid home fires this holiday season

HOME WINTER

COME FIRES CLAPPEN MORE DURING THE

WINTER THAN IN ANY OTHER SEASON.

O Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet away from heat sources.

Plug only one heat-producing appliance into an electrical outlet at a time.

Don't overload power strips -- use power strips that have internal overload protection.

Keep portable generators outside, away from windows and as far away as possible from your house.

Ensure your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are in good working order with fresh batteries.

Have a qualified professional clean and inspect your chimney, vents and heat sources annually.

Never leave heat sources unattended.

Never leave burning candles unattended.

Never plug heaters into an extension cord.

KANSAS CITY, MIS-SOURI — The holidays are a wonderful time to get everyone together. Unfortunately, this time of year can also mean a greater risk of a fire in someone's home.

This holiday season, the American Red Cross of Greater Kansas City and Northwest Missouri encourages everyone to follow simple steps to prevent home fires from holiday decorations.

"December is the peak time for home fires involving candles and holiday decorations," said JoAnn Woody, executive director of the Red Cross of Greater Kansas City and Northwest Missouri. "Help protect your family by using battery-operated candles and practicing your twominute escape plan with everyone in your household."

Holiday decorating safety tips

If you must use candles, keep them away from anything that could burn, and place them out of reach of pets and children. Never leave burning candles unattended.

Check all holiday light cords to ensure they aren't frayed or broken. Don't string too many strands of lights together — no more than three per extension cord.

Ensure outside decorations are for outdoor use, and fasten lights securely to your home or trees. If using hooks or nails outside, make sure they are insulated to avoid an electrocution or fire hazard.

If buying an artificial tree, look for a fire-resistant label. When putting it up, keep it away from fireplaces, radiators and other sources of heat. Never use electric lights on metallic trees. If getting a live tree, make sure it's fresh and keep it watered. To test if the tree is fresh, bend the needles up and down to make sure no needles fall

Don't light the fireplace html. if hanging stockings or other decorations on the mantel.

U.S. ARMY

Install smoke alarms on every level of the home and outside each sleeping area. Test them once a month and replace the batteries at least once a year. If you cannot afford to purchase smoke alarms or are physically unable to install one, the Red Cross may be able to help. 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SCHOLARSHIPS FOR MILITARY CHILDREN Fisher House Foundation accepting applications for 2025-26 academic year

FORT GREGG-ADAMS, Virginia – Fisher House Foundation's Scholarships for Military Children program is accepting applications for academic year 2025-2026 now through Feb. 12, 2025.

The program, entering its 25th year, recognizes the contributions of military families to the readiness of America's fighting force and celebrates the commissary's role in enhancing military quality of life.

Fisher House Foundation, a nonprofit

organization dedicated to helping service members, veterans and their families, administers the program. The program has awarded more than \$24,126,000 in scholarships over the last 24 years, selected from a pool of more than 123,270 applicants.

For scholarship year 2025-26, Fisher House Foundation will award 500 scholarship grants of \$2,000 each. The selection process will begin immediately following the application deadline.

"With Scholarships for Military Children headed into its 25th year, it remains an

honor and a pleasure for us at the Defense Commissary Agency to partner with a foundation so dedicated to the military community and families," said Todd Heasley, DeCA's scholarships program liaison. "It is a true blessing to see the investment in military children toward their ultimate success."

Funding for the program comes from commissary business partners and other contributions to Fisher House Foundation designated specifically for scholarship programs.

"As a military veteran and an Army father, I understand firsthand the sacrifices these incredible young people make and the determination they show in building their futures," said Marshall Banks, Fisher House Foundation director of community relations. "Thanks to the generosity of our donors and the support of our partners at the Defense Commissary Agency, this program has a profound impact on the lives of students and military families each year."

Selection qualifications are straightforward. Requirements include completing the application; submission of the student's official transcript indicating a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.0 or above on a 4.0 scale for high school applicants, or college transcript indicating a cumulative minimum GPA of 2.5 or above on a 4.0 scale for students already enrolled in college; and a 500-word essay. The subject of this year's essay is listed at the militaryscholar.org website under "Scholarships for Military Children," or at https://www.fisherhouse.org/programs/scholarship-programs/scholarships-for-military-children/.

Eligibility for the program is determined using the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System database. Applicants should ensure that they, as well as their sponsor, are enrolled in the DEERS database and have a current military dependent ID card. The applicant must also be planning to attend or already be attending an accredited college or university, full time, in the fall of 2025 or be enrolled in a program of studies designed to transfer directly into

a four-year program.

Applicants who are awarded a full scholarship to attend a college or university or receive an appointment to one of the service academies or affiliated preparatory schools are not eligible to receive funds from this program. A full scholarship is usually defined as one that provides for payment of tuition, books, lab fees and other expenses.

"Our partnership with Fisher House Foundation represents more than just a collaboration — it's a commitment to military families' futures," said Command Master Chief Mario Rivers, senior enlisted advisor to the DeCA director. "This scholarship program doesn't just offer financial aid; it opens doors for military children to pursue their academic dreams.

"I've seen firsthand how these opportunities transform lives, and I strongly encourage every eligible military family to apply," Rivers added. "This program truly embodies our dedication to supporting service members beyond their active duty—it's an investment in the next generation of leaders."

Fisher House Foundation also has a free, easy-to-use custom scholarship search engine tailored to military families called "Scholarships for Service." It's available for both mobile devices and desktop computers at https://www.fisherhouse.org/programs/scholarship-programs/.

Charity Navigator, a non-profit that assesses the cost-effectiveness and overall health of charity programs through comprehensive ratings, has rated Fisher House Foundation four out of four stars and a perfect score of 100 points. The foundation also remains one of only four military and veteran organizations with an A+ rating from CharityWatch and received the 2024 Candid Platinum Seal for Transparency again this year.




Santa to ride in DES Holiday Parade



Of the 100 soldiers receiving the holiday food baskets, 70 of them were from the Army Corrections Brigade.



Parkville wounded warrior honored with adapted home

Parkville, Missouri — A heartwarming welcome home ceremony was conducted Dec. 17 for retired Spc. Robert Buck, a decorated Army combat engineer and wounded warrior, at his new specially adapted home in Parkville, Missouri.

The event, hosted by the Texas-based nonprofit Helping a Hero, celebrated Buck's service, sacrifice and resilience as he moved into his new home.

Family, friends, veterans and community members gathered to honor Buck's journey. He sustained lifealtering injuries in a 2005 IED attack in Mosul, Iraq, and has demonstrated remarkable resilience and a dedication to serving others through his volunteer work on behalf of fellow veterans.

Buck enlisted in the Army to defend America from terrorism. He became a combat engineer and completed basic training at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri. In October 2004, Buck deployed to Mosul, Iraq, where he performed the often-deadly job of route clearance and detonating IEDs. On May 22, 2005, his Humvee struck an IED, killing two fellow soldiers and leaving Buck with burns on almost half of his body. Miraculously, he survived.

After undergoing countless surgeries at Brooke Army Medical Center at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, Buck retired in 2006. Despite his injuries, which affect his mobility, he has continued to dedicate himself to helping others. He and his wife, Janie, moved back to Kansas City, where Buck reconnected with his battle buddy, Army veteran Vinnie Morales. Morales, who served five tours of duty in the Army, was in the convoy during the attack

that injured Buck.

Morales founded the Veteran's Community Project, which builds tiny homes for veterans struggling with addiction and homelessness. Inspired by Buck's spirit of service, Morales nominated him for a Helping a Hero home.

Meredith Iler, founder of the Helping a Hero Homes Program, shared her admiration for Buck.

"Robert Buck embodies the courage, resilience and service we strive to honor through our program," she said. "This home is more than bricks and mortar it's a symbol of gratitude for his sacrifice and a commitment to ensuring he has the tools to thrive. Together, we are changing lives and showing our heroes that America stands with them."

Helping a Hero, a nonprofit dedicated to providing specially adapted homes for severely wounded veterans, has helped more than 200 heroes in 27 states rebuild their lives with accessible housing. These homes are customized to meet each recipient's unique needs, offering independence and comfort.

Buck's new home was made possible through Helping a Hero's mission, supported by donors, community members and national initiatives, such as the 100 Homes Challenge. Spearheaded by Johnny Morris, founder of Bass Pro Shops, this initiative pledges 25 percent of the cost for the next 100 homes, inviting individuals and businesses to join in honoring post-9/11 wounded warriors.

holiday-themed The welcome home ceremony had a festive atmosphere, with attendees dressed in Christmas attire and bringing gift cards to welcome

Robert and Janie to their

new home. The couple had

learned of the home's completion at a Bass Pro Shops Christmas party Dec. 12, where Helping a Hero and Morris surprised them with the announcement.

Buck expressed his gratitude during the ceremony.

"This is more than a house — it's a place where we can create new memories, heal and build a future," he said. "We're overwhelmed by the kindness and generosity of everyone who came together to make this dream come true."

In addition to building adapted homes, Helping a

Hero offers programs like marriage and caregiver retreats, recreational activities, and emergency needs grants. This holistic approach helps veterans and their families navigate the challenges of life after serv-
