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Retirees saluted with annual Appreciation Day, health fair

Area military retirees were honored at the 60th annual Retiree Appreciation Day — an event featuring informative speakers, performances by Leavenworth Junior ROTC unarmed and armed drill teams, small group performance, and a health fair offering flu shots, oral cancer screenings, and more — Oct. 26 at the Lewis and Clark Center.

As the morning's first speaker, Garrison Commander Col. Duane Mosier welcomed the retirees gathered in Eisenhower Auditorium, thanking them and their family members for their service and for attending RAD. Mosier explained that his job as Garrison commander involves rotating through roles similar to those of mayor, city manager and city planner, for which he is assisted by the Garrison command sergeant major and Garrison deputy.

Proclaiming himself as a "history geek," Mosier shared some of post's history, starting with why the post is situated where it is on what is now the Kansas side of Missouri River after Henry Leavenworth defied

orders in 1827 and placed the post in a better location on higher ground. Mosier pointed out that there are pecan trees still growing on Fort Leavenworth that were noted by the Lewis and Clark Expedition in 1804.

"Those pecan trees are still here; they are on the north side of our airfield, in a 2,500-acre virgin forest that has never been cut and is protected because Fort

The Center for Army Leadership, in partnership with the Combined Arms Center chaplain team, hosted an educational engagement with seven Republic of Korea Army chaplains Oct. 23 at Fort Leavenworth.

The purpose of the visit was to develop the ROK chaplains' knowledge of the U.S. Army profession and

Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Jared Vineyard, CAC deputy command chaplain and CAL staff chaplain (ethicist), provided the visitors with an overview of the Army ethic. Participants then exchanged personal insights and experiences in ethical decision-making, morality and advisement.

Vineyard discussed how the values and virtues of the American people have changed over time, requiring the Chaplain Corps and Army senior leaders to change how the Army views and teaches values and ethical approaches in warfare.

Ethical decision-making, just war theory, and the preservation of humanity were critical discussion topics throughout the brief.

Chaplain (Col.) Sean Wead, senior command chaplain for CAC, stressed

Mitch came into the Fort Leavenworth Stray Facility last week as a stray after he

was found by Reuning. Reuning said she almost left the cat alone when she found him but decided to pick him up and have him scanned for a microchip. The contact information associated with his microchip was not up to date, but

through some sleuthing, current contact information was found for the Combs family.

Mitch went missing four years ago when the Combs' family was getting ready to move from Lansing, Kansas. He was found about a mile from where the family

Stray dogs often show up in my yard.

They are NEVER wearing identification.

I always try to get them back home before they are injured, further lost or taken in by someone not willing to look for their owners, but that is very difficult to accomplish when they aren't wearing a current phone number.

I've recognized few of them and was able to walk them back home, but more often I don't know the animals and wish I could call their owners.

I usually call to have them picked up by the Leavenworth Police Department/Leavenworth Animal Control or have taken them into the city shelter with the hope of the dogs being reunited with owners there.

I have found strays while out hiking or trailriding, including a few purebred hunting dogs wearing orange collars (but no tags) who must've strayed too far from their

hunting buddies.

I have come across dogs that have been separated from their owners in dangerous situations. More than once I've stopped to try to help get traffic-dodging dogs off the road. The black lab I held at the side of the road one night after he'd almost been hit by cars three times was wearing a GPS device, but I couldn't call his owner for help because he wasn't wearing a phone number.

In all of these cases, a happy ending could have happened much sooner and surely if the dogs had been wearing current contact information. Dealing with a stray dog often needs to be done quickly, as I might be juggling my own dogs or have no way to safely contain the stray — I wish I could just make a quick phone call to reunite the pet.

Many of the strays I've encountered over the years were wearing collars, but just collars — no identification, no way to find out who they belong to through rabies tags, city li-

cense tags, or even a handwritten number. I could have had those pets home within minutes of finding them if they had only had a current phone number on


Please put your phone number — a current phone number — on your pets' collars.

Here are a few ways to put your phone number on your pet, even if it is microchipped or wearing a GPS device:

- 1. Write the phone number on the collar/harness with a permanent marker. Be sure to keep the numbers legible as they can fade quickly with wear.
- 2. Engrave your phone number onto a metal tag or have a tag engraved. Engraved tags can be made while you shop at most pet and farm stores, or even at locksmith and trophy stores, and the tags can also be easily ordered on-
- 3. Have an embroidery shop stitch your phone number onto your pet's collar.
- 4. Use an engraved slide-on tag, such as those offered by many online vendors. Cats who hate collars won't even know they are wearing the neoprene variety. Even indooronly kitties need phone numbers on their collars. Cats can escape when children/visitors/workers/movers leave the door cracked too long, or in the event of a fire or other

Put your contact information on the collar, but microchip, too!

Several microchipped pets have come into the Fort Leavenworth Stray Facility, where strays found on post go, but many of those microchips have outdated contact in-

formation, sometimes that of a former owner, and no way to find their current owners.

I highly recommend microchipping pets, as collars can be lost, but, again, you must keep your contact information current. There is no guarantee whoever scans the chip will go to the lengths that were taken that resulted in the cat reunion mentioned above.

By keeping the contact information associated with your pet's microchip current, not only will a shelter be able to reunite you with your pet, but there should be no dispute over whose animal it is.

Please, if you find a stray, have it scanned for a microchip. You can have this done for free at virtually any animal shelter/rescue facility or veterinarian's office. You'd want your pet returned to you, so help facilitate a reunion by having the pet scanned rather than just keeping the pet or finding it a new home.

And if your pet is ever lost, but is wearing your phone number, you might not have to spend the night worrying about it and can instead be reunited.

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MAHC screens service members, military families on food insecurity

Blood pressure, pulse and body temperature are metrics patients expect to be assessed when checking in for a medical appointment, but now, at least once per year, patients at Munson Army Health Center will be screened for food insecurity, too.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture defines food insecurity as limited or uncertain access to adequate food.

According to the USDA, poor nutrition is a leading cause of illness in the United States, associated with more than half a million deaths per year. It is linked with in-

creased risk of obesity, diabetes and heart disease, as well as broader impacts, including higher health care costs and decreased productivity.

"It's a national patient safety goal to address health equity. We ask these questions so that we can provide resources if our population is experiencing food insecurity," said Elizabeth Higgins, a population health nurse at MAHC.

Higgins said that a military-

wide screening showed 25.8 percent of military families experience food insecurity.

"This can have a negative impact on the physical and mental health of service members and their families," Higgins said. "At Munson, we want to identify those who may need extra help in meeting their nutrition needs."

Using military treatment facilities like MAHC to reach service members and their families about food insecurity is part of a larger network of federal, state and community-based agencies offering support to address the complex needs of military families.

Munson Army Health Center will screen patients for food insecurity — at least once every 12 months — during primary care exams. Using military treatment facilities like MAHC to reach service members and their families about food insecurity is part of a larger network of federal, state, and community-based agencies offering support to address the complex needs of military families.

At least once every 12 months, patients will be given a questionnaire when they arrive for a primary care medical appointment at MAHC that asks two questions about their access to food.

Based on the response, patients might be screened more frequently, if the response indicates that they might be food insecure.

"In the exam room, a member of their care team will ask questions one-on-one with a patient. If the patient would like more information, we have a guide that lists state, local and military agencies that individuals may contact if they are experiencing food insecurity," Higgins said. "We also can provide a referral to our nutritionist for meal planning, food budgeting and so much more."

The data the care teams collect will be forwarded to the Defense Health Agency aggregately and will not identify individual service members or their families, but might be used to help leaders address challenges that could pose a threat to U.S. military readiness and resilience.

the intrinsic responsibility of a chaplain to advise commanders to make ethical decisions during conflict and how the process of making an ethical soldier is continuous.

ROK Chaplain (Maj.) Huigeon Lee shared his belief that ethical advisement to preserve life during war requires bravery and personal courage.

Vineyard explained the jus ad bellum (justice of war) and jus in bello (justice in war) principles, emphasizing that advising just war decisions does not require the commander and the chaplain to believe the same thing.

"With regards to the conscience and

the commander sleep at night," Vineyard said.

The brief concluded by highlighting the importance of the self-development training domain and how even chaplains, who study ethics as part of their profession, must keep reading and learning to stay current and relevant.

Later in the visit, Lt. Col. Nathan Branen, CAL director, led a discussion on the Army profession.

"The profession establishes the foundation for everything we do in the Army," Branen said. "It covers everyone who serves, to include our Department of the Army civil-

The allies examined the characteristics of a professional, honorable service, expertise, stewardship, and how to earn, maintain and regain trust with their nation's people.

ROK Senior Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Taikjo Kim and Branen shared thoughts on their respective armies' recruiting challenges and how society's trust can influence those challenges.

Branen emphasized that the U.S. Army endeavors to recruit and retain the right people and offered how esprit de corps, a characteristic of the Army profession, gives soldiers a sense of purpose and motivates them to strive for excellence. Like the earlier

ethics brief, Branen closed with a focus on the self-development domain and its critical link to leader development and the

The visit concluded with a gift exchange, and the ROK army chaplains shared the phrase "Kapchi Kapshida," a common U.S-Korean partnership slogan that means "We go together."

Army profession.

The engagement reinforced the importance of multinational collaboration and strengthened the 71-year coalition between the United States and South Korea.

Leavenworth is here. A lot of the natural conservation that has taken place is because we were the very first entity as far as military- or settlement-type of establishments here."

Mosier told the retirees that Fort Leavenworth is arguably the oldest continuously operated installation west of Washington, D.C. — thanks to a short hiatus at West Point, New York, which claims that title — but that it is definitely the oldest continuously operated military post west of the Appalachian Mountains.

Mosier listed the writing and testing of Army doctrine at Fort Leavenworth — known as the Intellectual Center of the Army — and that officers transit through the post at some point in their careers, as some of the reasons why the post is an extremely important location to the U.S. Army and the Department of Defense.

Mosier used his history overview of the installation to help explain some of the "projects and facelifts" currently happening on Fort Leavenworth.

Mosier said that of 104 Army installations, Fort Leavenworth has the most historic homes built before 1919.

"It is an old installation with old infrastructure — we have a lot of buildings, roads, curbs, even our trees that are very historic in nature, and that creates challenges for us."

Mosier shared some of the projects underway to help breathe new life into the post's aging infrastructure. He noted the construction of the new Child Development Center that will start Nov. 4. Hancock Gate will open at that time to help with construction and neighborhood traffic.

He explained the Army's transition to privatized housing in 2006 and the contract partner's responsibilities to housing on post

"Our housing partner, Michaels Military Housing, is responsible for all aspects of outyear development plans, what they are going to do to invest money into the infrastructure of the installation, new construction, renovations, road work, curb work, all of these sorts of things," he said. "I am very happy today to announce that the United States Army and Michaels Military Housing has reached an accord. We have been negotiating for about eight or nine months, and we have landed on what we call the Outyear Development Plan."

Mosier said the ODP means that Michaels has pledged approximately \$120 million for renovations of Fort Leavenworth's historic district.

"They are going to preserve that incredible fabric of history for our (descendants), which we are thrilled about. They are going to build brand new homes over the next three to five years in the area of Hancock Pool," he said.

He said the 1950s-60s apartments in that area will be brought down in about a year to make way for those new 2,200-square-foot military family homes.

He said repairs that have been lower on the priority list will also be taken care of, including window replacements and new sidewalks, as well as other projects already underway or that will start within the next year, with a focus on maintaining the installation for future generations.

Munson Army Health Center

Munson Army Health Center Director Col. Jolanda L.J. Walker followed Mosier, thanking the retirees for attending and explaining some of the services MAHC was offering following the speakers.

"Thank you for your service and the sacrifices of your family members, and thank you for allowing Munson Army Health Center to be a part of your wellness journey," Walker told the retirees. "We definitely appreciate the opportunity to be able to bring those services to you."

Walker urged good hygiene during cold and flu season to help reduce illness, and said the MAHC was ready to provide flu shots and dispense over-the-counter cold packs. In addition, oral-cancer screenings
