MCCoE director promoted to brigadier general

Col. Bryan L. Babich, director of Mission Command Center of Excellence, was promoted to brigadier general during a ceremony Aug. 9 in the Lewis and Clark Center's Eisenhower Auditorium.

In his remarks, the presiding officer for the cere-

mony, Lt. Gen. Milford Beagle, Jr., Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth commanding general, took the opportunity to address the audience gathered for the event.

"This day is important," he said. "It's important to someone that is important to you. Your personal presence makes a difference and it's only going to happen once. The fact that you're

here proves that Bryan Babich and his lovely family are important to you."

He framed Babich's promotion around three points - the person, the professional and 'probability.'

In talking about the person, Beagle noted that Babich's office features items honoring the "history and DNA of the Babich family, and how deep that runs in terms of service to

our nation."

In speaking about Babich as a professional, Beagle focused on the past four years, during which Babich served first as commander of the Mission Command Training Program and later as director of the Mission Command Center of Excellence. At

PAIR Day is 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Aug. 17 at Harney Sports Complex.



The English Language Support Course (ELSC), facilitated under the International Military Student Division at the Command and General Staff College, has long been a beacon for international military families arriving at Fort Leavenworth. Separate from the English as a Second Language (ESL) course offered by the Army Community Service (which also needs volunteers, see page B1), the ELSC stands out for its community-driven, volunteer-led approach to teaching English.

Jeanne Boetig, a dedicated volunteer who has been instrumental in the ELSC's success, shared her journey and the impact of her work. "Volunteering was a natural choice for me," she explained. "My parents were always active volunteers in our parish and community organizations. My first experience came in high school through the National Honor Society."

Despite not having a teaching degree initially, she was confident in her strong foundation in grammar, literature and languages.

"I wanted to expand my contact with international spouses and make a difference in their lives," she said.

Making a lasting impact

Throughout her involvement with the ELSC, Boetig has expanded academic English instruction to better suit adult learners.



A lifelong commitment to language and volunteering

"My husband, Chris, and I grew up in New York City, where we had a strong foundation in various languages," Boetig began. "In college, I majored in English, Latin and classical literature, and our first military assignment was in Germany. Our language skills really helped us acclimate."

Settling in Leavenworth in 1992, they quickly became involved in community activities.

"We signed up to be Fort Leavenworth sponsors (for an international military student's family), and this year, we received a Department of the Army Meritorious Public Service Award for 30 years of sponsorship," she shared.

Boetig's journey with the ELSC began in 1999 when she was asked to teach the Advanced Conversation Class.

"I was in the right place at the right time and had built up a good reputation for my work with international spouses," she said.

By 2004, she had taken on the role of program director.

Inspired by family and community "I encourage instructors to supplement the curriculum with content that emphasizes oral communication, role-playing and multicultural awareness," she said.

Her contributions have not gone unnoticed.

"At our Recognition Ceremony many years ago, one of the international CGSC students said, 'Your English program was the best thing that happened to my wife this year,'" she recalled. Another memorable moment was when an officer at an annual event said, "Your name is well known in my country."

Encouraging others to volunteer

"Volunteering benefits both the receiver and the giver," Boetig emphasized. "There are countless opportunities available in our community. Whether you're donating your time, talent or treasure, you're making a difference in someone's life."

She concluded with a favorite quote from Saint Mother Teresa: "Not all of us can do great things, but we can do small things with great love."

SHARP Academy hosts DoD new curriculum pilot

The Army Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention (SHARP) Academy hosted the first of two pilot sessions of the Department of Defense Encounter Skills curriculum from July 22-26 at Fort Leavenworth.

The DoD Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Office (SAPRO) created the Encounter Skills curriculum in partnership with the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences.

The Encounter Skills lessons were developed in response to the Independent Review Commission on Sexual Assault in the Military and the Secretary of Defense-approved recommendation to develop and administer a core curriculum of trauma and response training for sexual assault response coordinators (SARC) and Sexual Assault Prevention and Response victim advocates (SAPR VA) that builds their capacity to provide culturally competent care to victims, according to https://www.defense.gov/Spotlights/Independent-Review-Commission-on-Sexual-Assault-in-the-Mil itary/. Research has shown that victims report better personal outcomes when they have trusted professionals who provide trauma informed support and empower them to make their own decisions.

SAPRO's Training and Education Center of Excellence (SAPRTEC) leads the collaborative development and pilot delivery of the Encounter Skills curriculum, which aims to improve the non-clinical advocacy skills of SARCS and SAPR VAs. The course focuses on improving SARC and SAPR VA victim encounter skills through an evi-

dence-informed practice model including expressing empathy, active listening, empowering decision-making, rapport building and establishing trust throughout the case management process.

As the only formal sexual violence response and prevention education center within the DoD, the U.S. Army SHARP Academy at Fort Leavenworth agreed to host the two Encounter Skills pilot sessions. Eighteen students from across all military services and the National Guard Bureau attended the DoD SAPRTEC course. Three Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences instructors delivered the pilot with each military service providing one assistant instructor. The assistant instructors attended train-the-trainer course in April at the SHARP Academy, sponsored by DoD SAPRTEC, and taught by USUHS instructors. SAPRO Director Dr. Nathan Galbreath visited the SHARP Academy and observed the July 2024 training session.

"We are grateful for the first-class support provided by the SHARP Academy leaders and staff, which enabled us to bring together a talented group of instructors and students from across the DoD to conduct this pilot," Galbreath said. "These sessions are vital to enhancing preparation and capabilities of our SAPR professionals. Victim assistance is a calling, and leaders at the department will continue to pursue efforts that ensure our SAPR professionals receive the tools they need to respond to sexual assault and provide quality care and support to victims."

The next pilot is scheduled for Sept. 9-13 and will be taught by a team of instructors from each military service with USUHS instructors supporting as assistant instructors. The Encounter Skills curriculum is expected to be finalized during Fiscal Year 2025.

A call to action

With all of the ELSC teaching positions currently filled, the organization is always looking for additional volunteers.

"If someone is interested in adding their name to the substitute teachers' list, they may still contact me," she said.

Boetig added that not everyone needs to be in the classroom to make a difference. She said lack of available hourly child care is one of the issues that can prevent international spouses who would like to participate in the ELSC from attending.

"Some solve their problem by sharing babysitting: one spouse attends Tuesday while the other cares for the children, and then they switch on Thursday. Not ideal, but at least they each can attend class once a week," Boetig said. "Last year, several spouses were able to attend classes while their children played together at an American neighbor's house. I was overwhelmed by this woman's empathy, kindness and generosity. I do not know if money changed hands, but the women and children became friends for life."

ELSC classes meet twice each week at Kansas City Kansas Community College's local campus, the Pioneer Center on Spruce Street in Leavenworth, from 9-10:30 a.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays. This helps accommodate ELSC students who have young children who need to be picked up from pre-kindergarten and kindergarten at 11 a.m. The ELSC academic year starts around Labor Day and follows the same holiday schedule as CGSC and Unified School District 207, including closures for parent-teacher conferences, and the course

concludes in the second week of May. The ELSC's story is a testament to the



power of community and the lasting impact of dedicated volunteers. For those interested in making a difference, the ELSC can offer a unique and rewarding opportunity.

Harding Fellowship application window now open

The Maj. Gen. Edwin "Forrest" Harding Fellowship is now accepting applications for the second group of fellows in one of the Army's newest broadening opportunity program.

The deadline for applications is Sept. 10, 2024.

Selected fellows will start graduate school in Kansas in May 2025 and then report to their respective Center of Excellence in the summer of 2026 for a two-year term as editor of their branch journal.

"These fellows will channel the legacy of Maj. Gen. Edwin 'Forrest' Harding, who renewed Infantry and Infantry Journal in the 1930s," Lt. Col. Zachary Griffiths, director of the Harding Project, said. "An initiative of the Chief of Staff of the Army Gen. Randy George, the Harding Project is renewing the Army's professional journals. As Harding did, these editors will connect the journals with the force and ensure their content is relevant, high quality and accessible."

Gen. Gary Brito, commanding general, U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command, also said of the program: "Like the observer controllers who serve at our combat training centers, these leaders will return to operational units as experts in their branches with superior communications skills."

The Fellowship

The three-year Harding Fellowship selects, develops and employs top performing officers as editors for the Army's professional journals, connecting them with branch Centers of Excellence.

Fellows will earn a master's degree, work directly for their branch commandant and Center of Excellence commander, and reach across their branch.

Fellows will first complete an accelerated one-year master of science in journalism and mass communications program through Kansas University's William Allen White School of Journalism and Mass Communications.

Then, fellows will move to their respective Center of Excellence and serve as editors-in-chief of their branch journal. As editor, they will ensure their journal publishes high-quality and relevant content that reaches their peers in

the force.

The program is open to activeduty captains, non-commissioned officers of the rank of master sergeant/first sergeant, and chief

warrant officer 4. Branches and eligible military occupational specialties for the 2025 cohort include:

• Infantry at Fort Moore, Georgia (Infantry)

• Protection at Fort Leonard Wood, Missouri (Chemical Corps, Engineer, Military Police)

• Army Sustainment at Fort Gregg-Adams, Virginia (Transportation, Quartermaster, Ordnance, Finance) • Air Defense at Fort Sill, Oklahoma (Air Defense Artillery)

• Special Warfare at Fort Liberty, North Carolina (Civil Affairs, Psychological Operations, Special Forces)

• Military Intelligence at Fort Huachuca, Arizona (Military Intelligence)

Due to the nature of the program and branch representation across the Army professional journals, the branches able to apply for the fellowship will alternate every year. No more than six fellows will be selected each year.

Guests could try on dresses in dressing rooms, where they could bring two dresses at a time and view their selections using mirrors placed outside the rooms.

In addition to the extensive selection of gowns, guests could choose accessories, including shoes, earrings, necklaces and handbags. This approach aimed to ensure attendees could find something that suited their style and needs.

Makeup and skincare products, donated by community organizations and coordinated by Stronghold Food Pantry, were also available for attendees.

Melissa Kreitzer, Army Corrections Brigade event organizer, said the event was a collaborative effort.

"We worked as a team with our community partners to make this happen," she said. "The donation of skincare and makeup, valued at almost \$4,000, allowed us to provide a full beauty experience."

The event also served as a platform for military spouses to connect and support one another. Sara Peru Navarrete, a spouse and hairstylist, expressed how the event impacted her.

ODYD's grand opening pop-up event is 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Sept. 14, with monthly pop-up events from then on for members of the community who have military ID, including international students, to shop from the dontated dresses, menswear and accessories.

McKenzie said the Sept. 14 event is a great opportunity for those needing homecoming attire, as the October event might be too late. McKenzie said those taking advantage of the pop-up events can keep the items, but they should give the items away or re-donate them to ODYD when they no longer want them, noting that the items are not to be sold.

MCTP, specifically, then-Col. Babich was responsible for coaching and teaching division and corps commanders.

"When it comes to being one of the best warfighters in the Army, you're looking at him right here on the stage," Beagle said.

Finally, when explaining "probability," Beagle said, "The probability of the family and many others sitting at another promotion for Bryan Babich is very high, the probability of attending a ceremony for Bryan Babich to command at the next level is extremely high, and the probability that the Babich name will echo across our Army for years to come is the highest probability of them all."

Babich's wife, Jenn, and his father, retired Army Col. Jim Babich, pinned on his brigadier general rank before MCCoE Sgt. Maj. Robert Flynn presented Babich with his general officer flag, belt and pistol. Upon completion of the pinning and presentations, Beagle reaffirmed the Oath of Office with Babich.

During his remarks, Babich thanked his family and personal staff before making a point to recognize the Vietnam veterans in the audience. He further acknowledged the mentors and leaders who have helped him get to this day. Specifically, he provided an anecdote of the advice his father gave him before he embarked on his first assignment in the Army: "Take care of your little piece of the Army and have fun!"

This bit of wisdom stuck with Babich, and he chose to turn it into a professional mantra.

In describing the "take care" portion, he said, "I've seen and personally been the recipient of thousands of examples of caring leadership. There's a civility in being part of our Army, and it fires me up every day to be lucky enough to be a part of it. To all I have served with in the past that cared for me, I hope I've measured up in return."

Regarding his "little piece of the Army," he took that as a reminder to remain humble and that no matter what rank or job title held, one is part of something larger — a gift "handed down by generations that came before us and will be around long after we're gone."

"Finally, 'have fun' doesn't really require an explanation, but I'd offer the leaders I've served for and with that truly inspired did so with authentic passion. They loved being in the Army," he said.

A career field artillery officer, Babich commanded the Mission Command Training Program prior to joining MCCoE as its director in June 2023. He has commanded at battery, battalion and brigade levels; served on the Joint Staff; and held numerous other key leadership positions. His operational and combat deployments include Albania and Kosovo, Operation Iraqi Freedom, Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Inherent Resolve.

A self-proclaimed Army "brat" who calls Sierra Vista, Arizona, home, Babich holds a bachelor of science degree in criminal justice from Arizona State University, a master's degree in national security and strategic studies from the Naval War College, and a master's degree in strategic studies from the Army War College.

His awards and decorations include the Legion of Merit with one oak leaf cluster, the Bronze Star Medal with one oak leaf cluster, the Defense Meritorious Service Medal with two oak leaf clusters, the Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster, the Combat Action Badge, Ranger Tab, and Air Assault and Master Parachutist badges.

Babich noted that he is "fired up" for this opportunity to continue to serve.

"I'm fired up because I know the next chapter is going to hard, thrilling, filled with good and challenging days, but mostly I know it's going to be a ride," he said. "In other words, back to the work of 'taking care of my little piece of the Army and having fun!'"


USDB Commandant Col. Doug Curtis addressed the nearly 20 students earning degrees.

"Your success today is a powerful testament to your commitment to personal growth and your determination to shape a brighter future," he said.



Dr. Greg Mosier, president of KCKCC told the graduates that they were all assembled to celebrate their successes.

"Not only your success of meeting the program requirements so you may accept the degree you're about to receive, but also our earlier success in first making the decision to pursue or continue your education," he said. "In fact, only approximately one third of all adults aged 25 and above in the United States have a bachelor's degree or higher, and only about 45 percent have at least a two-year degree."

Four students graduated from Upper Iowa University earning one associate of arts degree and three bachelor of science degrees in business administration. Three graduates also earned their associate degree with KCKCC.

Cynthia Bentley, assistant vice president for U.S. Center Operation for Upper Iowa University, thanked the USDB staff for their daily contributions to education, noting that the graduation would not be possible without their support.

To the graduates, she said, "Each of you (has) faced significant challenges, but you chose to rise above them. You have demonstrated that your past does not define your future and that every day is an opportunity for growth and change."

USDB Correctional Programs Director Chiquita Hudson, on the behalf of Missouri Western State University, presented one student with a bachelor of science degree in psychology, and on behalf of California Coast University, she presented a master of arts degree in organizational leadership to the remaining student.

All TA Requests for FY24 must be submitted and approved prior to 2000 Eastern Daylight Time (EDT) on 6 September 2024 due to the Army's fiscal year closeout. This only applies to FY24 TA requests with a start date that occurs during FY24, e.g. 1 Oct 2023 through 30 Sept 2024. There will be no exceptions granted.

2. Soldiers may continue to create TA Request for courses beginning in FY25, 1 October 2024 and beyond, between 60 - 7 days in advance of the term start date. Remember, FY25 requests are subject to the availability of funds
