New leader takes command of Combined Arms Command

Lt. Gen. James P. Isenhower III assumed command of the Combined Arms Command during a ceremony Nov. 18 at the Lewis and Clark Center.

In September, Lt. Gen. Milford H. Beagle Jr. relinquished command of CAC, known then as the Combined Arms Center, and followed that ceremony with his retirement from the Army.

Assumption ceremony host Gen. David M. Hodne, commanding general of the newly established Transformation and Training Command, expressed his gratitude for those who have been helping fill the gap between CAC commanders and spoke of the “extraordinary legacy” of CAC.

“Since its establishment, CAC has been central to the Army’s development. They’ve done this through powerful sources of overmatch, our doctrine and our leader development,” Hodne said. “It’s a storied institution that both predates and remains beyond (Training and Doctrine Command). That is not meant as a slight to TRADOC, but rather speaks to the core, enduring functions of the Combined Arms Command, who prepares the Army and its leaders for the challenges of today and tomorrow.”

Hodne said commanding CAC is unique in scope and impact.

“CAC synchronizes doctrinal and educational requirements across nine Centers of Excellence, 20 branch schools, seven non-branch specific schools, trains over 300,000 students annually, including nearly 5,000 interna-

Stronghold, community provide support during government shutdown, upcoming holiday

Fort Leavenworth’s Stronghold Food Pantry recorded a staggering 335 percent increase in military patrons served during the recent government shutdown. Yet with the community’s generous support, Stronghold was able to keep its doors open longer and its shelves stocked — all while planning for the Thanksgiving holi-

day. Stronghold serves the military community with fresh food, nonperishables, diapers and other essentials. **Crisis** The shutdown, the longest in U.S. his-

tory, strained many military families beyond their finances. While one in four military families are considered food insecure, many more live paycheck to paycheck, relying on and delegating every cent throughout the month. But when there is any delay in payment, it has the potential to start a domino effect that pushes some families into crisis, explained Monica Bassett, CEO and founder

of Stronghold. “That margin for financial cushion is so thin for military families,” Bassett said. “In situations like this, we want to be the plug that stops the spiral.” **Community** Stronghold’s brick-and-mortar location

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Military families receive Thanksgiving meals in traditional basket distribution

Nearly 130 Thanksgiving meals, complete with turkey, sides, dessert and more, were distributed to military families Nov. 18 at the Fort Leavenworth Commissary.

Operations Chaplain (Maj.) Christopher Weinrich said the annual meal distribution tradition is possible because of the Fort Leavenworth and chapel communities who support service members and their families with time and monetary contributions.

“In the military, we have a tradition to help out our service members and families, especially around holiday time, and Thanksgiving, Christmas, Hanukkah, all these major holidays is a really big time to help out our soldiers,” Weinrich said. “This is something that’s great that the military loves to do. I think the community, and especially right now with finances, with the furlough ending and everything else, it’s good we want to support our community.”

Weinrich said that command teams, who signed up service members in their units to receive the Thanksgiving meals, really want to support the post’s service members. He referred to them as the heroes of the meal tradition, making sure that their troops receive the food baskets.

Meals were distributed to lower enlisted service members

through mid-level NCOs with families assigned to Army Corrections Brigade, Mission Command Training Program, Combined Arms Command – Training, Munson Army Health Center, Fort Leavenworth Garrison, 67th Military Working Dog Detachment/Law Enforcement Activity and Kansas City Recruiting Battalion. The size of the turkeys and meal components varied depending on the number of dependents.

Fort Leavenworth Commissary Store Director Anthony Gardner said Commissary patrons responded to the need.

“They definitely have donated more this year. I think it’s because of the furlough process that went on, so you had more customers (who) donated.”

Gardner said about 400 customers donated items to fill the bags, 150 donated money to help complete the mission, and the

Commissary’s produce vendor, Liberty Foods, donated potatoes, celery and onions. The turkeys were purchased with chapel offerings.

Gardner said just the sides, not counting the turkey, would cost a family at least \$60.

“This is the best turnout that we have (had) — we have 127 baskets ... that we’re giving out from ranges from two dependents all the way up to eight dependents, which is pretty remarkable. A family the size of eight will get eight cans of vegetables, eight cans of green beans, eight cans of corn, four bags of stuffing... three broths, three cream of mushroom soups and two cranberry sauces and four gravies, so it’s a good basket,” he said, noting that families also received pumpkin pies and topping and they will likely have plenty of leftovers.

The food “baskets,” actually

distributed in paper bags, were assembled by volunteers, which included active-duty service members and supporting organizations, earlier that morning. More volunteers showed up in the

afternoon to help distribute the meals to service members.

Holiday meal baskets will also be distributed in mid-December ahead of Christmas.

at Fort Leavenworth typically assists 115 patrons each month, but during the shutdown, the nonprofit served 496 patrons in October alone.

However, with increased volunteer support, Stronghold was able to add more Open Pantry dates, as well as evening shifts, to its weekly schedule. Community members routinely asked what was needed, with some dropping off food in bulk (crowd favorite: pancake mix!) and others giving financial contributions. Still others, like the Fort Leavenworth High School JROTC and Knights of Columbus from the Catholic Chapel Community, hosted food drives, encouraging nonperishable food donations. The shelves at Stronghold stayed stocked each week, ready to welcome patrons.

With Thanksgiving just around the cor-

ner, many families also had concerns about the holiday.

“At first we were so concerned about the here-and-now that we just focused on helping in the moment,” Bassett said, “but when you’re in a government shutdown for 40-plus days, patrons then start to think what food they would have on their table that week.”

Earlier this month, Bassett and the Stronghold team launched the annual campaign “Stronghold at the Table,” which provides a full Thanksgiving dinner to patrons in need of support — regardless of pay grade.

To support Stronghold at the Table, MacArthur Elementary Site Council, led by first-grade teacher Rebecca Moritz, hosted another food drive. Students eagerly delivered to their classrooms the ingredients

needed for classic recipes like stuffing, mashed potatoes, sweet potato casserole and green bean casserole. With their thoughtful giving, 60 Fort Leavenworth families will be given full boxes to make these Thanksgiving dishes.

Last week, with turkeys donated by Rapid Response Charities, volunteers packed the first of many Thanksgiving boxes to give to patrons.

In addition to Stronghold at the Table, the nonprofit will conduct its regular Open Pantry days for patrons.

Joining forces

Stronghold recently announced partnership with the Wounded Warrior Project, which will provide 52,000 meals to 2,500 families across 40 locations.


This partnership will further engage and sustain military families across the nation


who need extra support during vulnerable times.

“This partnership allows us to deliver not just groceries, but dignity, compassion and care — providing meals that honor each family’s unique needs, from food sensitivities to religious preferences. We understand that not all families are built the same, but every family deserves intentional and meaningful support,” Bassett said.

Veteran PCS also recently selected Stronghold as its holiday giving partner in an effort to raise \$10,000 to provide 200 holiday meals for military families.

“Being chosen as a partner for organizations like Veteran PCS allows our mission to spread,” Bassett said. “Taking care of each other is a community effort, and we are honored to collaborate to continue our mission of supporting military families.”

tional students from 130 nations, as well as more than 10,000 members of the joint force annually,” Hodne said. “But we’re also living in a time of unprecedented change. The pace of technological advancements, the evolving character of war and the dynamic security environment demand that our Army transform.”

Hodne said CAC is changing to meet those demands, in part noted by the name change from “center” to “command.”

“This isn’t just a rebrand,” Hodne said. “CAC’s scope of responsibility will increase and now must wrestle with tough, adaptive problems, including rapidly developing, nimble doctrine, modernizing professional military education and keeping pace with that rapid evolution of technology I mentioned and the associated evolution of warfare in real time.”

Hodne said the changes will complicate some aspects, but new authorities will enable accelerated transformation. He said CAC will be a connector between U.S. Army Recruiting Command and Futures in Concepts Command, integrate lessons from combat training centers, manage operational feedback to inform concepts and materiel development at the Centers of Excellence, and more.

“You’ll tighten the loop between education, training and warfighting. These core functions will also ensure our Army remains agile and adaptive to fight the adversaries we encounter.”

Hodne lauded Isenhower as a proven combat leader capable of leading through change, noting his experience commanding the 1st Armored Division in addition to his most recent assignment as the assistant deputy chief of staff, G357, at Headquarters, Department of the Army during the Army Transformation Initiative rollout.

“This appointment reflects our Army’s confidence in Jim to drive the necessary transformation, both within CAC and across the broader U.S. Army,” he said.

Hodne said the appointment of Isenhower as CAC’s commanding general was significant for the entire Army.

“I routinely tell brigade and battalion commanders, many of whom come through (Fort Leavenworth) as part of their Pre-Command Course journey, that there’s no more exciting time to serve. We live in a seminal moment in history and a seminal moment in warfare, where we see how technology punishes unskilled formations more than ever. Our Army must keep pace with the dynamic evolution of technology in responding for the corresponding change in character of war,” Hodne said. “Jim, your teammates and fellow plank holders in the U.S. Army Transformation and Training Command, and all the formations and soldiers we serve and support, are fortunate to have you, Sherrill, and the Isenhower family in our Army. We’re all fortunate to have you lead in our senior ranks, and thanks for all you continue to do for the Army in this world.”

Hodne recognized Isenhower’s family, notably Sherrill Isenhower and her support during her husband’s military career. Isenhower noted in his remarks that they made this, their 19th permanent-change-of-station move, on their 30th anniversary.

“Behind every successful leader is a family that shares in the sacrifices and triumphs associated with military life, and we all ask a lot of our spouses in the military, and as Jim has surely done of Sherrill. To Sherrill, your unwavering support and resilience over the last 30 years-plus has been a cornerstone of Jim’s success. Your dedication to volunteering while also raising three remarkable sons is truly inspiring, and thanks for all you do to support Jim and all of our Army families.”

Isenhower began his remarks by thanking Department of the Army civilians and asked uniformed service members to applaud them for sticking with them during the government shutdown. He also recog-

nized Command and General Staff College’s Human Protections Director Dr. Michelle Miller, who was his small group leader when he was a CGSC student, joking that she could now ask other small group leaders what they have done to coach and train the next CAC commanding general. Only partially said in jest, he said the truth is that a future division commander is currently in a career course, that a future sergeant major of the Army is at the Sergeant’s Major Academy, and a future chief of staff of the Army was probably discussing doctrine and orders in the Lewis and Clark Center earlier that day.

“At CAC, our responsibility is as profound as our opportunity,” Isenhower said. “Nearly 200 years ago, Fort Leavenworth was at the frontier of both a nation and an army. Today, Fort Leavenworth and the

Combined Arms Command play the same role — out front, driving the Army at the frontier of modern warfare. Our obligation is as vital today as it was in the 1800s. Together, we’ll develop the force, its leaders, and its doctrine to keep us the most lethal army on the globe.”

Isenhower said he and Sherrill value any opportunity to care for soldiers, DA civilians and their families. He addressed the audience and CAC, emphasizing how much the Army needs each of them.

“Today’s world is remarkably dangerous. Our nation needs its Army at its best, stewards of the profession, fully prepared to fight and destroy any enemy foolish enough to challenge us or our country,” he said. “Together, let’s drive the Army’s transformation, drive change from vision to victory. This we’ll defend.”

Transformation, Training Command activated

Hodne assumed command as the T2COM commanding general, and Command Sgt. Maj. Raymond Harris assumed responsibility as the command sergeant major.

The establishment of T2COM comes after Secretary of the Army Daniel Driscoll announced an effort aimed to accelerate transformation and improve force structure to ensure the Army remains the world’s most lethal and ready land force.

The U.S. Army Recruiting Command, Combined Arms Command, and Futures and Concepts Command will function as subordinate commands to enhance the Army

through unifying recruitment, training and combat development, ensuring a cohesive and agile force ready for future challenges.

Chief of Staff of the Army Gen. Randy George presided over the ceremony and acknowledged the need for the Army to integrate how it trains, fights and modernizes.

“T2COM will help our Army change how we operate. As we all know, transformation is not just about product innovation, it’s about process innovation... T2COM will help us cut our redundancy, reverse stagnation and push talent and leaders into our fighting formations,” George said.

During his remarks, Hodne outlined his vision and goals for the new command, emphasizing a focus on turning warfighting concepts into war-winning capabilities.

“Our mission is clear. From vision to victory, we lead the Army’s continuous transformation, modernizing capabilities, developing leaders and advancing the profession to deliver decisive readiness,” Hodne said.

■ Military families may be able to get dental or vision coverage through the Federal Employees **DENTAL AND VISION** Insurance Program. Federal Benefits Open Season is currently underway but ends Dec. 8—one day before TRICARE Open Season ends. You must have a TRICARE health plan to get FEDVIP vision coverage.

■ TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Select beneficiaries ages 13-64 experiencing recurring **HAND, WRIST AND ELBOW PAIN** may find relief through occupational therapy services available at Munson Army Health Center. No referral required. Call the appointment line at 913-684-6250 to schedule a consultation.

■ The **MUNSON ARMY HEALTH CENTER PATIENT AND FAMILY PARTNERSHIP COUNCIL** meets quarterly at MAHC. The PFPC captures voices and insights of patients and families to improve the patient care experience. The council is composed of volunteers who represent the interests of patients who receive care from MAHC. Volunteers can be active-duty, active-duty family member, retirees or retiree family members. ■ Service members, retirees, family members and Department of Defense federal employees on Fort Leavenworth are **ELIGIBLE TO USE THE ARMED FORCES WELLNESS CENTER FOR FREE**. This includes physical fitness testing, body composition analysis, stress management, improving sleep habits and individual health coaching. You set the goals; the AFWC staff puts you on the path to achieving them. Programs are individualized to address your current needs, motivation and confidence level.  **SCHEDULING YOUR
ANNUAL MAMMOGRAM** 

For women aged 40 and above, annual mammograms are covered by Tricare and can be accessed within the network without needing a referral. To locate an authorized mammogram provider, follow these steps in the TriWest Provider Directory:

1. Use the QR code to visit the TriWest Provider Directory. Enter your zip code and plan if prompted.



2. Click on "Places by Type" icon.



3. When the search tab opens, type "Ma" like you were going to spell mammogram.



4. You'll see a drop-down menu populate where you can select "Mammogram" and search for network providers near you.

You can filter by rating, location, and other features.

5. Give the mammography/imaging center a call and let them know that you'd like to schedule an annual mammogram. Be sure to confirm that the provider accepts TRICARE and will bill them directly for your mammogram. Have them fax your results to Munson at 913-684-6311 to be added to your medical record!
