### Groundbreaking ceremony conducted for new CDC

The new Child Development Center currently being built along Hancock Avenue will increase available infant, pre-toddler, toddler and preschool child care slots available to the Fort Leavenworth community. The new facility will be more centrally located to post housing than the existing CDCs.

The Newcomb family, representing Child Development Center patrons, helped break ground for a new CDC during a ceremony March 20 off Hancock Avenue.

Maj. Christopher Newcomb, combat operations analyst at The Research and Analysis Center, his wife Hedei Newcomb and their 4-year-old son Cortland ceremoniously shoveled dirt with local military and community leaders, an elected official and Army Corps of Engineers and construction company representatives to celebrate the creation of the new center that will increase child care availability to Fort Leavenworth

Carole Hoffman, Child and Youth Services coordinator, said although the specific numbers for needed child care slots change every year, the Fort Leavenworth population always needs child care for ages newborn through elementary school.

"The need for high quality, developmentally appropriate care will always exist in our Fort Leavenworth community, and this new CDC will provide that for 6 weeks through 5 years old," Hoffman said, noting that the new CDC will provide 50 more child care spaces for that demographic. "This increase in numbers should greatly reduce the waitlist wait time."

The current Main and Osage CDC facilities offer full-day child care for 6 weeks through 5 years old, part-day preschool for 3-5 years old, before- and after-school care, and summer camps for kindergarten through fifth grade. Hoffman said Santa Fe CDC, which closed in March 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions on hourly care, has remained closed after the restrictions lifted because of staffing shortages, but should reopen by the end of the year.

"Both of our child care programs on Fort Leavenworth are nationally accredited programs and strive to provide high quality, developmentally appropriate programs for children," Hoffman said. "The projected completion date for the new CDC is September 2027, and once opened it will also go through the accreditation process."

In addition to offering increased child care slots, having the new CDC available at

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## Chinese military strategy, global power projection topic of latest CASO panel

The Command and General Staff College's Cultural and Area Studies Office panel March 13 focused on China's military strategy and if its goal is, in fact, global power projection.

CASO panels provide valuable warfighter education opportunities, Col. Jason R. Rosenstrauch, CGSC deputy commandant, said during his opening remarks.

"Events like this allow us to get a little bit better when we're planning and trying to anticipate the moves and understand the underlying strategy of our adversaries," he said.

This panel was a continuation of the Indo-Pacific-focused events that have covered a number of aspects of China as a pacing threat.

Moderator and CASO Director Dr. Mahir Ibrahimov explained the People's Republic of China's objectives and a combination of soft and hard power means of expansion and influence, which was demonstrated on a map displayed during the event.

Panelists provided insight to Chinese shadow influence in Africa, diplomatic and economic presence (and impact of) in Thailand, and discussion on Chinese military strategy.

Lt. Col. Samual Short, Australian Army, CGSC's Department of Joint, Interagency and Multinational Operations, said China's military strategy of global power projection could be realized in as soon as five years.

However, its near-term goals are much smaller and closer to the command post than perceived.

Through the Chinese National Party Congress, conditions have

been set to eventually become capable of being a dominant force across the globe, Short explained, but that's not until 2049.

Until then, the goals include sovereignty from countries directly impacted by their military presence and influence at their borders.

Peripheries and sovereignty are pillars of the Chinese military strategy, Short said, landing them on the list of the People's Liberation Army's goals, which does not include the global power project.

These two words, Short described, are what are being used within the governing bodies of China to create a clear path to future global power status.

"That's important to understand because that's their language when they're talking about the five-year plans at the Party Congress," he said.

Short explained that China has spent nearly a decade reviewing and analyzing, and restructuring, focusing and organizing their military.

This intense internal review has sparked a drastic cultural change within the force, making it more capable of being a global force, but in the future.

But China must first continue to stand its ground against geographic challenges with its neighbors like Russia and India pushing global dominance to the back burner for the time being.

Major pieces of China's onramp to future global power includes continued soft and hard



power influences in areas such as Africa and Thailand.

Ambassador David Shinn, former director of the U.S. Department of State's Office of East, Horn of Africa, and African Indian Ocean Island Affairs, highlighted China's efforts on the continent

"Africa is important in all of this (global power project)," Shinn said. "It's a huge geographical obstacle between the Indian Ocean and the Atlantic, and you've got to get over it or you've got to get around it."

China's presence mainly through peacekeeping operations demonstrates its understanding of the continent's importance in its five-year goal.

About 1,300 Chinese peace-keeping operators are currently spread across Africa, Shinn said, with a majority in the South Sudan region.

Although facing violence associated with the area, these peace-keepers are feathers in China's cap to positive influence on the African nations, Shinn explained.

Beyond regional stability, China boasts arms support in Africa, albeit behind near-peer threat Russia.

China is not a leader in some areas of influence in Africa, but its presence demonstrates its desire to compete in every environment.

"China's security engagement in Africa will increase," Shinn explained, noting financial backing could allude to regional building and establish-

ment of military bases of commercial use ports as focus shifts to Mediterranean and Atlantic naval activities.

China manages economic and diplomatic influence within Thailand, a country with a history of being caught in the middle.

Dr. Barry Stentiford, School of Advanced Military Studies history professor, discussed China's role in Thailand through a historical lens.

On two previous occasions, Thai leaders have found themselves wedged between world powers like Britain and France. In both instances the country avoided colonization, Stentiford said

Today, Thailand faces a similar situation finding dual-sided influence from the United States and

The United States has had treaties with the country since after World War II, as well as regular military exercises.

China is the country's top military supplier, as well as economic

bolster mainly in the vein of tourism, and also has regular military exercises with Thailand.

As mentioned earlier, a key focus of Chinese influence across the globe is that of periphery sovereignty.

Thailand does not share a bor-

der with China or have overlapping claims in the South China Sea or other major economic movement area, Stentiford said.

Thailand is in a space to be able to tip tables in favor of either country, adding to each country's ability to remain the global lead of power.

China's military strategy continues to force the country to disperse its influence attempts into many different regions across the globe.

Based on information presented during the panel, it is clear China's goals might be more centrally located, with global-scaled missions still on the horizon.

These strategy and goal timelines do not deter China from continuing to insert influence on many different levels and avenues in regions of importance.




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

that time will allow repairs to be made to existing CDC facilities without losing child care availability. During his groundbreaking ceremony remarks, Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth Commanding General Lt. Gen. Milford Beagle Jr. said the new CDC would open doors to better safety, security, supervision and memories.

He shared that when he was stationed at Fort Leavenworth from 2001-2003 for the Command and General Staff College and School of Advanced Military Studies, his family relied on the trustworthiness and professionalism of CDC staff members when he would drop off his then-2-year-old son at the facility.

"I'd go to class, my lovely bride, Pam, would go to work at the Federal Bureau of Prisons right outside the gates, and our older son would go to school at MacArthur. Any given day we weren't worried about safety, security or the supervision, because they were great people and we had great facilities," he said.

Not only did the Beagle family experience Kansas' tornadic weather during that time, but they were also at Fort Leavenworth when terrorists attacked the United States on Sept. 11, 2001.

"We were here for 9-11 and were all separated, but we knew (the children) were in a safe location in good facilities, that we currently have, and we had good supervision because of the workforce that was there, and that truly meant a lot, and that meant that was something we did not have to worry about."

Beagle said the ground-

breaking ceremony signified improvements to the security and safety of the nation's most precious resource. He said CDC professionals are in high demand, but are few, and that is a problem across the nation. He noted that the integrated technology in the new CDC will help make their jobs a little bit easier so they can perform their jobs even better.

"And as we have in the past, people will remember names like Ms. Watson, Ms. Wecas, and the rest of our CDC workers who work here now currently. Memories of quality safety, security and supervision established in our current facility will continue in our new facility," Beagle said. "We recruit soldiers but we retain families, and that is always a key point to remember, and this is but one demonstration of how our senior leaders, our senior elected officials, they all put their hat in the ring to make sure that our families are secure, protected so our soldiers can focus on their mission every single day and not have

to worry."

Kansas Sen. Jerry Moran also offered remarks during the groundbreaking cere-

mony.

"(It's) great to be in the Fort Leavenworth community on a day in which we plan for the future, a day in which we actually do more than plan for the future, a day in which we build for the future."

Moran said about three years ago, Congress restored earmarks, formally called congressionally directed spending, to set aside funds for projects.

"For those of us who are fiscally conservative, I should point out that if the money is not spent here, it's spent someplace else, and we prefer that it be spent in Kansas, and we are delighted that it will be spent here at Fort Leavenworth," Moran said of the \$34 million being used to build the new CDC. "Now we are going to break ground, and that's a wonderful day, and a more wonderful day will be when we cut a ribbon and we walk in the doors, and maybe even the better day is when we start seeing children who are being educated and cared for at this facility."

Moran, co-chair of the Senate Army Caucus, said the group works to find ways to improve the quality of life for the nation's military members and their families.

"We want to use the opportunity at every chance we get to make certain that those who serve us in (the) military, those who serve us in the Army, in particular, are cared for, their families are important, and what decisions that public policy makers in Washington, D.C., help us determine who's going to serve and how long they are going to serve and whether they believe they're being cared for and their families are fine in

their military service."
Following the remarks, the Newcomb family, Hoffman and other designees joined Beagle and Moran to officially break ground for the CDC project.

Detours are currently in place around the construction site, and Hancock Gate continues to be open for construction and neighborhood traffic.







Our current world is filled with friction within and between countries. There are conflicts on every continent on Earth besides Australia and Antarctica. The success of our nation is reliant upon our ability to train well-formed, ethical leaders to navigate the complexities of this dynamic environment. In this installment of our Distinguished Speaker Series, Dr. Paul D. Miller, CGSC Foundation's General Hugh Shelton Distinguished Visiting Chair of Ethics, is joined by Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Derek M. Pottinger, instructor of ethics and world religions at CGSC, in a discussion of Miller's latest book, *Ethics of War: A Short Companion*. In the book, Miller discusses just war tradition and the contemporary challenges of the changing shape of modern warfare and offers insight on how to counsel soldiers, elected officials, and citizens in response.



Dr. Paul David Miller, Ph.D., is a political theorist and political scientist focusing on international affairs, the American experiment, and America's role in the world. He is a professor of the practice of international affairs at Georgetown University's School of Foreign Service. He serves as co-chair of the Global Politics and Security concentration in the Master of Science in the Foreign Service program. He is also a non-resident senior fellow with the Atlantic Council's Scowcroft Center for Strategy and Security. He assumed the role of the CGSC Foundation's General Hugh Shelton Distinguished Visiting Chair of Ethics in February 2025. As a practitioner, Dr. Miller served as director for Afghanistan and Pakistan on the National Security Council staff; worked as an intelligence analyst for the Central Intelligence Agency;

and served as a military intelligence officer in the U.S. Army. Miller has authored several books, has been published in multiple journals and is a contributing editor of *Providence: A Journal of Christianity and American Foreign Policy*. Miller holds a doctorate in international relations and a bachelor's in government from Georgetown University, and a master in public policy from Harvard University.



Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Derek M. Pottinger is an ethics and world religions instructor at the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College. He has served 19 years as an active duty Army chaplain. Since 2006, he's served as battalion chaplain for infantry, support, combined arms, and engineer battalions (including two deployments to Iraq 2007-2009 and 2010-2011); brigade chaplain for 3rd Recruiting Brigade (2014-2015); the ethics instructor/curriculum writer at the U.S. Army Fires Center of Excellence's Field Artillery School (2016-2020); group chaplain for the 10th Support Group, Okinawa, Japan (2020-2022); and garrison chaplain, Fort Riley, Kansas (2022-2024). Pottinger holds a Master of Theology in ethics and public policy from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, a Master of Divinity in General Ministries from Lincoln

and public policy from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, a Master of Divinity in General Ministries from Lincoln Christian University, and a master's in theology, and a bachelor's in Christian ministries from Cincinnati Christian University. He is endorsed by the Christian Churches and Churches of Christ's Chaplaincy Endorsement Commission.

#### **REAL ID Driver License**

A REAL ID is usually marked by a GOLD STAR in the upper-right hand corner, depending on the issuer.

- Meets the new federal security standards
- May be used to board domestic flights
- Enter MILITARY BASES, secure federal facilities, and nuclear power plants starting May 7, 2025
- Anyone coming onto base as a sponsored guest after the deadline will need a Real ID.
- ↓ U.S. Department of Defense ID, including IDs issued
  to dependents are considered to be Real ID compliant.



#### Standard Driver License

It will not have a gold star marking in the upper-right hand corner. If you plan to fly domestically, a REAL ID is recommended.

- Does not meet the new federal security standards
- Cannot use to board domestic flights starting after the new May 7, 2025 deadline
- Cannot use to enter military bases, secure federal facilities, or nuclear power plants starting May 7,2025

**REAL ID** is a federal security credential added to State-Issued Driver Licenses and Identification Cards that establishes a minimum security standard required for specific activities.

- Munson Army Health Center is currently scheduling **ROUTINE EYE EXAMS** with the optometrist for school-aged beneficiaries ages 6 years and older. Call the appointment line at 913-684-6250 to schedule an eye exam.
- The NUTRITION CARE DIVISION offers a broad range of nutritional services designed for service members, families, and retirees. Individual Nutrition Therapy and Group Nutrition Therapy are available, and include the Body Composition Program, Weight Control Program, Prenatal Nutrition and Wellness for Life. - SEASONAL ALLERGY MEDICATIONS are available from the MAHC Pharmacy at no cost. Simply come to the pharmacy and fill out the OTC request form. ## Act by March 31 to stay enrolled in TRICARE

FALLS CHURCH, VIRGINIA — \*Note: This article was originally published Jan. 21. It was updated Feb. 24 to reflect the payment deadline extension to March 31.\*

Do you currently live in the West Region? (https://tricare.mil/west)

Or, do you live in one of the six states (Arkansas, Illinois, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Texas, Wisconsin) that moved to the West Region Jan. 1, 2025, as part of TRICARE's new regional contracts? (https://tricare.mil/changes)

If you pay for your TRICARE coverage using a bank electronic funds transfer, credit card or debit card, you must securely give your recurring payment information to the West Region contractor, TriWest Healthcare Alliance.

The Defense Health Agency has extended the payment deadline for those enrolled in a TRICARE premiumbased plan (TRICARE Young Adult, TRICARE Reserve Select, and TRICARE Retired Reserve). You now have until March 31 to provide your payment information to TriWest.

If you have TRICARE Prime or TRICARE Select, you also have until March 31 to pay your fees.

If you don't act before these dates, you'll be disenrolled, retroactive to Jan. 1.

"While the deadline has been extended, you shouldn't wait to take action," said Malcolm Jones, enrollment specialist, TRICARE Health Plan, at the Defense Heath Agency. "To keep your coverage, use the TriWest secure portal, mail in the payment request form, or call them to set up your pay-

mente"

You don't need to take any action

- You've already set up your payment method with TriWest. If you wish, you can log into the TriWest portal to check that your payment method is current.
- You have TRICARE For Life, the US Family Health Plan, or a TRICARE health plan overseas.
- You live in a state that's staying in the East Region. Humana Military has kept your current payment information on file. If you live in the East Region and have questions for Humana Military, call 800-444-5445.
- You don't pay enrollment fees or premiums for your TRICARE coverage. Examples include active-duty service members and their family members.
- You pay by military pay system allotment. Allotment payments have transferred automatically. If you don't already pay by allotment, consider switching for the future. With allotments, you won't need to worry about updating your TRICARE payment method during any future contract changes, or if you get a new credit or debit card. To learn how to set up payment by allotment, check out the Defense Financing and Accounting Allotments page Service's https://www.dfas.mil/RetiredMilitary/manage/allotments/.

How to set up your payments

The easiest and fastest way to set up your payments with TriWest is through the secure portal at https://tricare-bene.triwest.com/signin.

• Visit the TriWest portal at

https://tricare-bene.triwest.com/signin.

- Select the "New User? Sign Up Now" option.
- You'll be asked to input your email address. A verification code will be sent to you.
- Check your e-mail for the verification code. Then, enter it to continue. Ensure you enter the correct Benefits Number when asked. Enter your Benefits Number without dashes. (You can obtain your 11-digit Benefits Number from the back of your Uniformed Services ID card. See https://www.tricare.mil/Plans/Eligibility/IDCards/ShowingYourID to locate your Benefits Number on your ID card. It provides a picture graph of ID and CAC cards showing your Benefits Number, which is different than your DOD ID number.)
- Complete the information requested (name, address, etc.) in the secure forms.
  - Select your payment method.
  - Complete all fields.
  - Submit.

You can also download an Automatic Monthly TRICARE Payment Set Up Request form on www.tricare.mil/west. Complete the form and mail it to the address on page 2. This form is for recurring monthly payments.

If you run into any issues with these options, call TriWest customer service at 888-TRIWEST (874-9378) and provide your payment information over the phone. Call volume is heavy now, so please be patient.

Act now to ensure you and your family maintain your coverage for 2025.
