Army Corrections Brigade hosts wellness day

The Army Corrections Brigade hosted a Family Wellness Day Feb. 2 at McHugh Training Center. The event was intended to empower ACB families to be ready and resilient.

To prepare for the event, the holistic preventive care team identified trends that affected the readiness, health and well-being of the formation. For negative effects, information, education and resources would be applied. For positive effects, the team worked to amplify the effects.

This work cannot be done alone, it requires a village. The Fort Leavenworth community came together in an incredible way to support the Griffin Brigade's service members, families, and civilians by showcasing support providers and programs available, with more than 30 community agencies represented.

The brigade soldiers and spouses serve as a team and have a duty to support and honor that. Army families know when you care. They shouldn't meet the leaders for the first time on their best or worst days; there needs to be an established rapport, a relationship of trust that's built over time.

The Wellness Day agenda included a Spiritual Wellness Program overview, a quality-of-life-focused Garrison brief, an ACB Wellness Program discussion, and a "Stay Ready!" session given by the Ready and Resilient Performance Center.

Many organizations provided informational booths with resources for military families.

Reagan Sawyer, Army Community Service Relocation Program manager, noted the Fort Leavenworth Employment Readiness Program Team Facebook Page as a resource for job fair and employment information. Other resources and opportunities presented included the Military Spouse Education and Career Opportunities (MySECO) program for education and career guidance for military spouses, Strong-

hold Food Pantry for food, diapers and other military family needs, services such as the Neighborhood Navigator to learn about communities and tax consultation provided by Military OneSource, as well as child care solutions.

"In January, the Department of Defense implemented its new fee schedule for on-base child care designed to reduce fees for lower income military families. Addition-

ally, the Military Child Care in Your Neighborhood (MCCYN) is a DoD fee assistance program for eligible families who cannot access military-operated child care due to distance or waitlists," said Carole Hoffman, Child and Youth Services coordinator. "With fee assistance, a portion of your child care costs is paid to offset the costs of community-based care. This makes it easier for families to afford quality child care from

local community providers."

Unit commanders and their senior enlisted leaders were also present to meet and talk with the ACB families.

This interactive event provided families access to valuable tools and community resources to improve their overall well-being and quality-of-life.

The brigade intends for the Wellness Day to be an annual event.

Member of 6888th dies just shy of 101

Lena Derriecott Bell King quietly departed her earthly life Jan. 18, 2024, nine days before her 101st birthday on Jan 27, 2024.

She was born Jan. 27, 1923, in Washington, Georgia, the only child of Henry and Emma Jane Derriecott.

Lena was named after her grandmother, Lena Austin. At age 1, Lena's parents moved to her dad's hometown of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in the Germantown Section, a neighborhood of different races and cultures. After her parents' divorce, Lena lived with her mother and aunt. Her mother started a community garden, and all were welcome. In her grandfather's eyes, Lena could do no wrong. At an early age, Lena was active in local and national civic causes. She joined the local radio show fan club called "Grace Granger" and joined the National Youth Administration organized by First Lady Eleanor Roosevelt, whom she got to meet on a trip to Washington, D.C. One of Lena's childhood friends, Abram David, joined the Army Air Force and was killed in action during a combat mission. This inspired Lena to enlist in the Army Air Force at the age of 18.

Cpl. Lena Derriecott Bell (King) started her Army active-duty service Dec. 15, 1943, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She completed basic training at Fort Des Moines, Iowa, and her first duty assignment was as a nurse at Douglas Army Airfield near Bisbee, Arizona. While stationed at Douglas, she met fellow Women's Army Corps member Pfc. Alma M. Philpot. Both enlisted in Philadelphia and became best friends. She met and married Drill Sergeant Hugh T. Bell. With his concurrence, she volunteered for overseas duty. Lena and this unique cadre of Women's Army Corps members completed overseas screening and light combat training at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia, and departed by train in late January 1945 for Camp Shanks, New York. On Feb. 3, 1945, the women boarded the SS Ile de France and departed for Europe, as the first predominantly

black WAC unit to deploy overseas. The ship arrived in Glasgow, Scotland, on Feb. 12, 1945, and Lena and more than 700 other women boarded a train and arrived in Birmingham, England, late that same afternoon.

Lena was assigned to the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, nicknamed the "Six Triple Eight." This unit consisted of 855 women and was the only battalion-size unit of predominantly African American females who served overseas during World War II. The mission in Birmingham was to clear the more than two years of backlog of mail in the European Theater of Operations, in six months. The unit's motto was "No Mail, Low Morale." Under the leadership of Maj. Charity Adams, they worked around the clock, three eight-hour shifts, seven days a week in harsh wartime conditions and rat-infested warehouses to clear the backlog of more than 17 million pieces of letters and packages in just three months. This broke all Army records. After England, the unit was reassigned to Rouen and Paris, France, from May 1945 to March 1946 to clear the backlog of mail.

By now the war was over and service members were waiting to return to the United States. In May 1945, Lena entered her name into an educational lottery and was selected for design school in Leicester, England. She finished design school and returned to the United States at Fort Dix, New Jersey, where she was honorably discharged Feb. 11, 1946.

She returned home to Philadelphia, and later Lena and her husband moved to Los Angeles, California, and had two children.

Lena used her G.I. Bill for the education benefits to obtain a registered nurse degree. She worked at Kaiser Permanente Hospital in West Los Angeles, where she was one of the Big 4, which was an elitist group of nurses. In 1971, she met and married Larry King. They were happily married for more than 20 years until his death.

After retiring from nursing in 1986, Lena moved to Las Vegas, Nevada, a city

that she loved. She loved to cook, was a faithful member of Desert United Methodist Church, was a community activist, and always had a birthday party.

Like many World War II Veterans, Lena did not talk much about her service. For 75 years, the Six Triple Eight did not receive public acknowledgment for the mission the unit's members accomplished. It was not until 2015, that retired Navy Cmdr. Carlton Philpot had a dream to build a monument honoring their unsurpassed mission accomplishments. Lena and four other members of the 6888th attended the Nov. 30, 2018, dedication of the 6888th monument at Fort Leavenworth. Lena credited Philpot for bringing their

history to the international spotlight, for giving them a parade they never had, and for obtaining the public recognition and honors the unit and its members received for their service. She was extremely pleased that Tyler Perry is making a movie about the 6888th to be released later this year.

In 2016, the Army Women's Foundation inducted the Six Triple Eight into its Hall of Fame. In February 2019, the Army posthumously awarded the 6888th its only award for exemplary performance, the Meritorious Unit Commendation. In May 2019, the U.S. ambassador to the United Kingdom dedicated a Blue Plaque at the King Edwards School in Birmingham, England, to mark

where the 6888th was stationed. In October 2019, Lena and the other surviving 6888th members received the 2019 Audie Murphy Award during the nationally televised American Valor Awards ceremony. She was also an Honor Roll Awardee at the World War II National Museum, New Orleans, Louisiana. On March 14, 2022, President Joe Biden signed the Six Triple Eight U.S. Congressional Gold Medal Act of 2021 into law. The medal is the highest civilian award in the United States.

Lena was preceded in death by her parents; husband, Larry King; daughter, Margo Bell Meshack; son, Gregory Bell; and special friend, Charles Glover. She is survived by her grand-

daughter, Amber Meshack; her niece, Bobbie J. Leonard; her nephew, Thomas Crawford; great niece, Kimberly Leonard; great nephew, Derrick Collins; godson, Clynton Lowry; great friends Patrick and Suzie McCue, Gloria Rahman, Rev. Helen Jones, Norma Kidd, Carolyn Barge, Carlton G. Philpot, Sen. Patricia Spearman, Barbara Lewis, Elizabeth Helm-Frazier, Tyler Perry, Carlota Espinosa, Keri Selig, the 6888th family, her favorite ninth-grade mentee from Minnesota Olivia Halunen, her favorite TV personality Al Roker, and many other friends and supporters.

Army Nurse Corps officers at MAHC part of 123-year Army legacy

Munson Army Health Center celebrated the 123rd birthday of the U.S. Army Nurse Corps Feb. 2, which included recognizing four of MAHC's own.

Lt. Col. Gwendolyn O'Keefe

Lt. Col. Gwendolyn O'Keefe, MAHC deputy commander for nursing, is the senior nurse manager providing oversight of all nursing operations at MAHC and is part of the clinical leadership team.

"It has been a very rewarding 20 years. I've told my junior officers to take every opportunity in the Army and 'grow where you are planted,'" O'Keefe said, explaining that one take-away from her deployments is that people have to make things work, because sometimes lives depend on it.

Her assignments include traditional inpatient care at stateside medical centers equipped with cutting-edge technology and deployments in Iraq and Afghanistan caring for service members in the most austere environments. She has also provided patient care to thousands in the air over the Pacific Ocean with a Critical Care Transport Team conducting aeromedical evacuation missions of critically ill patients back to the United States.

Maj. Meredith Steggerda

Maj. Meredith Steggerda, MAHC chief of Public Health, is an adviser on public health matters, promoting health and wellness to prevent disease and injury of soldiers and military retirees, their families, and Army civilian employees at Fort Leavenworth through workplace and community health.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Steggerda was assigned to a field hospital and deployed halfway around the world to the Middle East on a force health protection mission. She and her team were sent to monitor and care for service members and Defense Department civilians in the region against the emerging disease.

"We set up a contained mobile medical unit where we could care for patients and provide relief, evacuate those needing a higher level of care, and work to contain spikes in disease," she said, capturing the essence of the Army Nurse Corps, providing responsive and innovative nursing care integrated with the Army Medical Team to enhance readiness, preserve life and function, and to promote health and wellness

for all those entrusted to its care.

Maj. Courtney Pernia

Maj. Courtney Pernia, MAHC chief of ambulatory nursing, oversees primary care teams and programs in the health center's Patient-Centered Medical Homes.

"I always had a passion for nursing on my heart. I'm very thankful that I had the opportunity to support the Army's mission to take care of soldiers, family members and retirees," Pernia said. "Nurses are well known as one of the most trusted professions across the country, and I think adding the Army name to that lends even more confidence."

Capt. Seth Hemker

Capt. Seth Hemker, currently serving in an administrative role as MAHC's Medical Company commander, is responsible for the training, management and readiness of soldiers at the health center.

"What I like about the Nurse Corps is that there are so many things we can do, from direct patient care on an inpatient floor, to company command positions, to recruiting," Hemker said.

In addition to current requirements to join the Army, applicants for the Army Nurse Corps must complete a bachelor of science degree in nursing from an accredited college or university and maintain a license to practice nursing. As members of

the Army, they must also maintain proficiency in skills common to all soldiers.

The Army Nurse Corps provides nursing staff in support of U.S. Army and DoD medical plans. The corps serves in a variety of environments from military treatment facilities like MAHC to expeditionary units like field hospitals, forward surgical teams, and aeromedical evacuation units.

The diversity of assignments provides these soldiers the opportunity to "be all they can be" and for them is part of the appeal of Army nursing.

CAC, AU host Directors of Training Conference

FORT LEAVENWORTH – The 2024 Directors of Training Conference was hosted by the Combined Arms Center and Army University Jan. 23-25 at Fort Leavenworth.

Representatives from the centers of excellence and Army schools gathered to share ideas on how to meet the high demand for flexible, but effective training and instruction for soldiers across the Army, how to strengthen relationships to bolster these fast-pace changes and discuss actional plans to solve gaps they identified in the Army 2023 learning environment.

“The DOT Conference is a sleeves-up event. It’s an opportunity to have all the right people in the room at once to really make some decisions and accomplish some things,” Army University Provost Brig. Gen. David Foley said.

The Army’s perpetual pursuit of lethality requires constant adaptation to current operating systems and procedures.

The revolving door of modernization requires the most up-to-date and accurate training and education on the latest technologies, doctrine, equipment and methods.

Training goes beyond instruction with PowerPoint and falls to the Army’s Directors of Training (DOTs) and doctrine across the force’s centers of excellence to ensure each piece of instruction delivered aids in the soldier’s ability to fight and win in a contested environment.

Keeping pace with policy and leader initiatives require training to be adaptive, nimble, and improve quickly.

How DOTs can accomplish that without losing core lessons or falling behind was one topic discussed during the conference.

Through a series of working

groups and panel discussions, the DOTs analyzed the structure of the DOT community for potential improvement, ways to strengthen collaboration across training and doctrine leads, and resource options and stressors to meet critical and shifting priorities.

Outcomes and potential plans of actions were presented to Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth Commanding General Lt. Gen. Milford Beagle Jr., Deputy to the CAC Commanding General Gregg Thompson, and Army University Deputy Provost Michael Johnson.

The 2024 DOT Conference was the first since 2019 due to the pandemic.

The event is usually conducted annually to assist DOTs and the Army learning environment community remain agile and aligned to provide critical training and education of an Army moving toward senior leadership priorities.

New connection between training tools eliminates information gap

Linking Army Unit Calendar with Digital Training Management System

The Training Management Directorate at Fort Leavenworth, working in coordination with Army Forces Command and the Army G3, launched a new capability Jan. 25 to link the Army Synchronization Tool/Army Unit Calendar (AST/AUC) with the calendar in the Digital Training Management System (DTMS).

The AST/AUC and DTMS now have a data connection that eliminates a digital information gap across echelons. The previous data gap resulted in a manual process to enter relevant Army Unit Cal-

endar training event data into DTMS to allow planning and calendar refinement.

The manual process to transcribe event data from AST/AUC to DTMS was time-consuming, subject to clerical copy errors, and generally an impediment to the doctrinal planning process.

Realizing that both AST/AUC and DTMS had existing data connections with Army Vantage, the Training Management Directorate worked with FORSCOM to reconfigure the current data ex-

changes to enable Army Vantage to forward the AST/AUC source data to DTMS. Leaders at the unit level now have the ability to visualize, manage, validate, synchronize, plan and deconflict friction points based on a holistic view of unit availability.

Army Regulation 350-1, Army Training and Leader Develop-

ment, directs commanders and leaders to employ the Army Training Management System (ATMS) to plan, resource and manage unit training and to access Army standard training products. The AUC-DTMS data connection will reduce data-entry errors and allow training managers at the brigade level to incorporate their

commanders’ training objectives into key ReARMM (Regionally Aligned Readiness and Modernization Model) events. In other words, it will save time, fill a crucial data gap, and contribute to overall combat readiness.

The Training Management Directorate at Fort Leavenworth is the Army proponent for training management, and the executive agent of the Combined Arms Center for Army training doctrine ADP 7-0 Training and FM 7-0 Training. TMD is also the functional proponent for the Army Training Management System, which includes the Army Training Network and the Digital Training Management System.



100 percent of Army housing to be inspected

by Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities

Congress has mandated the inspection of 100 percent of all family housing on Army installations by a third-party contractor appointed by the Department of the Army.

On behalf of the Army Housing Office, Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities is sharing the "Family Housing Letter," at right, from the Department of the Army.

Residents should have received a door hanger last week, prompting them to scan the barcode in order to schedule an appointment for an upcoming housing inspection in their home.

The inspection period will begin Feb. 6 and extend throughout the month, concluding on or around Feb. 29.

These inspections aim to gather information on the current state of privatized housing inventory, and residents can anticipate inspections in their homes lasting approximately 60-90 minutes.

Certified inspectors, independent of Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities, the housing project owner, and Fort Leavenworth Government, will conduct these inspections. They will assess home interiors, building systems, common areas, property exteriors and drainage from the homes, and landscaping to identify

and address any potential life, health and safety issues.

Congressional oversight mandates that these inspections are not optional.

Residents will be contacted by the third-party inspectors, if an appointment is not scheduled in advance.

The Department of the Army initiative aligns with several National Defense Authorization Act mandates aimed at enhancing privatized military housing programs. Ensuring safe housing for service members and their families is a top priority for the Army, as well as for Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities.

It is important to note that this initiative does not interfere with the normal operating hours of Fort Leavenworth Frontier Heritage Communities. The FLFHC Community Management office and Maintenance office will remain available for all housing and maintenance questions and work order requests during and after the inspection process.
