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AMSC transforms Civilian Education System

As part of the Army Transformation Initiative, the Army Management Staff College is realigning and reforming Army civilian professional education.

While several course changes went into effect Oct. 1, the Civilian Education System will remain a key leadership development program for Army civilian professionals with enhanced learning experiences.

Established in 1987, AMSC has experienced changes over the years, to include organizational mergers, policy changes and the creation of the Civilian Education System in 2007.

Julia Bell, acting director of AMSC, said the system offers structured education through multiple modalities at critical career points, helping supervisors build the skills, training and knowledge needed to lead effectively.

"The Army Management Staff College remains committed to its mission to educate and develop the Army Civilian Corps for leadership and management responsibilities throughout the Army," Bell said.

Course rebranding

AMSC will continue to offer all leader development education for Army Civilian Professionals to include the Foundation, Basic and Intermediate courses.

Some of these courses will be renamed with little to no change to the existing curriculum.

The Basic and Intermediate Courses will become the Direct Leadership Course and the Organizational Leadership Course to better align with established leadership frameworks found in the Army Doctrine Publication 6-22, Army Leadership and the Profession.

The self-paced distance learning Organizational Leader Development Course is changing to the Leader Development

Course, while the Continued Education for Senior Leader – Strategic Leadership will be introduced as an executive seminar aligning with the Strategic Leadership Level.

Course elimination

Recent workforce reductions through the Deferred Resignation Program necessitated elimination of some course offerings.

Eliminated courses include the Advanced Course, virtual offerings of the Secretary of the Army Leader Development Seminar, the Data Foundations Seminar, and the Business Transformation Seminar.

Department realignment

In addition to the course name changes and realignments, the structure within AMSC will see adjustments to allow for continued support to civilian education and training.

Two synchronous CES teaching departments are merging to deliver education for Army civilians in grades GS 10-15. The new department will offer the Organizational Leadership Course, the Enterprise Leadership Course, and the Continuing Education for Senior Leaders-Strategic Leadership Seminar.

Despite the changes, AMSC will continue to offer a varied and practical approach to learning to prepare civilian professionals and equip them with the tools they need to succeed and make a real impact as leaders.

"There is no time better than the present for Army civilians to continue self-development and no better way to do it than through the Army Management Staff College Civilian Education System premier leader development experience," Bell said.

Fort Leavenworth Hunt hosts horse show



Residents urged to know risks of lithiumion batteries this Fire Prevention Week

The theme for Fire Prevention Week™, October 5–11, 2025, is "Charge into Fire Safety™: Lithium-Ion Batteries

The Fort Leavenworth Fire Department and the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) — the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 100 years — are promoting this year's FPW campaign, "Charge into Fire Safety: Lithium-Ion Batteries in Your Home." The campaign highlights how important it is to buy, charge and recycle lithium-ion batteries safely.

Most of the electronics we use in our homes every day — smartphones, tablets, power and lawn tools, laptops, ecigarettes, headphones and toys, to name just a few — are powered by lithium-ion batteries. In fact, most things that are rechargeable use this type of battery.

If not used correctly or if damaged, lithium-ion batteries can overheat, start a fire or even explode. To reduce these risks, look around your home — it's important to know which devices are powered by them.

Buy only listed products.

When buying a product that uses a lithium-ion battery, take time to research it. Look for a stamp from a nationally recognized testing lab on the packaging and product, which means that it meets important safety standards.

Some products sold online and in stores may not meet safety standards and could increase the risk of fire.

Charge devices safely.

Always use the cords that came with the product to charge it. Follow the instructions from the manufacturer.

If you need a new charger, buy one from the manufacturer or one that the manufacturer has approved.

Charge your device on a hard surface. Don't charge it under a pillow, on a bed or on a couch. This could cause a

Don't overcharge your device. Unplug it or remove the battery when it's fully charged.

Recycle batteries responsibly.

Don't throw lithium-ion batteries in the trash or regular recycling bins because they could catch fire.

Recycling your device or battery at a safe battery recycling location is the best way to dispose of them. Visit call2recycle.org to find a recycling spot near you.

NFPA encourages residents to be aware of their devices, follow the "Buy, Charge, and Recycle Safely" approach, and support this year's FPW theme, "Charge into Fire Safety."





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TRADOC inactivation marks new chapter in Army transformation

JOINT BASE LANGLEY-EU-STIS, Va. — The U.S. Army Training and Doctrine Command was officially inactivated during a ceremony Sept. 26 at Fort Eustis, Virginia. The ceremony marks the beginning of the establishment of the U.S. Army Transformation and Training Command, set to officially activate Oct. 2 with a ceremony at the new headquarters in Austin, Texas.

The establishment of T2COM comes after Secretary of the Army Daniel Driscoll announced the Army Transformation Initiative — an effort aimed to accelerate transformation and improve force structure to ensure the Army remains the world's more lethal and ready land force. The new command represents a significant investment in the Army's future and reflects the Army's ongoing effort to modernize and prepare for future challenges.

For 52 years, TRADOC has helped shape and modernize the Army through training, doctrine and leader development.

The inactivation ceremony opened with a presentation of flags recognizing each of the TRADOC subordinate commands. The TRADOC colors were then cased by TRADOC Commanding General Gen. Gary M. Brito and TRADOC Command Sgt. Maj. Raymond S. Harris, signifying the end of the command's distinguished service to the country.

Chief of Staff of the Army Gen. Randy A. George was the presiding officer of the ceremony. He shared his praise for the command's achievements over the years, recognizing the expansiveness of TRADOC's influence across the

"Every soldier in our formation has passed through TRADOC and has been trained, developed and impacted by people in this command," he said. "They learn what right looks like at TRADOC and carry those habits and lessons with them to their formations."

George emphasized that although the command is inactivating, it is leaving a lasting legacy on the Army. He said that when people look back on TRADOC's history they will see an organization that delivered things that always mattered — winning doctrine, trained soldiers and leaders who thrive in uncertainty.

"The secretary of the Army and I look forward to seeing the foundation you built here carried forward in T2COM," George said.

Following George's remarks, Brito took to the podium to share the accomplishments of TRADOC over the years and reflect on his time serving in the command.

"We have amazing talent up and down the formation, talent that has experienced successes and challenges, but this talented team always delivered for the Army," he said.

During his time as the 18th TRADOC commanding general, Brito led multiple initiatives in support of the greater Army, including the establishment of the Future Soldier Preparatory Course, updates to the Holistic Health and Fitness initiative and the expansion of data literacy training.

Brito closed his remarks emphasizing his appreciation for the people who made TRADOC the success it was until its very last

day.

"TRADOC drove change like no other Army institution. I am very proud of all you have done. Although these cased colors close one chapter, you will be an integral part of the next chapters yet to be written."

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MAHC offers walk-in flu vaccine clinics at FCC in October, November

Munson Army Health Center will begin its annual seasonal influenza vaccine campaign with four walkin dates at the Frontier Conference Center, 350 Biddle Blvd., for TRICARE beneficiaries ages 6 months and older.

Beneficiaries can receive their flu shot on the following dates:

- Noon to 5 p.m. Oct. 3 (Friday)
- Noon to 4 p.m. Oct. 17 (Friday)
- Noon to 6 p.m. Nov. 7 (Friday)
- Noon to 6 p.m. Nov. 18 (Tuesday)

Beneficiaries in all TRI-CARE categories — including TRICARE Prime, TRICARE Select and TRI-CARE For Life - can receive their vaccines at the walk-in events at the FCC. Beneficiaries ages 10 years and older must present their Department of Defense identification card. Children 17 years and younger must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian.

The flu vaccine will also be available for eligible military retirees and their family members from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. Oct. 25 at the Lewis and Clark Center during Fort Leavenworth Retiree Appreciation Day.

"Getting vaccinated against influenza each year is the best way to protect yourself, your family and your community," said 1st Lt. Kennedy Reeves, a pub-

lic health nurse and chief of MAHC's Department of Public Health. "Flu can lead to serious illness, hospitalization or even death, especially among young children, older adults and those with certain medical

conditions."

Reeves added that influenza viruses change from year to year, making annual vaccination important. The flu vaccine reduces the risk of infection, and for those who do become ill, it can

lessen the severity and duration of symptoms.

Common symptoms of influenza include fever, cough, sore throat, muscle aches and fatigue. Complications can include pneumonia, worsening of

chronic medical conditions, and in some cases, lifethreatening outcomes.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommend annual flu vaccination for everyone 6 months and older, unless

otherwise advised by a healthcare provider.

"To succeed, you have to fail." Brown delivers Powell Lecture to CGSC Class of 2026

Retired Gen. Robert B. Brown presented the annual Colin L. Powell Lecture for students of the Command and General Staff College Class of 2026 Sept. 10 in Eisenhower Auditorium at the Lewis and Clark Center.

Brown is a former commanding general of the Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth, former commandant of CGSC and former commander of U.S. Army Pacific. He currently serves as the president and CEO of the Association of the U.S. Army in Arlington, Virginia.

"When I was sitting where you are, Colin Powell actually gave us the best lecture that I've ever heard," Brown said to the assembled class. "I took pages of notes and used it my whole career. He was an amazing leader, and I had the opportunity, the privilege, to work with him a few times. He was an amazing person and leader, and so what an honor to be here for the Colin Powell Lecture Series."

Brown then went on to deliver his presentation entitled "To succeed, you have to fail."

"I tell you honestly, I'd rather sit up here and tell you a few good things I did over the years," Brown said, "but you wouldn't learn as much. You learn a lot from failure."

Brown talked about his understanding of using failure as a stepping stone to success by describing an incident in his unit when he was a battalion commander. No one was hurt, but while conducting Bradley fighting vehicle gunnery, one of his troops accidentally shot a training round and hit an Apache helicopter that was flying on a gunnery range adjacent to the range his unit was using.


"It was very tough," Brown said. "I was ready to quit, and I'm not a quitter."

He described his conversation with his wife, who was obviously part of his support network along with his battalion command sergeant major. With the support of his network and his chain of command, he hung on and deployed on a mission to Bosnia where his unit performed very well.

Brown said the incident was an incredible attention-getter for all of the officers and NCOs, and ironically provided his unit with an advantage going into the deployment. They benefitted from taking a newly-reinforced look at details that helped them on several occasions during the deployment.

"I became a better leader," Brown said. "You cannot succeed without failure. It's impossible. The only way you don't fail is that you're doing nothing...and that's failure. I'm not saying it's not painful. Going through things makes you stronger, and we don't talk about it enough."

Brown then discussed some other historical examples of using failure as a stepping stone to success, such as in the case of President Abraham Lincoln, who endured personal

and political tragedies before finally being elected president, and even then he had to persevere through a civil war to preserve the Union and end slavery, proving that resilience, or "grit" as Brown said he preferred to call it, leads to success.

Brown also spoke about George Washington and Gen. Ulysses S. Grant having multiple failures before finally being successful.

Brown said the failures couldn't be from illegal, immoral or unethical situations, but from simply trying to do the right thing and having bad things happen in the process.

"True, lasting resilience is forged in the fires of adversity," he said.

He talked about research into the psychological and neuroscientific insights about the role of failure in deeper learning and growth. He described some strategies to use for handling failure, such as taking ownership, building self-awareness, shifting personal mindsets to see challenges as learning opportunities, and learning to build a support network of peers and mentors who offer honest feedback.

Part of his presentation was to encourage the students to change their attitudes about failure and taking risks. He said that reframing failure as a way to learn and grow was the best approach, and that avoiding failure by avoiding risks was a guarantee for mediocrity.

Brown concluded his remarks by citing his favorite quote, "Man in the Arena" by Theodore Roosevelt.

"See failure as a journey, learn from failure and embrace grit, resilience," Brown said. "I hope you got some good lessons from this that will help you in the future."

After the Powell Lecture

After presenting the Colin L. Powell Lecture, Brown spoke with School of Advanced Military Studies students. After his time with the students, Brown conducted an office call with Gregg Thompson, deputy to the commanding general, at the Combined Arms Center headquarters and then visited Leavenworth High School to speak with Junior ROTC students. Later that evening he was the keynote speaker for the CGSC Foundation's Distinguished Speaker Series dinner event in downtown Kansas City.

Foundation Chairman retired Maj. Gen. Chris Hughes introduced Brown at the dinner event, calling him the most influential mentor of his career.

Brown spoke about the Army and the nation's history, how the Army is older than the nation in light of the impending 250th anniversary of the nation next year and the Army's 250th anniversary this year. He quoted President Gerald Ford in his bicentennial remarks at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, on July 4, 1976.

"'Independence has to be defended as well as declared; freedom is always worth fighting for; and liberty ultimately belongs only to those willing to suffer for it," Brown quoted.

"The good news is, these folks (the military) are so dedicated that most Americans don't know it, take it for granted...and they shouldn't be worried about their freedom," Brown said. "But it is good if they're aware of what's going on."

In that light, Brown highlighted two examples of soldiers fighting for the nation, one from World War II and one from Korea, that exemplify the selfless service of the U.S. military: Army Staff Sgt. Herbert H. Burr, from Independence, Missouri, who was awarded the Medal of Honor

for his actions in Germany in World War II, and Army Chaplain Emil Kapaun, from Pilsen, Kansas, who was awarded the Medal of Honor posthumously for his actions in Korea, both in combat and while in a Korean prisoner of war camp where he died.

After speaking about these soldiers' selfless service, Brown opened an question-and-answer session to allow audience members to ask about current challenges and the U.S. response to counter them.

About Brown

Brown retired in 2019 with more than 38 years service, having led troops at every level. His last command assignment before retirement was as commanding general, U.S. Army Pacific in Hawaii. Prior to that assignment he served as commanding general of the Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth and commandant of the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College from February 2014 to April 2016. His other significant commands included command of I Corps and Joint Base Lewis-McChord, Washington; the U.S. Army Maneuver Center of Excellence and Fort Benning, Georgia; deputy commanding general for the 25th Infantry Division, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii; commander, 1st Brigade (Stryker) 25th Infantry Division, Joint Base Lewis-McChord; and as commander, 2nd Battalion 5th Cavalry, 1st Cavalry Division, Fort Hood, Texas.

Brown's assignments took him across the globe and included deployments in support of Operation Uphold Democracy in Haiti, Operation Joint Forge in Bosnia-Herzegovina, and two combat deployments in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Known as an innovator, team builder and leader developer, Brown was involved in significant change within the Army. He was a key leader in the development of the mod-

ular brigade and Stryker Brigade Combat Team (SBCT) as he did the operational testing and evaluation of the SBCT and then deployed it to combat as an SBCT commander. He initiated the "Squad as the Foundation of the Decisive Force" initiative while commanding the Maneuver Center of Excellence, which would lead to the most significant improvements at the small unit level in more than 60 years. He led the improvement of the Army's educational system through the development of Army University while commanding CAC and Fort Leavenworth, and he also wrote the Army's first Leader Development Doctrine in Field Manual 6-22. He led the development and implementation of the first Army Human Dimension Strategy and the future Army warfighting concept of multi-domain operations (MDO). Within MDO, he led the effort to develop the first innovative Multi-Domain Task Force (MDTF) and convinced the Army/DoD to field MDTFs within 18 months after concept development. MDTFs are now in demand by combatant commanders and making significant contributions to joint warfighting efforts across the globe.

Brown graduated in 1981 with a bachelor of science from the U.S. Military Academy, earning a commission as an infantry lieutenant. He also holds a master of education degree from the University of Virginia, and a master of science in national security and strategic studies (distinguished graduate) from National Defense University. He is also a Class of 1992 alumnus of the Command and General Staff Officer Course.

Brown was an AUSA Distinguished Senior Fellow before becoming president and CEO in October 2021. He and his wife, Dr. Patti Brown, have three daughters and seven grandchildren.

A team consists of 1 dog (pointing or flushing), 2 hunters and as many shotgun shells as desired. At least 3 game farm pheasants will be in the field for each team. The focus is on a safe, live fire training experience for the hunters and dogs finding and retrieving harvested pheasants in field conditions. Prizes are awarded to top performing teams; scoring is based on the team's combined firearms handling and hunting skills. The event is open to Club members, active duty and retired military, military dependents, Federal employees, and invited guests. Entry fees are \$75 for Club members and \$85 for non-members.
