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# **Army Corrections marks** 150th anniversary



Editor's note: This is the second in a multi-week series about the history of Army Corrections.

This week's issue of the Lamp continues the History Series, which covered the beginning of Army Corrections through post-World War II last week, and continues into the 1960s with this week's installment.

The U.S. Army is celebrating its 250th birthday this year and has been using the motto "This We'll Defend" since the Revolutionary War.

The mission of the Army is to deploy, fight and win the nation's wars by securing ready, prompt and sustained land dominance by Army forces across the full spectrum of conflict as part of the joint force.

History has documented that not everyone follows the rules of their armies, and a fraction of American soldiers have strayed from the acceptable norms.

Army Corrections did not exist at the forming of the Continental Army in 1775. For the first 99 years of the Army, there was no centralized structure for the confinement of prisoners. Discipline in the Army was harsh, and physical punishment was designed to be public with the desired effect of deterring the offender and those observing. Army and congressional leaders expressed concerns with the uniformity of treatment in Army stockades and the little control by the Army over the treatment of Army prisoners in state pris-

#### The 1960s


In the 1960s, the Army Corrections System continued to make major strides in restoring prisoners to duty and professionalizing the correctional staff.

A new vocational training building was built in partnership with the Federal Prison Industries at the U.S. Disciplinary Barracks. It provided training areas for woodworking, graphic arts and furniture repair. Prisoners earned certificates from the Bureau of Apprenticeship, U.S. Department of Labor.

In the mid-1960s, the Army Corrections Program consisted of two types of facilities. There were installation stockades, where the short-term offenders were confined, and the USDB, where long-term offenders were confined. From 1965-1968, the prisoner population increased from 4,300 to 8,300, with nearly one-half of the total population in stockades in pre-trial confinement status.

The 1960s in America was a decade of civil, social and political unrest involving the protesting of the Vietnam War, the movement for civil rights, the increased use of illegal drugs and lawbreakers. The Army, being a microcosm of American society, was having its share of soldiers

# Slow down, pay attention, save a life when encountering tractors on roadways

Editor's note: This article was posted on Facebook after the author's husband was injured when the tractor he was driving in Leavenworth County was struck by a motorist earlier this month. The accident resulted in injuries for both parties, as well as significant property damage. Since then, at least two other farmers driving tractors in the county have been struck by motorists.

Tractors on the road is something that some may never encounter, while for others it's just part of daily life.

Regardless of whether you've never encountered them on the road or you often do, awareness and patience is so incredibly important.

These folks aren't out to inconvenience your drive or make you late to work.

They are husbands and wives, sons and daughters, fathers and mothers.

They are chasing their livelihood just like generations before them have. It's ingrained in their DNA. They work sun up 'til sun down. In the freezing cold

and blowing snow or the scorching heat with the sun beating down, they continue on with their work. They raise the cattle, the hogs, the hay and so many crops. If this post raises awareness, makes someone pay better attention or think twice and can help prevent another accident, its done is job. That extra awareness and extra patience could save a life, including yours.

Remember that's someone's husband or wife, son or daughter, father or mother chasing their livelihood.

God bless farmers.



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# MAHC's Patient, Family Partnership Council shapes improvements in care

After a busy summer surge that saw hundreds of military families depart and arrive at Fort Leavenworth, Munson Army Health Center hosted its quarterly Pa-Family and Partnership Council Aug. 15, welcoming back returning members and introducing new voices to the team.

The MAHC PFPC is still welcoming more volunteers to strengthen the program.

"The PFPC serves as a forum where TRICARE beneficiaries who use Munson partner directly with health center leaders to share feedback, exchange ideas and shape improvements in care delivery," said Tim Stevens, MAHC's chief of Quality and Safety, and PFPC council director. "By

combining the insight of experienced council members with the perspectives of newcomers, the group strengthens its ability to represent the diverse needs of the Fort Leavenworth community."

The council nominated Erin Avera to serve as co-chair, representing the patient perspective.

"Bringing together returning and new council members creates a strong foundation for open dialogue," said Stevens. "Their perspectives guide us as we continue to build trust and improve care for our community."

During the meeting, council members reviewed upcoming initiatives, discussed

opportunities to enhance the beneficiary experience and offered feedback on patient services.

Topics covered in the meeting included: • School and sports physicals

This summer, MAHC provided more than 1,200 school and sports physicals for military families.

• After-hours clinic

While overall access to care remains good, recent provider and support staff vacancies limit proposed in-person afterhours primary care at this time. The council discussed leveraging virtual and in-person urgent care TRICARE options to supplement after-hours services.

Pharmacy

A council member asked if the pharmacy could provide a printed medication guide rather than a QR code. To reduce paper waste, the pharmacy prints prescription information but uses a QR code on the bottle for the manufacturer's information. Printed copies are available upon request. To save time, request printed information when activating the prescription at the window, through Q-Anywhere, or the call cen-

Note: 24-hour ScriptCenter access is delayed because interior lobby doors lack after-hours security. A \$25,000 renovation is needed to upgrade the hardware, comply with fire and building codes, and allow 24/7 access, Stevens said.

Leaders emphasized that collaboration with patients is vital to ensuring MAHC provides safe, high-quality, patient-centered

The PFPC meets regularly throughout the year and remains an important bridge between patients, families and the health center team. The windows were moved in 2007 from Bell Hall (demolished in 2008) to the Lewis and Clark Center, where they extend up the side of the building three floors. The panels, mostly gifts to the Command and General Staff College from several years of classes, were refurbished before being placed in the new building.

"I love art, and I have a whole art area in our basement at

my house," she said. "I like to paint. I really like sketching, too — that's usually what I do. I love flowers, and I like drawing people, and I love drawing eyeballs for some reason."

Elizabeth said she enjoys drawing de-

tailed images, and she wants to try to draw even more realistically for her next art project.

She said when she creates something ex-

"I think I'd share if I really, really did

something that, like, 'Whoa, I did not know I could do that.' Then that's usually what I share with my friends and my family members and stuff that really interests me," she said.

violating rules and regulations, resulting in confinement in Army stockades worldwide.

Guard duty at Army stockades was temporary duty for 30-day periods for junior enlisted soldiers. These soldiers, selected by their company leaders, were not the "cream of the crop" and looked upon the stockade duty as demeaning. Some leaders selected problem soldiers to illustrate to them what it was like to be confined. The lack of training or professionalism by guards sparked massive riots in many stateside stockades and at Long Binh Jail in Vietnam. Several future USDB commandants gained valuable experience at Long Binh Jail.

In 1967, The U.S. Army Military Police School (USAMPS) identified this shortcoming and established a correctional course designed for the MP soldiers in the 95B military occupational skill in the junior-enlisted ranks of privates, second and third class, and with an age restriction of at least 20 years old. This course complemented the already established corrections courses for MP commissioned officers and non-commissioned officers. In 1969, the MP Corps refined the standard and established the 95C MOS correctional specialist, with permanent duty in Army stockades.


The 1968 Military Correctional Facilities Act amended public law and Title 10 United States Code to require service secretaries to provide for the education, training, rehabilitation and welfare of offenders confined in military correctional facilities. This eliminated the disparity among the military department's provisions on correctional facilities and treatment of people convicted by courtsmartial. The Department of Defense implemented the 1968 Military Correctional Facilities Act by issuing DoD Instruction 1235.4, Treatment of Military Prisoners and Administration of Military Correction Facilities.

In 1969, the U.S. Army Correctional Training Facility was established at Camp Funston at Fort Riley, Kansas. The CTF's 10-week training cycle was designed to return the maximum number of Army prisoners to duty and reduce to a minimum the loss of manpower resulting from confinement of soldiers. From 1969 to its closure in 1992, it qualified approximately 30,000 soldiers for return to duty.

#### The 1970s

In 1970, a group of expert civilian penologists conducted a comprehensive analysis and evaluation of the Army Confinement System, which was a three-tier system. The first tier was stockades, later renamed installation detention facilities, housing pretrial and short-term post-trial prisoners. The second tier was the U.S. Army Retraining Brigade, later renamed U.S. Army Correctional Brigade (USACB), providing a return-toduty program. The third tier was the USDB, housing long-term prisoners.

The "Report of the Special Civilian Committee for the Study of the United States Army Confinement System identified the Army Confinement System" was being plagued with similar problems as civilian corrections systems: personnel problems, riots, overcrowding and a weak decentralized management structure. The study recommended an Army correctional command be established and all Army Confinement

System facilities would fall under the direction of the provost marshal general. Additionally, it found only 32.4 percent of the stockade's authorized 1,492 95C MOS positions were filled with 95C soldiers. This was no surprise since the 95C MOS was still in its infancy and there were only a limited number of training courses at USAMPS. By 1977, the 95C MOS skill levelone positions, consisting of privates through specialist fourth class, were filled, in fact over strength, forcing the MP Corps to reduce their numbers.

Based on this report, the Army built four new confinement facilities designed on the "telephone pole style" with housing unit wings parallel to one another connected by one long hallway. These new modern facilities were located at Fort Dix, New Jersey; Fort Bragg, North Carolina; Fort Sill, Oklahoma; and Fort Carson, Colorado. The only facility still in operation is Fort Dix, and it is operated by the state Department of Corrections.

#### The 1980s

In 1981, the USDB was the first military correctional facility to be audited by the American Correctional Association, receiving its accreditation certificate at the ACA winter conference in Toronto, Canada. The Army is presently the recipient of the Golden Eagle Award and the Lucy Webb Hayes Award for having the Army Corrections Command headquarters, training academy and parole board accredited and all of its correctional facilities accredited and compliant with the Prison Rape Eliminate Act standards. The Army is one of only 12 departments of corrections worldwide to achieve and maintain this level of professionalism.

The 1986 study of the "Army Corrections into the Year 2000" recommended the creation of a centralized management structure to oversee the Army Confinement System and the consolidation of correctional facilities.

There were 15 installation detention facilities — 12 active, two inactive and one leased to a state DoC. The active IDFs were oper-

IDFs directed to close were located at Fort Meade, Maryland; Fort Ord, California; Fort Gordon, Georgia; Fort Campbell, Kentucky; and Fort Polk, Louisiana. The seven remaining IDFs were located at Fort Knox, Kentucky; Fort Benning, Georgia; Fort Hood, Texas; Fort Sill, Oklahoma; Fort Carson, Colorado; Fort Lewis, Washington; and Fort Riley, Kansas, and reorganized under the regional correctional fa-

cility (RCF) concept. The RCF concept restructured and reorganized existing IDFs equivalent to county jails into RCFs equivalent of mini prisons. Offender sentence length increased from six months to 36 months. This increase in mission required policy changes in the areas of personnel, correctional treatment programs and administrative support. The RCF commander's position was upgraded to a field-grade officer and required a criminal justice-related graduate degree. Additionally, new key positions were established: institutional parole officer, operations officer, psychologist

tional training programs were es-

#### tablished. The 1990s

In May 1990, the secretary of defense approved the consolidation of corrections under DoD. The secretary of the Army was designated the executive agent of DoD for the incarceration of all members of the armed forces who had sentences to confinement longer than one year. As the executive agent for long-term prisoners, the Army operates, funds and staffs the facilities at no cost to the other services. The joint corrections staffing at the USDB was extremely reduced from more than 150 Marines and Airmen to just 12. The Army consolidated correctional facilities again, closing the RCFs at Fort Benning and Fort

The Army had just been designated as DoD's executive agent for long-term corrections, but the main prisoner housing wings in the USDB "Castle" were deteriorating and in need of renovation. The Army was studying options on whether to repair the facility at a scale of \$25 million to \$195 mil-

ating at approximately 40 percent and chaplain. Crime-specific lion or build a new facility. The standard design capacity. The treatment programs and voca- size and cost of the new facility would depend on the capacity requirements of the Army and other service corrections headquarters.

> In 1994, the decision was to build a new modern state-of-theart, 515-bed facility. The Army RCFs and other DoD Level II facilities would now house prisoners with sentences of up to five years. The Army and the Bureau of Prisons signed an agreement to house up to 500 military prisoners from the USDB in exchange for land and buildings at Fort Dix

and Fort Devens, Massachusetts. The 1997 Corrections Consolidation Working Group studied the DoD consolidation of corrections with the intent of establishing a single DoD corrections activity and realign and reduce military confinement facilities. The Army reduced its stateside correctional facilities to just four — the USDB and the RCFs at Fort Knox, Fort Lewis and Fort Sill. The creation of a single DoD Cor-

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- If there is an escape route, evacuate immediately.
- Leave your belongings behind.
- Do not try to move wounded people.
- Prevent others from entering the area.
- If you cannot escape or evade, engage.
- » Be aggressive: throw items, yell, and improvise weapons.
- » Commit to your actions.



- » If you cannot evacuate, find a place to hide that is concealed from view, protected from shots fired, and non-confining.
- » Turn your cell phone or pager to silent.

### COMPLY



- When law enforcement arrives:
  - Remain calm and follow instructions.
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    - Raise your hands and keep them visible.
  - Do not yell, scream, or point.





#### **Profiles: Who approves?** Who can ask to see it?

#### What is a profile, and how is it approved?

There are two types of physical profiles, Temporary and Permanent. All profiles exceeding seven days will be entered in the e-Profile system for commanders' review.

Per Army Directive (AD) 2025-13, Facial Hair Grooming Standards, temporary shaving profiles and medical treatment plans are recommended by a medical provider for the O-5 Commander's review. Once the medical treatment plan is approved, the O-5 Commander will issue an ETP for facial hair grooming standards.

Temporary profiles can be extended by the profiling officer as needed, up to 12 months, in order to facilitate recovery. The Soldier's commander will monitor the progress of the Soldier's recovery, and can request further evaluations if deemed necessary

#### Who can ask to see or verify a Soldier's profile?

Any leader can ask a Soldier to verify his or her profile (either temporary or permanent), but the Soldier is not required to carry a paper copy of the profile. Shaving profiles are the

Leaders can validate a profile by engaging with medical personnel, or the

Soldier's supervisor or commander.

Note: Requesting verification of a profile does not violate the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPAA). Please see DoD Manual 6025.18, Implementation of the HIPAA Privacy Rule in DoD Health Care Programs, para. 4.4 k(1)(a).

#### Shaving profiles

Soldiers may receive a temporary shaving profile, in phases, if they have a diagnosed skin condition such as pseudofolliculitis barbae (shaving bumps) or *acne keloidalis nuchae*. The Soldier will be exempt from


shaving during treatment process, however, facial hair will be kept trimmed to a maximum of 1/4 inch in length. Grooming will not be shaped, edged, or fashioned in a manner contrary to Army standards. Soldiers with an accommodation

for facial hair grooming standards, whether for physical conditions or religious reasons, must produce a copy of their exception to policy or religious accommodation decision memorandum on request. (Also see IG Update 25-3, August 2025)

#### **Army Facial Hair Standards Updated**

#### MILPER 25-116: Updates to the **Army Career Skills Program**

The Army Career Skills Program (CSP) provides separating Soldiers the opportunity to participate, within 180 days of separation or retirement, in (pre)apprenticeships, on-the-job training, employment skills training and

MILPER 25-116, issued 3 April 2025,

clarifies the three categories of Soldiers eligible for the CSP, along with approval authorities and participation time limits The table below shows participation

categories, length of CSP class duration, and approval authorities based on the rank of the separating

Category I	E1-E5	Up to 120 days	First field grade CDR with UCMJ
Category II	E6-E7, WO1-CW3, O1-O3	Up to 90 days	First O6 CDR with UCMJ
Category III	E8-E9, CW4-CW5, O4 and up	Up to 60 days	First General Officer

However, if a Soldier participates in a program over 50 miles away from the installation and does not wish to return to their PDS for final clearing, an ETP is required. MILPER 25-116 outlines the Exception to Policy process.

### **Army Religious Accommodations**

Army Regulation 600-20, Army Command Policy, states "The Army places a high value on the rights of its Soldiers to observe tenets of their respective religions or to observe no religion at all; while protecting the civil liberties of its personnel to the greatest extent possible, consistent with its military requirements."

Soldiers may request religious accommodations based on one or more of the following five

- worship practices; dietary practices:
- medical care (including immunizations);
- wear and appearance of the uniform: and personal appearance and

grooming practices. To initiate a request for religious accommodations, a Soldier will submit a memorandum to their immediate commander, citing their religious beliefs and specific accommodation request(s). The commander will consult with the

senior chaplain for guidance.
Accommodation requests should be resolved within 30 days for active duty, or 60 days for reserve components or active duty OCONUS.

#### **Decision Authorities** • NONE: Routine requests where no

or unit command approval is required. Relates to issues specifically permitted by AR 670-1. Command approval is not required but should be aware. This includes opportunity to participate in religious services, wear of religious bracelets, Kufi, Yarmulke, etc. UNIT COMMANDER: Routine

requests where unit command approva is required, but not affected by AR 670-1. Unit commanders may approve formal or informal waiver/exception from standards/uniformity rather than waive from Army-wide policy/regulations. Includes temporary or permanent adjustments to work and duty rosters/schedules, wear of long APFU pants during PT, Religious MREs, etc.

 General Officer with Court-Martial Convening Authority (GCMCA): Uniform and grooming requests requiring approval by GCMCA. Uniform and grooming standard waivers for hijabs, beards, and turbans IAW AR 600-20 and AR 670-1.

• HQDA: Uniform and grooming requests requiring approval by Secretary of the Army. This includes requests of Army-wide policies/regulations exceeding GCMCA approval authority. Examples: Medical boards, immunizations, beard length exceeding 2", uncut hair, Jewish payots (sidelocks), head coverings exceeding

The focus is on a safe, live fire training experience for the hunters and dogs finding and retrieving harvested pheasants in field conditions. Prizes are awarded to top performing teams; scoring is based on the team's combined firearms handling and hunting skills. The event is open to Club members, active duty and retired military, military dependents, Federal employees, and invited guests. Entry fees are \$75 for Club members and \$85 for non-members. 


