Fort Leavenworth Fire and Emergency Services personnel were recognized as Fort Leavenworth Firefighters of the Year by Combined Arms Center and Fort Leavenworth Commanding General Lt. Gen. Milford Beagle April 15 at Station No. 2. The three firefighters were given personalized plaques during the recognition to celebrate their achievements.

Fort Leavenworth Fire and Emergency Services Firefighter Brandon Barufaldi was named 2023 Fort Leavenworth Civilian Firefighter of the Year, Fire Capt. Joshua Carroll was named 2023 Fort Leavenworth Fire Officer of the Year, and Fire Inspector Capt. Antonio Masisak was named 2023 Fort Leavenworth Department of the Army Fire Inspector of the Year.

At the end of 2023/first of 2024, nomination packages for each of them were sent forward for considera-

Medal of Honor recipient laid to rest

Fort Leavenworth hosted a Celebration of Life for Medal of Honor recipient retired Col. Roger Donlon April 10.

Donlon passed away Jan. 25 at the age of 89. The Celebration of Life honored Don-

lon for his service to his country and for the legacy he left behind as a Vietnam War veteran.

In 1964, Donlon was a Green Beret captain stationed at Camp Nam Dong, Vietnam. The small post was nestled deep in the jungles near the border of Laos. He and his team served as advisors to more than 300 South Vietnamese soldiers. In the early morning of July 6, 1964, nearly 1,000 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese soldiers attacked the camp with mortars, grenades, rifles and other small arms. Two members of his team died, and Donlon himself was wounded four times. Despite his injuries, he continued to lead his men.

Approximately six months after the attack, still recovering from his wounds, Donlon was invited to the White House and

Volunteers' contributions celebrated

Post volunteers were honored for their contributions to the community during the Fort Leavenworth Volunteer Recognition Ceremony April 16 at the Frontier Conference Center.

"So, this is an amazing day — anytime we can recognize volunteers for giving selflessly to an organization and the causes we have here is an amazing day," Garrison Commander Col. Duane Mosier said.

Volunteers have given more than 25,000 hours of their time in the past year, and those recorded hours equate to more than \$800,000. The figure represents the "cost avoidance your volunteerism has saved this installation over the last year," said ceremony narrator April Rogers, Army Volunteer Corps coordinator and Army Community Service Employment Readiness Program specialist.

The ceremony began with the national anthem, followed by a prayer delivered by Garrison Chaplain (Lt. Col.) Nathan McLean.

"Father, we give you thanks for the many volunteers who have spent this year working on important missions and connecting with people and helping make this Fort Leavenworth community a true community," McLean prayed. "From all the events and all the activities that they have given their time, their effort and their resources for, Lord, we give you thanks, and we give them thanks. Father, I would pray that you bless those activities and bless the activities that are to come that they are a part of. Lord, that you would take them safely from here, and if you are going to use them in other places, that you would not just bring them there safely, but help them to be a part of another community and

In addition to 324 total volunteers recognized, with several of them present to cross the stage to receive certificates of appreciation, two volunteers who have amassed more than 4,000 volunteer hours were awarded Lifetime Presidential Service Awards, and Volunteers of the Year were announced.

Lifetime Presidential Service Award recipient Monica Bassett founded Stronghold Food Pantry, which functions out of the Armed Forces Insurance building on post, in 2022.

"Monica opened the Stronghold Food Pantry on the installation to combat food insecurities for our service members and their families, and to promote financial security by coordinating personal financial management and life skills," was unable to attend the ceremony.

Lifetime Presidential Service Award recipient Jackie Williams, who currently serves on the Fort Unified Leavenworth School District 207 Board of Education, has held more than 50 volunteer positions at five installations, spanning two continents.

She has volunteered with Army Community Service, Youth Sports, on-post and off-post clubs, "and everything in between — Jackie really knows how to put her best foot forward and really make a difference," Rogers said as Williams joined the Garrison Command Team on stage. "You truly are an inspiration."

Rogers said selecting Volunteers of the Year was a difficult task with so many magnificent contributions being made by post volunteers.

Rachel Reed was named Spouse Volunteer of the Year.

"Rachel serves as assistant den leader for Pack 3001 Bear Den, with over 100 hours dedicated to the Cub Scouts last year," Rogers said. "She serves as the co-mayor for Nez Perce Village. She volunteers with USD 207, the Leavenworth Lancers Swim Team, St. Ignatius Catholic Community, and more."

Sixteen-year-old Cayman Williams, sophomore at Leavenworth High School, was named Youth Volunteer of the Year.

"This young man has volunteered at Stronghold Food Pantry and has brought in groups of teenagers to assist in volunteering to build a larger community of volunteerism," Rogers said. "Cay-

tion at higher levels, as were packages for Fire Department of the Year and Fire Prevention Program of the Year, in the DoD annual Fire and Emergency Services Awards competition.

"It's very difficult to delineate who stands out in the fire department. Everyone in the department has unique strengths and are high performers," said Directorate of Emergency Services Fire Chief Marshall Fiedler. "However, the three awardees were nominated by their supervisors and were selected for their individual achievements, as well as their participation as team members for the greater good of the community."

Fiedler described Barufaldi as an up-and-coming firefighter in fire protection.

"This past year, he has been committed to improving his skills and performance every day at work," Fiedler said. "He earned several professional certifications, and he and his team worked very hard to ensure the readiness and resilience of the operations division in the effort to be there when our community needs us. I'm excited to see Brandon's continued development and maturity into a well-seasoned Army professional."

Barufaldi's nomination cites him as responding to 120 emergencies, exhibiting a perfect duty performance every time, and responding as driver-operator and providing "quick patient assessment (that) enabled quick patient transfer to (advanced life support) units and transport to medical facilities," with all patients recovering and no lives lost. He is described as dedicated, having completed all certifications/requirements for the next level one year in advance. As a member of the Respiratory Protection Program Team, he maintained 76 masks in the department and achieved 100 percent OSHA compliance noted during a 2023 inspection. His nomination also describes him as a solidly competent decision-maker and having "technical skills used as a benchmark for firefighters to learn (selfcontained breathing apparatus) maintenance."

Barufaldi promoted the importance of physical fitness, leading teammates in daily workouts to maintain readiness to respond and helped ensure complete compliance for the entire department. His contribution as a public educator during Fire Prevention Week is credited as helping make it one of the department's most successful educational programs, with more than 2,000 children and adults reached that week.

Barufaldi's nomination listed several other accomplishments and examples of job dedication, including filling in as needed as crew chief and lieutenant, saving 240 hours of overtime; volunteering to assist commuduring nity partners live-fire training; completing certification for Incident Safety Officer, Fire Officer II, Fire Instructor II and Fire Inspector II; and instructing 15 firefighters on continuing education units necessary to maintain emergency medical technician certification.



Fort Leavenworth Fire Officer of the Year Capt. Joshua Carroll

Carroll's nomination describes him as a dynamic fire officer and an outstanding leader who motivates others and lives the Army Core Values of loyalty, duty, respect, selfless service, honor, integrity and personal courage.

"Captain Carroll is admired by peers, subordinates, and supervisors alike

pertly managed the (personal protective equipment) care and maintenance; enacted a program to track and record inspections and maintenance; and achieved 100 percent accurate reports in recent inspection."

Carroll managed 11 personnel hiring actions and reduced the hiring lag by 80 percent. His team of five firefighters amassed more than 2,100 hours of training time — five times the requirement.

He is credited with helping review policy and research, procure and implement various systems and procedures to reduce overtime by more than 60 percent, improve decontamination and cleaning methods, streamline processes, and more.

Carroll's nomination also noted his service as a mentor for troubled youth in Kansas City.

Masisak's and the Fire Prevention Team's responsibilities include multiple child centers, four community schools and three prisons, including the only maximum-security prison in the DoD, conducting 242 inspections and identifying 86 major safety hazards while correcting 122 others. According to Masisak's nomination, he and his team also conducted 29 project acceptance tests, and "ensured projects in essential facilities were ready and on time, and ensured life safety code compliance."

His nomination describes him as someone who exceeds standards and is prompt, friendly and professional, "our most supportive member of the department, willing to help other sections, serves as timekeeper, trains other firefighters in pre-fire planning... always achieves posresults." itive The nomination also notes that Masisak committed "personal time to revamp the department pre-incident plan program, and eliminated redundancies and populated plans with accu-

"Captain Masisak has a value of selfless service at a level not found in many, but we're very fortunate to have this level of commitment throughout the Fire Prevention Team," Fiedler said. "Tony and the rest of the Prevention Team's 'cando' attitude and commitment to serve the community is beyond what I've seen in 40 years of DoD service. Whether it be an internal or external customer, Tony will do his best to exceed expectations and help whoever needs assistance."

Showing initiative in continuing education, Masisak has completed certifi-HazMat cations as Technician, Incident Commander and Fire Officer III, and certified in Fire Investigator Training, Army Civil-Education System ian supervisor class, and amassed more than 400 hours of proficiency training. He also completed Life Safety Educator and the National Electrical Safety Systems, among other accomplishments. Fiedler said he thinks it is important for an organization to showcase goal achievement.



Carroll's nomination included a long list of accomplishments and examples of excellent job performance, leadership ability, initiative and resourcefulness, including being selected as the newest fire captain "because of his maturity, mission support, and skills"; "exit's recognized," he said. "This awards program is just one avenue we use to reinforce and acknowledge their contribution and support for the mission. I truly appreciate their work."

Fiedler said Fort Leavenworth has one of the lowest fire loss rates and fastest emergency response times in the Army because of the dedication of the firefighters and other professionals who work on the installation.

presented with the Medal of Honor by President Lyndon Johnson. He became the first Green Beret in history, and the first American soldier of the Vietnam War, to receive the nation's highest award for military valor in action.

As Donlon's remains were brought onto Fort Leavenworth, more than 1,300 students and faculty from the Command and General Staff College (CGSC) lined Grant Avenue to render honors to a soldier who continued to serve his country long after he retired from the Army in 1988.

"Colonel Donlon's leadership, mentorship and selfless service have left an indelible mark on the Command and General Staff College, the Army and our nation," said CGSC Deputy Commandant Brig. Gen. David Foley. "The profound impact he made resonates through the lives of countless young Army officers who were fortunate to receive his guidance and tutelage. While our nation mourns the loss of a hero, Colonel Donlon's irreplaceable character leaves behind a legacy that will inspire generations to come."

The Celebration of Life service at the Frontier Conference Center included video tributes to Donlon, 15 guest speakers, and songs by recording artist Steve Amerson. More than 300 guests attended the event, including family, current and former Green Berets, and other Medal of Honor recipients.

"I am one of the men the (the Medal of Honor) citation talks about as being wounded on July 6, 1964," said an emotional Mike Disser, who served alongside Donlon at Camp Nam Dong. "I would not be alive today at the age of 80 had it not been for (Donlon's) leadership."

Following the Celebration of Life, Donlon's remains were transferred to the Fort Leavenworth National Cemetery by a riderless horse-drawn caisson for a burial service that included a 21-gun salute.

Donlon often gifted friends, family, or acquaintances with a compass, along with profound guidance: "Life will spin you around, but stay on the azimuth. With faith, you will make progress toward your goal and purpose."

"(Grande) has logged over 1,000 hours this year alone," Rogers said. "He archives the history of Army corrections, coordinates historical submissions to the Army museums, and educates the Army and public on many historical matters."



Employment readiness services offered for spouses, service members

The Employment Readiness Program, located in the Resiliency Center at 600 Thomas Ave., is available to active-duty service members and spouses.

The program offers personalized resumé-building services, including assistance with formatting, editing, and tailoring resumés to specific job postings. Services are offered free of charge.

In addition, service members and spouses can take advantage of career assessments to help them identify their strengths and areas for improvement, as well as explore

potential career paths that align with their skills and interests.

April Rogers, Employment Readiness Program specialist, said every appointment is tailored to fit the needs of each person coming in.

To prepare for these meetings, Rogers suggested the job-seeker compile a list of previous work, performance appraisals and volunteer experience in the form of a working resumé or even a simple list.

The program also offers daytime and evening classes on resumé writing and federal employment. These classes are offered monthly; the most updated list can be found at the ACS Facebook page.

If preparing for an upcoming job fair, Rogers offered suggestions to help.

• Have an updated resumé on hand.

It is best to be prepared by researching the companies present on the day of the fair and having a resumé that focuses on those particular skills.

• Prepare an "elevator" pitch — a quick 10- to 15-second introduction about yourself and what you are looking for in your next job.

• Prepare a list of questions for the companies you meet with, such as company culture, the hiring process and growth potential.

• Dress to impress.

These fairs act as on-site job interviews, and it is best to look the part.

The Fort Leavenworth leaders are reminding community members to keep the installation beautiful and trash-free.

This seems simple enough, but this often becomes a challenge during the peak moving season on Fort Leavenworth. With more people moving in and out and generating PCS-related garbage, there will be an influx of trash that needs to be disposed of.

There is also a dimension of public safety to this initiative. Fort Leavenworth Garrison Public Affairs Officer Scott Gibson said keeping neighborhoods and public spaces at Fort Leavenworth clean and orderly fosters a sense of security and pride in the commuFrontier Heritage Communities' resident handbook, which can be found at https://www.frontierheritagecommunities.com/residents, trash and recycling should be covered, and can be put out no earlier than 8 p.m. the evening before pick-up. After pick-up, containers should be removed by 8 p.m. on the day of pick-up and stored in the designated area.

Off-post, the Leavenworth, Lansing, and Platte City municipal governments have solid waste management resource websites that detail the trash collection rules, frequency and practices. Visit https://www.leavenworthks.org/publicworks/page/so lid-waste-division-services, https://www.lansingks.org/finance/page/trash-recycling and https://www.plattecity.org/documentlist.aspx?categoryid=12924 to access that information. Garrison command officials ask that off-post residents not bring their household trash to Fort Leavenworth. This helps to reduce the strain of installation waste collection, especially during peak PCS season.

Heritage Communities are considered bulk trash. Examples of bulk trash include scrap wood, furniture, mattresses, large appliances and tires.

There are no additional authorized bulk trash drop-off locations.

Residents and non-residents of the installation are illegally leaving unwanted furniture, mattresses and other large items in the scrap metal area of the Fort Leavenworth Recycling Center, or by unit trash bins, costing the installation thousands of dollars in clean-up fees each year. This improper disposal takes road and grounds crews away from their main mission, leaving them to work to mitigate the hazard caused by the illegal dumping.

Instead, community member with bulk trash outside of normal collection times are encouraged to use the Leavenworth County Solid Waste Transfer Station at 24967 136th Street in Lansing, Kan., (Visit https://www.leavenworthcounty.gov/departments/transfer_station/index.php for more information) to dispose of bulky items such as furniture, appliances or large amounts of household trash. Any usable items, such as furniture in good condition, can be donated to various agencies (information follows), and metal appliances and the like should be placed in the scrap metal area between the cement slabs so it can be accessed and loaded on a trailer by the metal recycler.

Recyclable Materials

Fort Leavenworth Frontier Housing Communities residents can easily contribute to environmental conservation by using the mixed recycling curbside pick-up on their assigned days.

The mixed-use recycling bin issued to all on-post residents is an easy way to help reduce the amount of waste going into landfills. The following items are accepted for curbside pick-up: plastic bottles and containers, food and beverage cans and containers, paper, flattened cardboard and paperboard, glass bottles and containers, and metal lids and caps.

All community members, post residents and non-residents alike, are encouraged to use the installation's drop-off recycling area on W. Warehouse Rd south of the stables. This area includes a dedicated cardboard recycling bin, a paper recycling container, a glass recycling trailer and a yellow mixed recyclable roll-off. Residents should place all materials in the appropriate receptacles and avoid leaving any trash on the ground. The Garrison cautions against leaving any furniture, scrap wood or trash in the recycling drop-off center. The ongoing trend of users

leaving unwanted furniture, mattresses and other items illegally in the scrap metal area of the recycling center, or by unit trash bins, costs the installation thousands of dollars in clean-up fees each year. Plan ahead and use the residential bulk trash program, take those unwanted items to the Leavenworth County Solid Waste Transfer Station, or donate items in good condition.

Household Hazardous Waste and Toxic Materials

Hazardous materials can be found in common household items such as cleaners, paint thinners, gasoline, motor oil, pesticides, fertilizers, and even compact fluorescent light bulbs. Once these items can no longer be used, they become household hazardous waste, and it's important to make sure they are disposed of properly to safeguard families, pets and the environment. The Household Hazardous Product Collection Point, located at the Directorate of Public Works Environmental Office at 810 Mc-Clellan Ave., allows drop off of unwanted household products in original containers. Visit https://home.army.mil/ leavenworth/index.php/my-fort/all-services/environmental-managemen t for more information.

nity, discouraging criminal or disruptive behavior.

To keep the post clean and safe, Fort Leavenworth has implemented strict refuse policies, and service members and their families should be aware of the proper disposal policies within the installation.

Household Trash

Residents of Fort Leavenworth on post have the convenience of weekly curbside trash and recycling pick up. Two containers, one for trash and one for recycling, are supplied to each residence.

Per the Fort Leavenworth

Bulk Trash

Residents in on-post housing are reminded to use bulk trash pick-up every Monday at their normal trash pick-up locations.

hold hazardous waste drop-off is for residents only, but off-post residents/employees have similar services offered by their municipal waste departments, including the Leavenworth County Solid Waste Transfer Station.

DPW also offers a reuse program for any re-issuable items turned into the Household Hazardous Waste Collection Point. Do-it-yourselfers can pick up paints, stains, automotive products, cleaning products, garden and yard chemicals, and other reuseable household items that have been turned in and reviewed by staff for safety.

The HHW Collection Point is open for drop-off from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday when an attendant is available. For more information, call 913-684-3306.

Other Items Requiring Special Handling (E-waste, Motor Oil, Flags, Medications, etc.)

Electronic waste is the fastest growing waste stream in the country. To help control this waste stream, Fort Leavenworth residents should recycle their e-waste instead of throwing it in the trash. A drop-off shed for e-waste is in the Fort Leavenworth Recycle Center on Warehouse Road. The following items are accepted: computers, toner cartridges, cell phones, cameras, modems, monitors, televisions, printers, game systems and general electronics.

E-waste generated by government offices and units should be turned into the Logistic Readiness Center's Supply Support Activity at 913-684-9993.

Residents should not put motor oil in the trash or pour it down the drain as it is hazardous to the environment. Used motor oil and antifreeze can be taken to the Auto Craft Center at 911 McClellan Ave., or an off-post garage or auto parts store for proper disposal. Visit https://leavenworth.armymwr.com/programs/autocrafts-center for more information.

The U.S. Flag Code specifies proper disposal guidelines. Flags can be disposed of in the drop-off container at the Fort Leavenworth Recycling Center. A local Scouts BSA troop will respectfully and reverently dispose of flags left in the drop box. Flags can also be dropped off at any area VFW post. Discarding medications in trash or down the drain can have negative effects on the environment and contaminate the water supply. Munson Army Health Center Pharmacy has a drug takeback box in the lobby of the pharmacy.

Improperly disposed weapons can pose a risk to sanitation workers who may come in contact with the weapon while collecting the garbage. Safely discarding firearms, knives or ammunition should be done with local law enforcement. For Fort Leavenworth residents, reach out to the non-emergency Emergency Services number at (913) 684-2111 for guidance. Off-post residents can contact their local police department.

Donate Useable Goods

Residents of Fort Leavenworth are encouraged to donate useable items whenever possible to curb landfill waste, support charitable programs and provide muchneeded resources to those in need.

The Fort Leavenworth Thrift Shop, at 1025 Sheridan Drive, accepts items such as clothing, toys, small appliances, pots, pans and dish sets, with the condition that they are in "like new" condition. Large televisions, desktop computers and other large electronics are not accepted. Profits are used to fund military family scholarships and community assistance grants. Donated items can be left in the donation shed outside the shop. To make an appointment at the Thrift Shop for a large donation, call 913-651-6768.

The City Union Mission of Kansas City, Mo., offers curbside pick-up for residents in the Fort Leavenworth housing areas every second Saturday. The mission accepts clothing, furniture and other household items, but not appliances, mattresses, cribs or car seats. Profits raised from donations are used to combat extreme poverty and homelessness in the Kansas City metro area. Tax credit forms are available. Contact FLFHC for details.

The Fort Leavenworth Stray Facility at 510 Organ. Ave. has a red donation bin on the front porch for unopened pet food and other pet supplies.



SPORTS PHYSICALS ARE CURRENTLY UNAVAILABLE

Temporary Suspension of Sports Physicals

Due to provider staffing, sports physicals are currently unavailable from Munson Army Health Center, but they can be obtained off post.

Unfortunately, sports physicals, on their own, are not a TRICARE-covered benefit. While MAHC has offered sports physical in previous years, the staffing this summer cannot support the extra service at this time without impacting access for patients with acute and/or chronic healthcare needs.

MAHC continues to prioritize services to ensure we meet the soldier readiness mission and access to care standards and will fulfill that mission with systems already in place.

MAHC providers may complete sports physical paperwork in conjunction with a TRICARE-covered physical, like a school physical or routine physical; however, appointments for routine physicals may be delayed, when medically appropriate, until late summer/early fall when staffing recovers.






